Hi Country 4 Wheelers is a non-profit family-oriented group of 4x4 enthusiasts established in 1974 who enjoy the sport of off-roading. We encourage tread lightly policies and being good stewards of the land. We work together with local Forest Service and BLM agencies organizing and assisting with public land cleanups and trail maintenance to preserve and maintain roads, trails, and off-road open use areas.

HC4W volunteers and the respecting Bureau of Land Management will accomplish all work pertaining to this project.

Alex Crawford is the person responsible for this project.

### Where:

### What:

The reason for this grant request is to provide the needed funds to secure the BLM-approved Paleontological Survey to continue with the construction of the BLM-approved Silt Mesa ERMA new trail. This project will consist of the following activities:

- The following preliminary requirements as per the BLM's new trail construction process have already been met: Archeological Survey, Biologist Survey, BLM pre-scoping and approval of trail
- This grant request is for the hiring of a Paleontologist to complete the BLM-approved survey of the 1.2 mile trail project.
- The BLM supports HC4W in managing the Paleontologist survey so the process may move forward.

### When:

The estimated timeframe for this project is contingent on payment to the Paleontologist.

- Upon receipt of funding, an appointment will be secured and payment can be made to the Paleontologist.
- The Paleontological Survey is needed in order to move forward with the BLM's new trail construction requirements
- Upon receiving the Paleontologist's report, the BLM will continue with their NEPA process
- When the NEPA process is finished and as soon as the payment has been made to the Paleontologist HC4W can move forward establishing the trail.

Program Funding Acknowledgement:

As in previous joint public land efforts with the BLM, HC4W will request a letter of recognition from the BLM to the public acknowledging the use of OHV funds for the project. Use of social media, club newsletters, and stickers on the trailhead sign will also acknowledge OHV dollars at work.

## 1. Need for & Benefit of the Project (25 points):

Describe the objectives of your project and how it will benefit, and protect riding opportunities while protecting resources in the project area.

### Need for & Benefit of the Project:

Hi Country 4 Wheelers are looking to open a new OHV trail in the Silt Mesa ERMA BLM area (Squirrel Valley) north of Silt. This area is used by many area locals, but some of the trails have been closed due to private land crossings. We are hopeful to build and maintain an established trail that will alleviate landowner disputes and create a route for locals to get out and enjoy the beauty that is right in their own "backyard".

There has been an immense increase in the amount of OHV vehicles in Western Colorado and we feel that there is a need for additional trails to travel on to reduce overcrowding of existing trails. One aspect that makes this area unique compared to other BLM lands locally is that there is already ample trailer parking at the entrance to this recreational area. This trail is also very easily accessible to street legal vehicles as well. The town of Silt has provisions to allow OHV use within town limits and this area is accessible within the Garfield County rules for OHV use. The access is a paved road so there will be no additional wear to the road or dust created in accessing the trailhead area. The area is secluded with minimal residences in the proximity of the trail itself or trail access.

This area was originally access to local mining. Other uses for this area include multiple ohv roads, hunting access, and local ranch grazing area. We feel that the addition of a slightly more technical trail is a great opportunity for local enthusiasts to enjoy our public lands. With the trail being slightly more technical, it should not get overused but at the same time, it will give some of the more purpose-built rigs in our area a place to recreate. HC4W already has multiple adopt a trails locally and we look forward to helping maintain this trail as well.

Hi Country 4 Wheelers is applying for a grant to cover paleontology reports. The BLM has already completed the rest of the necessary research for this trail and has already spent these funds to do so. They do not have a staff paleontologist, so it is by the request of the BLM that Hi Country 4 Wheelers hire this research to complete the environmental study process. If we can gain the funds for this research, we will be able to move forward in a timely manner to complete the steps that the BLM has mostly completed.

There are multiple independent local OHV and Four-Wheel Drive specialty repair shops in the area as well as multiple OHV dealerships in proximity to this location. It would be beneficial to these businesses to have a more technical trail to refer their clients to for recreation. This trail will be perfect for a diverse group of users including UTV, ATV, dirt bike, and purpose-built off-road vehicles as well as street vehicles specifically modified for this type of off-highway travel. This location will draw in additional business opportunities for the downtown businesses as people will most likely travel through Silt to get to this trail and for their return trip. Interstate 70 access is on the south side of Silt so folks will be traveling right past these businesses in their travel to and from the interstate.

This area already has multiple easier trails. Adding a more technical rock crawling trail will help to diversify the uses. This will help expand the unique recreational area and help the town of Silt expand their efforts in promoting additional outdoor recreation possibilities for tourists. Expanding the use in this area will likely provide additional tourism opportunities for the restaurants, hotels, local stores, and gas stations within the Town of Silt.

