

125 Ways to Celebrate CPW's 125th Anniversary

- 9. Try paddleboarding or kayaking- do not forget your life jacket!
- 10. Go camping
- 11. Attend a night sky program or stargaze on your own- how many constellations can you identify?
- 12. Participate in a history festival in your area or at a local park. Discover who lived on this land before you did.
- 13. Go for a hike! Afterwards, look up any plants or wildlife you saw that you could not identify.
- 14. Get an autograph from your favorite Colorado Parks and Wildlife employee and ask them about their job
- 15. Attend a <u>wildlife viewing festival</u> such as Bighorn Sheep Fest in Georgetown, Sandhill Crane Festival in Monte Vista, Moose Day on the Grand Mesa, or Elk Fest in Estes Park
- 16. Learn to identify a type of wildlife track
- 17. Try geocaching at a state park
- 18. Watch a Colorado Parks and Wildlife Wild Classroom video on YouTube
- 19. Paint a rock to brighten up your garden, or leave one around your neighborhood as a kindness rock
- 20. Learn the phases of the moon
- 21. Find a hike or swim for you and your furry friend
- 22. Check out our species profiles and learn about a new Colorado animal that you didn't know existed.
- 23. Enjoy an outdoor picnic
- 24. Instead of a snowman, make a snow deer, snow raccoon, or your other favorite snow animal.
- 25. Go on a walk and look for signs of wildlife such as tracks, nests, scat, fur, etc.
- 26. Skip a rock on a local pond or river
- 27. Find the colors of the rainbow in nature
- 28. Observe an animal from a safe distance and write down what they are doing
- 29. Sketch a plant
- 30. Attend a campfire talk

- 76. Dip your toes in a stream or lake










- 77. Collect some water in a cup and look at what bugs you find with a magnifying glass

- 82. Walk on a fallen tree trunk like a balance beam
- 83. Plant a seed that will benefit a pollinator
- 84. Visit a xeriscape or native garden
- 85. Explore somewhere new on a walk
- 86. Download the iNaturalist app and record what you see
- 87. Visit CPW Connect and sign up for a volunteer project in your area
- 88. Find a quiet and cozy place to take a nature nap
- 89. Learn the 7 Principles of Leave No Trace
- 90. Teach someone else about the 7 Principles of Leave No Trace
- 91. Watch a bird at a birdfeeder
- 92. Sit under a tree and imagine the other living things that have enjoyed its shade
- 93. Watch a river flow and try to spot fish swimming in its current
- 94. Pick up litter!
- 95. Complete the Adventures as a Young Naturalist coloring book or become a Junior Ranger at a state park
- 96. Follow a state park on Instagram
- 97. Lean to read a bird call (search online for bird spectrogram)
- 98. Get a stamp in a state park passport book
- 99. Learn about a type of pollinator
- 100. Learn to whistle using blades of grass
- 101. Attend an education program at your local state park
- 102. Go fishing!
- 103. Keep a nature journal
- 104. Skip during your next walk
- 105. Learn your cardinal directions using the sun
- 106. Smell a pine tree
- 107. Ask a park employee where their favorite spot is in the park
- 108. Try to make an echo with your voice
