WHO?

WSATVA is an all-volunteer 501(c)(7) nonprofit organization that will provide subcontractors, volunteers to maintain OHV trails in Grand Mesa Uncompandere and Gunnison National Forests (GMUG) in 2024 and 2025.

WHERE?

This project will maintain trails as designated by the USFS in the Grand Mesa, Uncompaghre and Gunnison National Forests.

WHAT?

The reason for this grant request is to provide needed ongoing trail maintenance. The grant is not meant to compete with any land manager's applications but is meant to supplement the trail work done by federal land managers. Work will consist of maintenance on existing approved OHV routes.

WORK?

Work will be selected and prioritized during a scheduled annual preseason meeting with local clubs and area land managers. It is to substitute for what clubs won't be able to do or can't do based on insurance requirements and the physical ability of volunteering club members. While clubs may be able to work on trails under the volunteer agreement they will have to have, if even available, special training to operate a tractor or other power equipment which will reduce their participation tremendously. While the trails are in good shape now, for the most part they require constant maintenance for normal use and weather that has a great influence on their condition, like muddy wet trails during the hunting season or blow downs to name a few. Another factor to keep in mind is the problems the Land Managers are having with the hiring process. While this district is adding a couple of full-time positions, it is still an unknown and this grant can work as a buffer for voids that may occur. The wors case scenario is that everything works well and we get a lot of needed trail maintenance done. Remember the commitment to the travel management plan is to maintain existing OHV approved trails.

This grant is for WSATVA to hire a sub-contractor that is familiar with and has worked with the FS in the past. They know the standards of the FS and there is a minimal learning curve. All training of staff to operate equipment is the responsibility of the contractor and is not part of this grant.

The trails to be maintained are on the Grand Mesa and Uncompandere. The area of these trails are Grand Mesa, Uncompaghre National Forests.

Work will consist of maintenance on existing approved OHV routes. Work will be selected and prioritized during a scheduled annual preseason meeting with local club (WSATVA) and area land managers to decide the final trails and workloads to be done. We won't know the exact trails to be worked on that far out. The trails in that area will be determined in spring, 2024 and may include Monument Trail (#518) and other trails and roads as determined by agreed upon parties. The club will administer the grant and report to the Land manager as needed.

Why is this project a priority at this time? By keeping trails maintained it is safer and cheaper then repairing trails that are neglected and more difficult to repair. Also because of the aging of the club, volunteer club members will not be able to do the physical work they have done in the past that helps with trail maintenance along with increased restrictions of working on the trails (IE: chainsaw training, ATV trailing, big machine training, trailer towing, first aid, etc.). Some of the required FS training are not always available to the clubs.

Thousands of OHV users travel these trails in the Grand Mesa and Uncompanding areas. Many of the trails have been adopted by the WSATVA's Adopt-a-trail volunteer agreement with the Forest Service. Other multi users such as equestrian, hiking, mountain biking. Motorcycle, 4x4s and ATV and UTV users WHO ALL USE THE TRAILS ON the National Forests.

It is to substitute for what clubs won't be able to do or can't do based on insurance and requirements and physical ability of the volunteering club members. While clubs may be able to work on trails under the volunteer agreement they will have to have, if even available, special training to operate heavy equipment or other power equipment which will reduce their participation tremendously. For clarity, this grant has to meet the Forest Service requirements because they have to give final approval of the job. The intent is to partner with the Forest Service in writing the agreement with the subcontractor – together. Again, to re-emphasize, using subcontractors is not new and the subcontractors we are working with currently are working with or have worked under contract with the Forest Service.

These trails are also maintained by the volunteers of WSATVA under the adopt-a-trail program. Most important is the volunteers are first on the trails, clearing them of dead fall and making them passable. They also are the eyes as to what priority is needed in fixing or maintaining those trails. This assists land managers to help prioritize their work program. The adopt a trail volunteers are also on call when unexpected wind storms or wash-outs happen that can be handled by hand tools and small power tools.

These are all approved OHV multi use trails and by maintaining them it provides an enjoyable experience in traveling in and through our National Forests

By using a subcontractor, the above requirements are not needed because they maintain and house all the equipment.









Please accept this letter from me as a former OHV subcommittee member of over 28 years as an official letter of support for the WSATVA OHV sub-contractor grant for the 2024-2025 grant season.

The reason I support this grant request is because it is a solution to the existing problems that have not been solved. The biggest problem is the ability for the clubs to get insurance to work on trails. And based on the latest meetings and feedback from clubs, it is almost impossible to get insurance for working on trails.

This grant is to use a sub-contractor that can get insurance and in this grant the estimates given are from contractors that currently work for the FS or have in the past. Using contractors is nothing new. This grant is **not** competition to the FS but support for voids that may occur in their hiring process and would do work the clubs will no longer be able to do because of the restrictions and the average age of these clubs. Most members are in their late sixties or older. This club turns in over three thousand volunteer hours a year and if they cannot work on the trails like in the past because of insurance and additional training, this is a solution to fill that void. If there are other options, I have not heard of any through the countless meetings we have sat through. This type of program is a partnership that allows the clubs to stay involved as they will oversee the contractor. Rampart Range has been doing a similar program for over 18 years.

WSATVA still plans to collaborate with the volunteer agreement to remove fallen trees, clear water bars and basic trail clearing (Adopt a Trail). They do an excellent job of working with the Grand Valley Ranger District and Ouray Ranger District and this program would assist needed trail maintenance without competing with existing FS grants. Together this program provides the important consistency in trail maintenance on the GMUG. The sub-contractor grant that WSATV received this past year has been working very well.

It is our understanding that this grant would specifically target Monument Trail (#518) and other trails in that area that need trail maintenance. Together this program provides the very important consistency in trail maintenance on the GMUG.

I support a program such as the grant application that WSATVA is applying for. This program would increase funding to do routine trail maintenance knowing that clubs cannot do what they have done in the past because of insurance along with the ongoing hiring problems the FS has. I do not see any changes for next year except hiring one or two full time people and that does not solve the hiring issues for the Good Management crews and other support crews.

I support the concept of this grant application for WSATVA and would like to see move innovative and collaborative efforts like this in the future.
