Project Description:

Stationed on the Ouray Ranger District for the U.S. Forest Service, the Ouray Dozer Maintenance Program has been a consistently strong asset to the Colorado OHV trails on the western slope and an example of *Colorado Registration Dollars at Work*. The mission of this program is to provide the public with safe, sustainable, and opportunity on federally managed trail systems. Based in Montrose, the program serves the Grand Mesa, Uncompandere, and Gunnison National Forests as well as the BLM Uncompandere Field Office. The annual workplan is developed with input from our partners, local communities, and neighboring federal agencies. Until the annual dozer meeting is conducted, the tentative schedule for the 2025 program consists of these goals:

- Early spring- prepare the equipment for the field season, repair/maintain tools, evaluate field conditions.
- Survey trails and compare condition to previous year.
- Early summer- start field work on the north end of the Uncompangre Plateau working Picket Corral, Love Mesa Bench, Bear Pen, 47 Trail, and Cottonwood.
- Start supporting other districts in their needs as identified by annual meeting by splitting the dozer crew into two crews.
- Address local club adopted trails by completing projects as identified by clubs.
- Move dozer operations to the central portion of the Uncompange Plateau addressing needs on Moore Mesa, Roubideau, Traver, East Bull, and Parallel trails.
- Maintain the trails on the south end of the Uncompangre Plateau: Spring Creek, Dented Door, Rim, and Dry Creek.
- Move to the High Country to work the Stealey Mountain area.
- Work the trails surrounding Silver Jack: Lou Creek, Fox Creek, West Fork, and Cowboy Lake Trail.
- Spend two weeks assisting the Gunnison Ranger District with their needs after Labor Day.
- Move operations to the Norwood Ranger District and work Bucktail Creek trail.
- Assist BLM Uncompange Field Office with their 50 in dozer needs.
- End field operations by completing inventory of work accomplished and start building scope of work for the next season.
- Complete season by winterizing equipment, complete minor repairs, perform annual inspections.

PROJECT SELECTION CRITERIA

1. Need for & Benefit of the Project:

The Ouray Dozer Maintenance Program is instrumental in addressing the maintenance needs of OHV trails on the western slope. With increasing visitation, the goal of this program is to continue providing exceptional opportunities to the OHV users by keeping up with the maintenance needs of the trails and opportunities for the public to enjoy the trails.

Staffing this program is one of the most important pieces for success. To date, the crew consists of two career-seasonal operators (WG-8's) to add stability to the program. The majority of funds requested through this grant will be used to pay 8 months of the salary for the operators and 6 months of salary for one WG-5 swamper and one WG8 operator. Because the swamper position has become one of the hardest to hire, we are requesting to turn one of them into a career-seasonal with them being on for 6 months and off for 6 months. These positions are crucial for the success of the dozer program and maintaining OHV trails. The remaining funds requested will be used for supplies/tools, repairs to the machines, and materials for the trails.

The Ouray Dozer Maintenance Program is responsible for OHV trail maintenance on the Ouray District, TMW adopted trails, Uncompany Valley Trail Riders adopted trails, spends two-three weeks on Gunnison OHV trails, and assists the neighboring districts and federal agencies as needed. There are over 500 miles of OHV trails on the forest and these dozers play a critical part in the maintenance needed to provide sustainable riding opportunities and good resource management.

The Dozer Program has excelled in OHV trail maintenance for such a large geographical area. The dozers are more effective and efficient in time and money maintaining 50in trails than when the GM OHV trail crew was used. The workload is now spread out to where the GM OHV trail crew can concentrate more on single track trail maintenance, signing, clearing, and other OHV trail related job duties. The dozer crews and trail crews are complimentary to one another in achieving the most cost effective and efficient practices in trail maintenance. The trail crew will clear the trails scheduled for dozer work and the dozer crew assists the trail crew on special projects occurring on ATV/Side-by-Side trails.

2. Partnerships, Support and Leverage:

Based out of Montrose, the Ouray Dozer Maintenance Program is strategically situated to support a wide range of needs from partners, communities, and neighboring federal agencies. The Ouray Ranger District Dozer Program services the Uncompander Plateau, Gunnison Gorge National Conservation Area, Dry Creek Management Area, Mountain Division, Gunnison, Paonia, and Norwood. The program is meant to be a resource for the whole Forest and BLM Uncompander Office, although the majority of dozer work occurs on Ouray managed trails. To be a resource for all motorized CO trails in the area, the Ouray Dozer Program consists of two dozer crews: two operators and two swampers. Equipment that is tied to the program includes:

