## **Project Description:**

The Grand Valley Good Management Trail crew (GV GM Trail Crew) will develop, maintain, and improve OHV trails, trailheads, parking and support facilities; reconstruct OHV trails and related facilities; produce, install and maintain signage for OHV trails and support facilities; develop, deliver and provide education and rider ethics training to the OHV riding community; maintain, supply and operate facilities owned by the Forest Service that are used by OHV recreationist; implement approved federal travel management plans; and provide a field presence for visitor contacts, compliance and enforcement by authorized good management programs.

The field season, starting in mid-May, will prioritize collaboration with local OHV volunteer clubs. The crew will ensure trails are clear of obstructions, drains are functioning properly, and signs are maintained. The season starts on the Uncompandere National Forest, moving to the Grand Mesa National Forest by early summer. The crew will coordinate with the local OHV clubs, (WSATVA, TMW, MTRA) for efficient work prioritization and volunteer project assistance. A continued focus on trail maintenance and signage will occur through the month of September, at which point the focus will turn to contributing to a presence during the busy hunting season.

The local OHV clubs are an important part of this crew's success. The volunteer efforts by these clubs allows for an efficient clearing of trails and prioritization of trail projects. The crew will continue supporting our local motorized partner groups such as Western Slope ATV Association, Thunder Mountain Wheelers, and Motorcycle Trail Riders Association during volunteer workdays and trail projects. In addition to working alongside local OHV partners, the crew will also help the OHV Heavy equipment crew on larger trail projects where extra hands are needed.

Two other integral partners, we have continued to work closely with in accomplishing OHV work, are the Ouray Ranger District OHV Crew and the Grand Junction Field Office BLM OHV trail crew. Having another local crew with OHV skills to collaborate with on larger projects has been very beneficial to the success of larger trail projects.

Additionally, the GV GM Trail crew will provide on-the-job training for 4-6 District hosted Youth Conservation Corp students for approximately two weeks, focusing on larger maintenance projects on motorized single-track trails. Not only is this helpful in accomplishing larger trail projects but we strive to engage young natural resource career candidates for future employment.

During peak times, such as major holidays and hunting season, the GV GM Trail crew will serve as agency presence in the field to educate and enforce users on OHV registrations, travel management policy, trail conditions, user etiquette, etc. The district is heavily impacted during these times by all recreating users, with the majority of them arriving with OHVs.

## Program Funding Acknowledgement -

As we chat with users on the trail, education events, and volunteer projects we recognize and educate folks that the work is only possible by the support of this program and goes directly back

into the trails they are enjoying. In addition, we post "OHV dollars at work" stickers and signs at popular OHV trailheads, OHV trails, and on grant funded equipment.



## E-1 Vicinity Map & E-2 Project Site Map





# Grand Valley Good Management Trail Crew Work Plan <u>2024</u> Objectives

- Identify needs, order, and install signing to ensure "on the ground" signage is consistent with travel maps to ensure
   OHV opportunities are clearly identified and easily located.
- Work closely with partners and volunteers to assist their volunteer efforts. Specifically focus on MTRA, WSATVA, and TMW weekend work parties as needed to ensure that their efforts are supported.
- In addition to conducting trail maintenance (clearing, drainage, etc.) by hand, the crew will also identify larger maintenance issues that will need heavy equipment.
- The crew will be utilized, in addition to other district personnel, to perform education and enforcement of OHV regulations during holiday weekends and through the fall hunting seasons.

### **Targets**

- Continue clearing down trees and vegetation as soon as possible in the spring/early summer. Focus will be on the trails
  not already adopted/cleared by the volunteer groups.
- Focus on drainage of water crossings that turn into mini mud bogs to create hardened crossings that improve water quality and protect wetlands.
- OHV crew will support and work with our Heavy Equipment Crew where needed on larger areas of work.
- Continue to install ATV Cattleguards as they are a positive step to resolve conflicts between Grazing Permittees and the ATV public. Consult with the Grazing Permittee prior to installation to ensure that the end product will be adequate to curb cattle access.
- Education/Enforcement of Forest Service travel regulations and State OHV permit requirements. Patrols will focus on the three holiday weekends and during the fall big game hunting seasons.

#### **Areas Of Focus:**

## Grand Mesa- work to be accomplished August-September

- Assess and prioritize drainage and corridor clearing needs on 50" or less trails during early season clearing with local OHV clubs.
- Work with WSATVA to install 6 cattle guards along Powerline trail #520
- Work with Heavy Equipment Crew to beef up rock apron on culvert install on Owen's loop #539
- Corridor Clearing on Boundary Trail #525
- Motorized Single Track trails focus:
  - o Point Camp #725- 2 water crossing bogs need hardening.

#### Uncompangre Plateau- work to be accomplished May-July

- Assess and prioritize drainage and corridor clearing needs on 50" or less trails during early season clearing with local OHV clubs.
- Motorized Single Track trails focus-
  - Upper bench #625- Corridor clearing/line of site mitigation. Boardwalk construction for crossing bogs, harden creek crossing at cabin.
    - Use of volunteers, YCC students, and Range departments horse packing crew to aid project efforts.
  - Long Canyon #621- 2 water crossing bogs need hardening, install trail drainage, and clear corridor. report of landslide blocking trail.
  - Divide Forks Cutoff #639- work with BLM on constructing drains on top 2 miles where there is heavy trenching with use of their 300 Sutter.
  - Big Creek Scout #618- reinstall CG that has been pushed to side.

#### Fruita Division- work to be accomplished in May

- 50" or less Routes (#646, #648) were worked by dozer 2021, so we will monitor effectiveness of structures, and effectiveness of gate installed next to 50" restrictor.
  - o Buck and rail install to block satellite trails.

## **Education and Travel Management**

- Attend the Offroad expo in June put on by local Jeep club alongside Stay the Trail and the BLM to outreach and educate motorized users.
- Ensure all travel management gates/restrictors are properly marked with travel management signs and object/hazard markers and installed properly to prevent damage caused by winter motorized travel/other users.

#### **Volunteer Projects**

WSATVA: Work with club on their scheduled projects in the listed areas and tentative dates. Work typically includes
cattleguard install, hardening cattleguard approaches, trail clearing, and restrictor installs.

Uncompangre- 5/20-5/26

High Tower- 6/24-6/30

Vega 7/22-7/28

- MTRA: Work with club on early season clearing and schedule another couple dates to help with board walk install on Upper Bench
- TMW: Work with club on early season clearing. Dozer crew works heavily with this club on any trail maintenance they perform on the club's adopted trails. Typically, several weeks in July/August.

#### **2024 Improvements:**

- Continue to engage the motorcycle club in trail projects.
- Continue to collaborate with BLM on motorcycle trails that could use heavy equipment. Work on fostering heavy
  equipment experience on GV GM trail crew, to build those skills.
- Collaborate with BLM OHV Crew on BLM Land in the early season.
