Take a quiet and leisurely stroll with Ranger Colleen along the lake and through the pines enjoying birds, wildflowers and other changes through the summer season



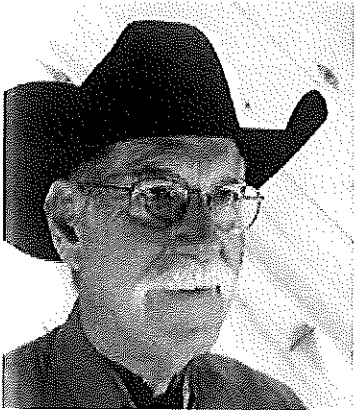

He donated much of his earnings to other contestants at rodeos. He learned most of the traditional songs he sings in bunk houses, around the campfires or in the cab of a pickup on the way to a rodeo.