- SWECO 480 dozer (Thunder Mountain Wheelers owned through a CPW grant)
- Sutter 500 dozer (Thunder Mountain Wheelers owned through CPW grant)
- 2018 900 Polaris RZR (purchased with CPW grant)
- 2022 900 Polaris RZR (purchased with CPW grant)
- 2 camp trailers (FS owned)
- 2 Heavy duty equipment trailers (one purchased with CPW grant and one FS owned)
- 2 trucks to haul the dozer and trailers (one owned by FS and one leased through CPW grant)
- 1 dump trailer (FS owned)

Being such an important asset to Colorado motorized trails, much time, effort, and funds have gone into maintaining this program's success. Acknowledging this importance, the Forest Service is committed to its success. The Trails Coordinator position was developed and funded by the Forest Service to manage the Dozer Program and OHV Good Management Program. Two career-seasonal dozer operator positions were

approved and hired at the beginning of the 2022 field season. Having these career positions adds stability to the program.

Partnerships are an integral part of the Dozer Program. Besides the funding provided through CPW grants, Thunder Mountain Wheelers, Uncompander Valley Trail Riders, WESTCORE, and the BLM Uncompander Field Office all benefit and help guide the work of the program as well as the local communities this program works in and around. Through the annual dozer meeting, the FS Trails Coordinator communicates with these organization about needs on the ground and works to address them. This meeting is important because these organizations are important in developing the seasonal workplan of the program and are consulted on the needs that are seen on the ground that the dozers can address. In this way, the yearly workplan is developed and the program can successfully maintain and enhance OHV trails.

Both dozers, RZRs and other support equipment have the *Colorado Registration Dollars at Work* decal on them in support of the State OHV Grant Program. The crew also wears shirts that have the Stay the Trail, Forest Service, and the State's *Colorado Registration Dollars at Work* logo on them.

3. Resource Protection, Enhancement and Restoration relative to eligible OHV grant activities:

The Ouray Dozer Maintenance Program is not only an important part of the Ouray Ranger District but an integral component of maintenance on the local trails on federally managed lands. With a huge emphasis on efficiency and productivity, this program can only achieve this standard by funding the dozers and this program. Always striving to achieve sustainability in every maintenance project, this program is always trying to meet that standard. Offering OHV recreational opportunities while sustainably managing the landscape is one reason this program is able to provide exceptional experiences on Colorado OHV trails. Keeping these trails maintained in good shape offers the public the ability to enjoy their lands.

Having two dozers for this program is key for achieving frequent maintenance on OHV trails. Being able to rotate maintenance on trails and the quick timeframe of the dozers on the trails is essential in preventing time consuming issues to occur. With sustainability being the objective, impacts resulting from recreation use has been minimalized, resulting in improved trail conditions and stability. When greater attention to stability of trails is needed, the dozer is able to assist in installing grass paver, cinder blocks, and hardening water crossings. For projects such as these, volunteers and the Trail Crew members help to expedite the process.

With the delay in starting the ground operations for the 2023 field season, the ability to have two dozers ready to go was critical in addressing maintenance needs. With the public anxious to ride the trails before they were sufficiently dry, this program played an important part in the maintenance needs and addressed resource protection in a timely manner. Ruts where fixed, creek crossings where hardened, drainages were fixed, and trail corridors were improved. Addressing these issues, the dozer operators where able to minimalize erosion, protect the natural resource, and keep users on existing trails.

Large Equipment Purchases, Maintenance and Disposition:

In order to be effective and function, the Ouray Dozer Maintenance Program consists of these crucial pieces of equipment:

- SWECO 480 dozer (Thunder Mountain Wheelers owned through a CPW grant)
- Sutter 500 dozer (Thunder Mountain Wheelers owned through CPW grant)
- 2018 900 Polaris RZR (purchased with CPW grant)
- 2022 900 Polaris RZR (purchased with CPW grant)
- 2 camp trailers (FS owned)
- 2 Heavy duty equipment trailers (one purchased with CPW grant and one FS owned)
- 2 trucks to haul the dozer and trailers (one owned by FS and one leased through CPW grant)
- 1 dump trailer (FS owned)

The funding requested through this grant is important to cover fuel, equipment repairs and maintenance, and supplies. With the volatility of fuel prices, a substantial amount is being requested to operate. The difficulty of obtaining repair parts and their cost also increases the amount requested to fund repairs. To account for the difficulty of obtaining repair parts and the time to obtain them, a large portion of the budget reflects the proactivity to have enough parts on hand where the operators can repair the

equipment in a timely manner and return the dozers to trail maintenance. With minimal repairs in the 2025 season, it is projected that the operators will be able to spend 250-300 dozer engine hours on trail maintenance. To help achieve this number, more time is being devoted to the beginning of season and end of season maintenance of the equipment.

