Project Description:

The project work would be performed in those portions of Clear Creek Ranger District (CCRD) of the Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forests and Pawnee National Grassland (ARP) located in Gilpin County at the Columbine OHV Parking Area (39.812272, -105.540231) for the Forest Service Road system to Yankee Hill/St. Mary's Area. We are the closest National Forest and Motorized Recreation area to the western suburbs of the Denver Metro Area, located approximately 25 miles from the Denver metropolitan area.

The Yankee Hill/St. Mary's Area is a popular destination for OHV enthusiasts, offering many miles of unique and challenging OHV routes ranging in elevation from 7,500 feet to over 13,000 feet. As Colorado's population continues to grow, the numbers of OHV users continue to increase in the Front Range demonstrating the need to promote, educate, and improve sanitation conditions for OHV opportunities on the Clear Creek Ranger District.

In particular, Columbine OHV Parking Area located at **39.812272**, **-105.540231** is one of our most utilized areas for parking and access to the National Forest. The Clear Creek Ranger District (CCRD) of the Arapaho/Roosevelt National Forests is seeking funding for installing 4 portable toilets (including one Accessible toilet) at this location to help reduce and mitigate litter, of both garbage and human waste, to help ensure the safety of the public and the protection of the surrounding natural resources.

Furthermore, the focus of the grant and proposed plan is to provide interim facilities for the public while the district looks to provide a more developed/permanent facility when funding allows. This coincides with the increasing number of users we host in the Clear Creek Ranger District each season. With coordination and assistance from volunteers, contracted porta-potty companies, and the CCRD OHV crew, we hope to see a reduction of litter and human waste in the area. This will reduce the time spent at trailheads performing maintenance and increase trail work while improving resource conditions overall.

WHO?

USDA Forest Service. Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forest and Pawnee Grasslands. Clear Creek Ranger District, Idaho Springs CO. Work to be performed by the CCRD OHV crew, local clubs and organizations associated with the adoption of Columbine trail systems, and contracted installation and pumping company(s). The CCRD OHV crew is responsible for the implementation of the project.

WHERE?

The location of the project is approximately **39.812272**, **-105.540231** at the Columbine trailhead and staging area in Gilpin County. The Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forest and Pawnee Grasslands. The USDA Clear Creek Ranger District and associated club organizations are responsible for the maintenance, patrolling, and general upkeep for this location.

WHAT?

The main goal(s) for this project are to ensure that the public has a place to go to the bathroom and dispose of trash to protect resources. To install interim 4 porta-potties at parking area along with a bear proof dumpster on site. To be pumped 1-2 weekly. Build fencing to reinforce and protect facilities and surrounding land. Creating a 10x10 area for bathrooms and a 5x5 area for a dumpster.

WHEN?

Project will begin in the 2025 season beginning in May and ending in October. Timeline for project is 5-6 months.

 Reduce litter, improve public health and sanitation, improve aesthetics, and protect ongoing OHV access to the Yankee Hill trail system.

How will the project protect or improve riding opportunities?

• It will help mitigate ongoing issues with human waste and litter within the trail systems, parking areas, and help mitigate conflicts with nearby developed sites.

Will it provide essential maintenance to keep OHV riding opportunities available?
 Please describe maintenance history for this specific area.

There currently are no restroom or trash services at this site. Installation of porta potties
and trash service will, overall, reduce general maintenance of the immediate area and the
entire route system.

 Describe how this project will foster and promote a satisfactory and challenging riding opportunity for OHV enthusiasts?

• This will help provide essential amenities for public use encouraging the proper disposal of human waste and litter, creating a cleaner and sanitary environment for all users. Encouraging the "keep it Clean" and "Leave no Trace" principles.

Why is this project a priority at this time?

- With increasing usage each season and the increasing amount of human waste and litter, it is a top priority to not only provide the proper amenities for the public but to create dialog and education efforts to encourage a cleaner resource.
- Provide an estimate of how many and what types of OHV enthusiasts will benefit from the project?
 - All users, both in the parking area and the road/trail systems surrounding. This project will benefit thousands of OHV users of all types.

Describe how this project will provide long term value and sustainability?

 Adding interim amenities to the Columbine parking area will help to protect the resource and educate the public about sanitation and "Leave No Trace" principles. We have already installed a Kiosk with a map, emergency information, proper trail etiquette, and registration information. The district is looking to provide more developed facilities as funding allows in the future.

2. Partnerships, Support and Leverage (25 points):

The OHV crew will complete basic maintenance work and patrols at the Columbine Parking Area while making public contacts, providing information, and OHV related education to help provide the public with the proper tools they need to keep the area and natural resource protected. The Columbine parking area is the main starting point for OHV users for the Yankee Hill trail system. This project is supported by COHVCO, NOHVCC, Stay the Trail, CO 4x4 Girls, 4x4 Rescue and Recovery, and the Clear Creek Ranger District.

