- Changing the hunting restriction start date at Crawford State Park to after Labor Day.
- Changing the waterfowl hunting restriction start date at Sweitzer Lake to after Labor Day.
- Broadening the goose hunting closure on Grand Lake and Windy Gap Reservoirs to be an all waterfowl hunting closure.

- Removing San Luis Lake SWA from the camping reservation system.
- Clarifying waterfowl hunting closure regulations on Turks Pond SWA.
- Adding a new SWA, Wind in the Willows SWA with associated provisions.
- Creating general provisions and hatchery-specific regulations for State Fish Units within the state.
- Modifications to property-specific regulations within Division Areas 3 and 4, to provide consistency and clarity.
- Closing the western portion of the Maybell State Trust Land (STL) to vehicles and prohibiting camping on the entire Maybell STL.
- Enrolling Whetstone Mountain STL into the Public Access Program with associated provisions.

FINAL REGULATIONS- CHAPTER W-0 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

ARTICLE I - DEFINITIONS

#000 – The following definitions supplement the statutory definitions found in the Wildlife Act including, but not limited to, those definitions found in section 33-1-102, C.R.S.

A. General Definitions Including Manner of Take Definitions

1. **"Aggregate"** when applied to bag and possession limits, means the total number of species which are covered by such bag and possession limits. Any combination of the species may be possessed up to the total number established as the aggregate bag and possession limits.
 2. **"Air gun"** means any rifle or handgun .177 caliber or larger firing pellets, slugs, or round ball ammunition powered by high pressure air or compressed inert gas. This includes devices referred to as pellet guns or pneumatic weapons.
 3. **"Archery"** means the use of a hand-held bow.
 4. **"Bag Limit"** means the maximum number of wildlife which may be taken in a single day during an established open season. This includes any wildlife which are consumed or donated during the same day they were legally taken. The terms "bag limit," "daily bag" and "bag" are considered to have the same meaning.
 5. **"Baiting"** means the placing, exposing, depositing, distributing, or scattering of any salt, mineral, grain, or other feed so as to constitute a lure, attraction or enticement for wildlife.
 6. **"Crossbow"** means a bow which is attached at a right angle to a stock with a mechanical mechanism for holding the bow string in a cocked position and fired from the shoulder.
 7. **"Feral Hog"** means any species or hybrid of species from the family *Suidae* (European boar, Eurasian boar, Russian boar, feral hog) or the family *Tayassuidae* (Javelina and peccary), which possesses one or more morphological characteristic distinguishing it from domestic swine including, but not limited to, an elongated snout, visible tusks, muscular shoulders with small hams and short loins, coarse hair, or a predominant ridge of hair along its back. For the purposes of these regulations, any swine running at large which possesses one or more of the above characteristics, may be presumed to be a feral hog, unless a person has received actual notice that the swine has escaped containment and its return is actively sought, in which case the person should report its location to the owner, if known, and the Division and the Department of Agriculture.
 8. **"Handgun"** means any pistol or revolver having no shoulder stock or attachment.
 9. **"Hand-held bow"** means a long bow, recurved bow, or compound bow on which the string is not drawn mechanically or held mechanically under tension. String releases or mechanical releases which are hand-drawn and hand-held with no other attachment or connection to the bow other than to the bowstring are lawful devices.
10. **Licenses**
- a. **"Leftover license"** means a limited license which is leftover after the primary application and drawing process.