4. Travel Management Plan Implementation, Education and Enforcement:

The 2002 GMUG Travel Management Plan is the current document being used for direction and guidance on the Forest. Compliance with this travel plan continues to improve as we continue to stress the importance of public education, improved and consistent signage, and trail applications:

- Installation of OHV width restrictors prevents full size and >50" OHVs from accessing our 50 in. trails.
- Installation of OHV cattle guards to replace stock gates where the trail goes through a range allotment
- Provide well maintained trails for all user groups prevents reroutes, trail braiding, and user created damage
- Seeding, natural closures and other rehabilitation applications on old reroutes.
- All trail work is in compliance with USFS standard guidelines for trail maintenance and construction for trail sustainability

Education:

Public contact is one of our best educational opportunities to have conversations with the public regarding:

- How OHV registration dollars are used to help maintain OHV trails
- Critical in demonstrating how this program operates and maintains the trails
- What causes undesirable resource impacts, how these can be addressed and fixed, and how they as trail users can play a part in the prevention
- MVUMs (Motor Vehicle Use Maps) are provided along with educating the individuals on how to use them so they gain an understanding of the acceptable use of different trails
- Responsible trail use and trail etiquette by all users
- Importance of the States OHV funding is displayed on all of the equipment with the Colorado Registration Dollars at Work logos.

Enforcement and Compliance Activities:

Contacting the public and explaining the reason for the rules and regulations is one of the most effective ways in achieving compliance. A huge asset is the amount of volunteer and user groups that are on public lands on a daily basis. The groups engage other members of the public and are able to increase compliance via direct outreach. With the dozer and OHV crews on the trails working, the public sees what is being accomplished and that they are actually paying for better trails with their OHV stickers. The public's awareness, interest, and ownership in the trails increases. The presence of trail dozer crews and trail crews on the landscape provides direct public awareness ensuring their understanding that rules and regulations will be enforced by FS personnel and FS law enforcement officers. During field contacts, vehicle registration is encouraged if the user does not have one and follow up is done to make sure the licenses were obtained by the individuals. Documentation of these contacts are written up in the daily crew logs and are also reported to the district's law enforcement officer. Efforts that have been made to make it easier for the public to follow the rules and regulations are:

- Providing consistent trail maintenance and trail access-decreasing user created routes
- Proper trail signing and Travel Management stickers on trails
- Motor Vehicle Use Maps that show the acceptable trail use
- Gates, natural barriers, rehabilitation of the decommissioned routes
- Public contacts reinforcing he importance of OHV registration stickers and how the funding benefits the trails they are using and responsible resource management

(H) Trail Crew Work Plan (Good Management or reoccurring crews)

The Dozer Maintenance Program is a crucial piece to the success of the OHV Program on the Ouray Ranger District. This program has a long history of success on the ground due to the funding by CPW. With the addition of Jim Jackson and Russel Augustus as career-seasonal operators, the Dozer Program is set to produce exceptional results every year. For the year 2024 field season, these are the objectives of the program:

- Work with Thunder Mountain Wheelers and Uncompangre Valley Trail Riders to identify and resolve trail issues on Adopted trails.
- Start the season by reworking the tread, drainages, and clear the corridor on Picket Corral Trail, 47 Trail, and Bear Pen.
- Move south and maintain Cabin Bench Trail and Cottonwood Trail.
- Work on maintenance in the Cimarrons on Old Owl Creek Trail, Spalding Park Trail, and Stealey Mountain North Trail.
- Maintain the trails on the south end of the Uncompangre Plateau (Spring Creek, Dented Door, Rim, Dry Creek, Ashely, and Moore Mesa)
- Continue to assist Grand Valley Ranger District and Thunder Mountain Wheelers with project as needed.
- Continue to support and assist Paonia Ranger District, Gunnison Ranger District, Norwood Ranger District, and the BLM Uncompander Field Office with their trail dozer needs.
- Work within the Ouray Ranger District with the Range Program to install and repair cattle guards over OHV trails.

The schedule of the dozers is that the trails on the north end of the Uncompangre Plateau are worked first, April-May. After the snow recedes, one will move off district to support other Colorado OHV trails while the second one works its way south on the Plateau. An area of focus will also be working the trails around the Silver Jack area in the Cimarrons during the hot months of July-August. In August-September, the needs of the rest of the Forest, Paonia, Gunnison, and Norwood will be met. Once it starts snowing in on FS managed lands, the program will shift its attention to BLM managed trails. With this schedule, the program is able to be as efficient as possible.