These groups regularly contribute hundreds of hours of volunteer time to help maintain their adopted areas and assist with planning/identifying future projects. CCRD is committed to our volunteer program as they provide invaluable presence on public land, model and promote appropriate riding behavior and provide education and information messages to all who use public lands.

The CCRD OHV crew provides critical oversight, safety briefings and project planning for Adopt-a-Road Volunteer groups. Volunteer projects at this site will include trash removal, fence construction, monitoring, maintenance, and rehabilitation of impacted areas. The heavily used parking area currently suffers from human waste, litter, vandalism, and resource damage.

 - Agencies, groups, clubs involved: 4x4 Rescue and Recovery, CO 4x4 Girls, CO SidexSide, Stay the Trail, and the Clear Creek Ranger District.
- Are you aware of any controversy this proposed project has caused, if at all, in the local community?
 - There is no controversy related to this project.

 - USFS to support \$1000 of material funds for protective fencing surrounding facilities.
 - Volunteer support of approximately 100 hours(\$2995.00) of labor for fence construction and maintenance.

3. Resource Protection, Enhancement and Restoration relative to eligible OHV grant activities (25 points):

The main focus of this project is to help with mitigating human waste, litter, and alleviate conflicts at nearby developed recreation sites. With the increase in usage of this area, it is imperative to establish this site with proper facilities such as kiosk/signage, trash receptacles, and bathrooms. It is important to encourage, through education and enforcement, proper use of the area. This project will promote the protection, clean up, and rehabilitation of sensitive environmental natural resources, wildlife, and overall public safety and sanitation.

- Providing interim restrooms for the public to use will help mitigate human waste in the parking area and surrounding trail system, until a more permanent facility can be provided.
- Providing a dumpster for public use will help eliminate trash around the parking area and trail system.
- Adding public contact to help enforce and educate regarding sanitation and littering while having facilities available will help create an essence of place and a sense of protecting the natural environment.
- With volunteer club involvement (i.e. presence at parking area, trash hauls, reporting) we can help reduce impacts to the resource.

- Will this project promote the protection, clean up, rehabilitation or avoidance of sensitive environmental resources such as wildlife habitat or wetlands in the project area? If so, explain how.
 - YES. By providing proper facilities (bathrooms and Dumpster) will significantly reduce the amount of litter, trash, and resource damage in the area. Providing these amenities will help engage the public with the tools they need along with education and public contact efforts.
- Will the project include re-vegetation of eroded areas or trail that will promote the long-term protection of sensitive or critical resources? If so, explain how.
 - Yes. Short term it will naturally regenerate growth, with a long-term plan to include revegetation of areas along with fencing as needed.
- Describe any indirect benefits this project proposal will have on critical resources in the project area.
 - This project will clean up the overall route system by providing a critical resource at the main access point by encouraging users to dispose of waste in the provided receptacles.

4. Travel Management Plan Implementation, Education and Enforcement (25 points):

Travel Management.

- This project will employ multiple management measures to ensure public safety and compliance. Along with educational and interpretation tools to help provide information to the public, enforcement efforts will be made with public contact and signage.
- Additional fencing and signage will be put in place to help assist with education and compliance literature.
- With the support of club organizations and Stay the Trail regular maintenance and clean-ups will be conducted throughout the riding season.
- Being in close proximity to the Yankee Hill OHV route system having proper facilities for trash and restrooms will decrease abandoned trash and human waste throughout the parking area and road system throughout Clear Creek County and Gilpin County corridor.
- This area will be monitored frequently with the help of volunteer groups, Law Enforcement, and the CCRD OHV crew addressing the increase usage and issues.
- Creating a more sustainable parking area and surrounding environment, with added facilities, will help stay in line with user needs and create a more enjoyable riding experience.

Education, Enforcement and Compliance Activities:

- Creating and implementing more educational components at parking areas helps increase
 the probability of reaching a larger demographic of users creating a safer and more enjoyable
 riding experience, while caring for the resource.
- Education will involve use of interpretation tools and techniques including, public outreach, signage, and compliance checks.
 - Public outreach will include both formal presentations and informal Ranger talks at the parking area. Educational and regulatory signage will be installed to encourage proper use. Compliance checks with all users will ensure regulations are followed.
 - These activities will help create an "Essence of Place" for users, catering to the needs and personality of all riders
 - "Essence of Place" creates a bond between the user and the resource which ultimately will benefit longevity of OHV riding opportunities.