- b. **"Limited license"** means any license which is limited in number by regulation and which is issued through the drawing process.
 - c. **"Over the counter license"** means a license that may be purchased at a license agent. Most over the counter licenses are unlimited in number, but some may have an established cap.
 - d. **"Private Land Only license"** means a limited license valid only for use on private land and State Trust Lands not leased by the Division, excluding those limited licenses issued as part of the Ranching for Wildlife program. Contact the State Land Board for access restrictions.
 - e. **"Unlimited license"** means a hunting license and carcass tag when appropriate which is not restricted in quantity and which is sold by license agents throughout the state and is not valid in any unit where licenses are available only through application and computer or hand drawn selection.
11. **"Mentor"** means a person eighteen years of age or older who holds a valid hunter education certificate or who was born before January 1, 1949, and accompanies a youth or apprentice while hunting. A person whose hunting and fishing license privileges are suspended can not be a mentor.
 12. **"Muzzle-loading rifle or musket"** means a firearm fired from the shoulder, with a single barrel which fires a single patched round ball or bullet.
 13. **"Pre-charged pneumatic air gun"** means an air gun that is charged from an external high compression source such as an air compressor, air tank, or external hand pump.
 14. **"Private use"** means the possession of wildlife only for private enjoyment and not intended to be sold, traded, bartered, or entered into commerce.
 15. **"Privately-owned game birds"** means game birds held in private ownership and otherwise acquired in accordance with Commission regulations.
 16. **"Processed meat"** means those edible parts of wildlife which have been cut into normal portions and wrapped for storage. It does not include game meat that is whole, has been quartered, or has not been packaged into normally accepted butcher's portions including but not limited to steaks, roasts, loins, chops, and ground meat.
 17. **"Rifle"** means a firearm fired from the shoulder, with a rifled bore, having a barrel length of sixteen (16) inches or more and a minimum overall length of twenty-six (26) inches.
 18. **"Shotgun"** means a firearm fired from the shoulder with a smooth bore, having a barrel length of eighteen (18) inches or more and a minimum overall length of twenty-six (26) inches.
 19. **"Slingbow"** means a hand-held device, not drawn or held mechanically, with the arms or attachment points to which an elastic band is attached for propelling an arrow. The term also includes string releases or mechanical releases which are hand-drawn and hand-held with no other attachment or connection to the slingbow other than to the bowstring. Wrist-brace attachments are considered normal components of a slingbow.
 20. **"Slingshot"** means a hand-held device, not drawn or held mechanically, with the arms or attachment points to which an elastic band is attached for propelling small stones or metal projectiles. Wrist-brace attachments and non-elastic projectile pouches are considered normal components of a slingshot.

21. **“State Trust Lands”** means those lands owned or under the control of the State Board of Land Commissioners.

B. Definitions related to Aquatic Species or Fish Health

1. **“Aquatic Nuisance Species” (ANS)** means exotic or nonnative aquatic wildlife or any plant species that have been determined by the Commission to pose a significant threat to the aquatic resources or water infrastructure of the state.
2. **“Best management practices”** means the most effective, practicable (including technological, economic, constructible, and institutional considerations) means of preventing or minimizing the presence or spread of ANS, parasites, or diseases in a fish production facility.
3. **“Certification”** means a document issued by the Division certifying that the facility and the fish located thereon, have been tested for regulated fish pathogens in the numbers and by methods meeting the minimum standards established by these regulations, or any analogous document issued by a qualified fish health official from a recognized state, federal, or foreign fish and wildlife agency.
4. **“Coldwater stream”**- means a segment or reach of a creek, stream, or river that has water temperatures that do not exceed 68 degrees F for 24 consecutive hours.
5. **“Critical Habitat”**- means the following river reaches and their 100 year floodplains: the Gunnison River downstream of the Uncompahgre River confluence, the Colorado River downstream of the exit 90 north bridge from I-70, the White River downstream of Rio Blanco Dam, the Green River downstream of the Yampa River confluence, and the Yampa River downstream of the Colo 394 bridge.
6. **“Direct connection”** means waters in the Upper Colorado River Basin that flow directly into critical habitat. This does not include reservoirs, and waters above such reservoirs, where fish escapement has been addressed according to a management plan approved by the Division.
7. **“Drainages”**- means sub-sets of the USGS hydrologic code system as set forth in the Hydrologic Unit Maps (U.S. Geological Survey Water Supply Paper 2294, U.S. Dept. of Interior U.S. Geological Survey, 1974, State of Colorado section reprinted 1992). This document, but not later amendments or editions, have been incorporated by reference and can be viewed and copies obtained at the Division as set forth in the “Incorporated References” section of Chapter 0 of these regulations.
8. **“Food Production Facility”** – means any operation which raises or produces fish or crustacean for the purpose of human consumption that the Division, after consultation with the Colorado Fish Health Board, has determined possesses a biosecurity plan and ensures that such fish or crustacean never escapes the facility live.
9. **“Gametes”**- means eggs or sperm.
10. **“Inlets”** - means the bay or recess at the confluence of a stream with the surface of a lake or reservoir.
11. **“Isolated Water”**- means ponds, lakes, or reservoirs that have no outlet.
12. **“Myxobolus cerebralis intensity”** means average spore levels in salmonid fish as determined by standardized testing in accordance with the provisions of #014 Aquatic Wildlife Health Management.

