## Do Not Harass Moose

### Moose Are Often Seen On Snowmobile Trails

■ Moose are not frightened by snowmobiles, ATVs, or other vehicles. They will stand their ground and possibly charge. Do not chase, harass, or pursue wildlife on foot, a snowmobile or any other vehicle.

■ Moose often travel on packed trails and will avoid deeper snow adjacent to trails. If you encounter a moose on a trail, use an alternate route or allow the moose time to leave the area.

■ Colorado Parks and Wildlife suggests viewing moose from a distance, and being prepared with a camera, binoculars and/or a spotting scope.

### Moose Attacks Are Serious!

■ A moose that walks slowly towards you may be attacking. Watch for these signs of moose aggression: ears laid back, raised hairs on back, and may lick snout.

■ If a moose acts aggressively look for an escape route. Slowly back away toward a safe location. If a moose charges, run as fast as you can and put something large between you and the moose (a tree, car, large rock, etc.).