- Site development
- Acquisitions that involve condemnation
- Insurance (except Title Insurance)
- Any work that is not directly relevant to trail development or acquisition
- Facilities that are ornamental and/or do not have a direct benefit to trail users
- Any applicant that is not in compliance with the terms and/or conditions of a prior and/or **existing** grant from the State Trails Program

An Off-Highway Vehicle Grant Application requires supplemental information for land acquisitions, land leases, or easement purchase proposals.








Figure 2: Parking Area, FSR739.1 access. Campground




Figure 4: Prox. of PARKING to Route. Red, route from parking to OHV. Blue, Route system.




Figure 5: Yankee Hill & Columbine OHV

Letter of Support for Facilities at Columbine OHV Parking Area

To whom it may concern.....

In the summer of 2022 COHVCO, along with NOHVCC and the Forest Service, used the Columbine OHV Parking Area as a base of operations for one of their Great Trails Training days. The parking area is only a few years old but has become very popular due to its location near the Denver metropolitan area and the fact that it is easily accessible on a short dirt road drive out of Central City.

At the time of the Great Trails training, the facility was basically just a parking lot with no other amenities. As part of the training activities we discussed how popular the facility had become and some needed improvements. A Kiosk was brought up (that has since been installed) and the need for restroom and trash facilities. A quick look around in the nearby trees was all it took to see that those facilities were indeed very much needed. At the end of the training day we unfortunately witnessed an event that made it extremely clear as to how badly toilets were needed.

Event brief.....

As we were standing around talking at the end of the training we heard a heated argument coming from some of the vehicles parked nearby in the Columbine OHV facility. Pat Shaw immediately went to investigate. What had happened was that a family who had been trail riding in a SidexSide had stopped at the Columbine Camp ground just down the road so the mother and daughters could use the restroom facilities. This practice of trail users driving into the campground and using the facilities had resulted in complaints about the noise and use of the bathrooms from the paying campers. This particular family was told by the Camp Host that the campground facilities were not for day users of the trails and was asked to leave. That exchange became heated and had moved from the Campground down to the Columbine OHV parking area.

Unfortunately the exchange became volatile enough that the Police were called to help with the situation. It ended with no ticketing or arrests but discussions with the Campground host, Police, Brant, and Pat made it clear that this was not the first time law enforcement had been called to help calm a situation regarding using the campground restrooms.

This is clearly not a situation any of us want to see continue. Getting restroom and possibly trash facilities into this well used parking area needs to be prioritized and as Chairman of COHVCO I told Brant and Pat that COHVCO would be happy to support any effort they deemed appropriate to resolve the problem. Fortunately the solution may be as simple as getting a sufficient OHV grant to support restroom and trash facilities being located and maintained in the area.

Please view this letter as full support on the part of COHVCO for the Clear Creek Forest District to get an OHV grant to support the placement and maintenance of facilities in the Columbine OHV Parking area until such time as a more permanent solution is developed.

Dear Subcommittee Members:

Please accept this letter as support of the National Off-Highway Vehicle Conservation Council (NOHVCC) for the Clear Creek Ranger District of the Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forest to receive funding to purchase and install amenities at the Columbine OHV Trailhead located near Columbine Campground. NOHVCC is a 501c3 nonprofit organization that exists to promote a positive future for off-highway vehicle (OHV) recreation. We work towards this mission by creating educational resources and training that promote sustainable and responsible OHV recreation.

In July 2022 NOHVCC collaborated with the Colorado Off-Highway Vehicle Coalition (COHVCO) and the Clear Creek Ranger District to hold a Great Trails Workshop, on the District. This Workshop was staged out of the Columbine OHV trailhead. While many locals know the name and location of the trailhead, you will struggle to find it on maps or mapping applications. This is because the Forest Service had to create the trailhead with little time or resources to make it a fully developed parking area. The county and local private landowners were concerned with improper parking and trespassing that was taking place in the area and vowed to act. This could have meant a major loss of access to the Yankee Hill Trail System for local riders. While the Forest Service took commendable action to maintain access, they still need support to turn the Columbine OHV Trailhead into a quality take off point for OHV enthusiasts.

Currently the trailhead is a large fenced off dirt surface with little development. Since our workshop, the District has worked with Stay the Trail to install an educational kiosk with maps, but there are no other amenities present. This is an extremely popular staging area that is easy to access from Denver. The popularity of the area mixed with the lack of services has led to human waste and garbage around the perimeter of the parking area creating not only an unsightly mess but also public health and sanitation issues. There have been instances where the additional traffic through Columbine Campground from riders trying to use bathroom facilities has created conflict. The District's grant request to purchase and install portable toilets and dumpsters at the site will reduce conflict, improve public health and sanitation, improve aesthetics, and protect ongoing OHV access to the Yankee Hill Trail System.