13. **"*Myxobolus cerebralis* negative salmonid fish production facility"** means a facility in which *Myxobolus cerebralis* has never been found or in which *Myxobolus cerebralis* has been eliminated in accordance with the provisions of #014 Aquatic Wildlife Health Management.
14. **"*Myxobolus cerebralis* negative water"** means a lake, pond or coldwater stream segment sampled for a statistically valid number of fish that do not test positive for *Myxobolus cerebralis*, or a water that has not been tested and has not been stocked with salmonid fish from a *Myxobolus cerebralis* positive facility.
15. **"*Myxobolus cerebralis* positive water"** means a lake, pond or coldwater stream segment sampled and found to have salmonids that test positive for *Myxobolus cerebralis*, or which has been stocked with salmonid fish from a *Myxobolus cerebralis* positive facility.
16. **"Myxospore (spore)"** means the stage of *Myxobolus cerebralis* formed in the cartilage of infected fish which re-infects the alternate host, the *Tubifex tubifex* worm.
17. **"Nonsalmonid fish"** - means all species of fish and their hybrids that are not in the family Salmonidae.
18. **"Ordinary high water line"**– means the point where perennial, hydrophytic plant life converges with bare substrate (rock, gravel, sand, fines) or with substrate interspersed with annual vegetation.
19. **"Prevalence"** is the percentage of individuals in a population found to be infected with a pathogen as determined by standardized testing in accordance with the provisions of #014 Aquatic Wildlife Health Management.
20. **"Qualified fish pathologist"** means an individual who meets professional standards as set forth by the CPW and who conducts inspections as set forth in #014 Aquatic Wildlife Health Management.
21. **"Salmonid fish"** - means all species of fish and their hybrids in the family Salmonidae, including but not limited to trout, salmon, char, whitefish, and grayling
22. **"Salmonid fish production facility"** - means one or more lakes, ponds, raceways, tanks or other containers in a single location and under the same ownership and management in which salmonid fish are reared for eventual live shipment or release.
23. **"Salmonid habitat"** means any water that supports, is capable of supporting, or is upstream of a water that supports a self-sustaining population of trout, salmon, char, whitefish, or grayling; and includes the drainages listed in Appendix D.
24. **"Spore concentration technique (SCT)"** means tests conducted according to:
 - a. "*Myxosoma cerebralis*: Isolation and Concentration from Fish Skeletal Element – Sequential Enzymatic Digestion and Purification by Differential Centrifugation", Maria E. Markiw and Ken Wolf, Journal Fisheries Research Board of Canada, Volume 31, No. 1, 1974., or
 - b. "Whirling Disease *Myxobolus cerebralis* Spore Concentration using the Continuous Plankton Centrifuge", Joseph J. O'Grodnick, Journal of Wildlife Diseases Volume 11 pp 54-57, 1975.

These documents, but not later amendments or editions, have been incorporated by reference and can be viewed and copies obtained as set forth in the "Incorporated References" section of Chapter 0 of these regulations.

25. "**Triactinomyxons (TAMS)**" are a stage of *Myxobolus cerebralis* formed in the gut lining of the *Tubifex tubifex* (tubifex) worm, and which are then released into the water column and re-infect fish with *Myxobolus cerebralis*.
26. "**Upper Colorado River Basin**" - means that portion of the Colorado River drainage that lies within the boundaries of the State of Colorado. This includes all waters in the Yampa, White, Gunnison, Dolores, San Juan, and Colorado River basins.
27. "**100-year floodplain**"- for the upper Colorado River Basin means river floodplain 5.5 vertical feet above the ordinary high water line (OHWL).