# 2. Partnerships, Support and Leverage (25 points):

Hi Country 4 Wheelers is a local non-profit four-wheel drive club established in 1974. We are very active in the community with multiple local "adopt a trails". The "adopt a trails" allow us the opportunity to work directly with the BLM and the Forest Service to help maintain these local trails. We also cosponsor for the annual clean up at the Fravert Reservoir BLM recreational area for the many years. We have volunteered for multiple other trail clean-up efforts and have worked actively with the appropriate offices in these efforts. We have assisted in dozens of disabled and or immobilized vehicle recoveries over the years. Hi Country 4 Wheelers has demonstrated that we are a very good steward of the lands we recreate upon.

As a non-profit, we are asking for grant money to help with the financial burden to open this trail. We bring to the table a list of very dedicated, diverse, and experienced off-road enthusiasts who are offering to volunteer their time and equipment to help open and maintain this trail. However, we need help with the cost of the paleontology study to move forward in our volunteer work to establish this trail. The BLM has already completed the remainder of the preliminary research on this project. We believe that this trail will be a benefit to not only the local enthusiast-based businesses but also to the local gas stations, restaurants, campgrounds, etc. This location is also unique in the fact that the Town of Silt actively promotes OHV use with a town specific permit to allow OHV use within the city limits and a special use agreement with Garfield County. This trail is within these guidelines and the Town of Silt among the other following organizations are in support of this project.

# 3. Resource Protection, Enhancement and Restoration relative to eligible OHV grant activities (25 points):

The purpose of this project is to secure the paleontological survey needed to meet the federal mandates of the NEPA process. The CRVFO BLM, HC4W, and others believe this survey will complete the necessary requirements for the NEPA process and therefore likely lead to the creation of a new OHV trail in the future. The survey is an important step in providing information that would determine resource protection.

The CRVFO has completed their archeological and biological surveys as per their NEPA process and there are currently no concerns about sensitive wildlife habitats or wetlands, drainage, or erosion issues in this area. HC4W will work with the CRVFO during the initial stages of establishing the trail to maintain the integrity of the drainage in the area.







Dear OHV Program and Committee,

The BLM Colorado River Valley Field Office greatly appreciates our ongoing partnership with the Hi Country 4 Wheelers. We partner every year to conduct a large clean up at the Hubbard Mesa OHV Area, typically removing over five tons of refuse from the open OHV area. We also partner to complete challenging OHV recoveries. HC4W members have generously shared their time, expertise, and equipment to help the CRVFO maintain clean and safe OHV trails.

The HC4W proposed a new rock crawling trail in the Silt Mesa Extensive Recreation Management Area (ERMA). The proposal is for a roughly 1.2-mile trail that leads into the Grand Hogback drainage. Our Interdisciplinary Team has scoped the proposed trail and identified a single issue. The proposed trail is in an area that is classified with a high potential fossil yield. Therefore, we require that a paleontological survey be conducted to determine if any fossils within the proposed route are scientifically significant.

The CRVFO recognizes that the proposed trail, close to the Town of Silt and I-70 Exit 97, would provide a unique 4x4 experience not found anywhere else within the field office. The Town of Silt authorizes and allows OHVs to operate on the town streets, and Garfield County allows OHVs on the Peach Valley Road to provide easy access to the Silt Mesa ERMA. The proposed trail would provide locals and visitors alike with a great opportunity for a rock crawling 4x4 experience.

We hope that the committee will support HC4W's request for a paleontological survey so that the CRVFO can proceed with our National Environmental Policy Act analysis of the proposed trail. We value our partnership with HC4W and appreciate their work to provide legal and sustainable 4x4 opportunities for the local community and visitors.

The Town of Silt has enacted policies and ordinances that support OHV use on our Town streets and successfully lobbied Garfield County to do the same with roads north of Town leading to the Bureau of Land Management's Silt Mesa Extensive Recreation Management Area (EMRA), also known locally as "Squirrel Valley".

The Town has also endeavored to find new ways to attract additional outdoor recreational tourists to our area.

When we learned of the Hi Country 4-Wheeler's effort to develop a "new rock crawling trail" at Squirrel Valley, we were thrilled. The 1.2-mile proposed trail that leads into the Grand Hogback drainage would be a welcome addition to the recreational offerings of our area.

The Town of Silt sales tax revenues and its OHV enthusiasts stand to benefit from this new attraction. It would provide a fun 4x4 experience for this region and potentially attract some from elsewhere to stay in our hotels, eat in our restaurants and shop in our stores.