C. Definitions related to Terrestrial Species or Wildlife Health

1. "**Pelt**" means the skin of a furbearer with pelage intact on the skin.

#012 – POSSESSION OF AQUATIC WILDLIFE

- A. Except as provided in these regulations or authorized by the Division or under Title 33 or Title 35 C.R.S., it shall be unlawful for any person to possess any live native or nonnative aquatic wildlife in Colorado.
- B. No person shall, at any time, have in possession or under their control any wildlife caught, taken or killed outside of this state which were caught, taken or killed at a time, in a manner, for a purpose, or in any other respect which is prohibited by the laws of the state, territory or country in which the same were caught, taken or killed; or which were shipped out of said state, territory or country in violation of the laws thereof.
- C. The following aquatic wildlife may be possessed by any person in the State of Colorado:
 1. Amphibians
 - a. Bullfrogs. Possession of this species is subject to the restrictions set forth in Chapter W-1, #104.H.4 and #107.A.1.m of these regulations.
 - b. Aquatic Gilled forms of Tiger Salamanders. Possession of this species is subject to the restrictions set forth in Chapter W-1, #104.H.4 and #107.A.1.o of these regulations.
 - c. Any amphibians allowed under Chapter W-10, #1000.A.6 of these regulations.
 - d. Any amphibian designated as unregulated wildlife under Chapter W-11, #1103.B of these regulations.
 2. Crustaceans
 - a. The following crustaceans may be possessed east of the Continental Divide:
 - i. Virile Crayfish
 - ii. Waternymph Crayfish
 - iii. Calico Crayfish
 - iv. Ringed Crayfish
 - v. Southern Plains Crayfish
 3. Fish. Possession of these species is subject to the restrictions set forth in Chapter W-1 of these regulations.
 - a. Brown, brook, cutthroat, golden, lake and rainbow trout, and their hybrids
 - b. Arctic char
 - c. Grayling
 - d. Kokanee salmon
 - e. Whitefish
 - f. Sculpin
 - g. Smallmouth, largemouth, spotted, striped, and white bass
 - h. Wipers

- i. Common Carp
- j. Triploid grass carp
- k. Bullhead, blue, channel, and flathead catfish
- l. Black and white crappie
- m. Drum
- n. Northern pike
- o. Tiger muskie
- p. Sacramento and yellow perch, and their hybrids
- q. Sauger and saugeye
- r. Speckled dace
- s. Rainbow smelt^{tt}.
- t. Tench
- u. Walleye
- v. Bluegill and bluegill hybrids
- w. Green, redear and pumpkin-seed sunfish
- x. Gizzard shad
- y. Longnose and white suckers
- z. Fathead minnow
- aa. Families of fish classified Cyprinidae except for bighead carp, black carp, and silver carp.
- bb. Any fish designated as unregulated wildlife under Chapter W-11, #1103.B of these regulations^s.

D. In addition to those species identified in Chapter W-0, #012.C, any Food Production Facility may possess the following aquatic wildlife~~fish~~ in the State of Colorado:

1. Fish

- a. Blue tilapia and their hybrids
- b. Mozambique tilapia and their hybrids
- c. Nile tilapia and their hybrids
- d. Barramundi
- e. Any other fish that the Division, after consultation with the Colorado Fish Health Board determines can securely be kept within a Food Production Facility and which does not present a risk to native species, their habitat, the aquatic environment, or other Food Production Facilities.

2. Crustacea

- a. Redclaw crayfish

E. The possession of any aquatic wildlife in the State of Colorado not listed in this section #012 is unlawful unless otherwise authorized by the provisions of Chapter W-11 of these regulations pertaining to unregulated wildlife, or Chapter W-13 of these regulations ("Possession of Wildlife, Scientific Collecting and Special Licenses"). Any person who takes any fish species from the wild in Colorado not listed in this section may take and possess them year round and in any quantity for personal use, provided that the fish are not listed as nongame, threatened, or endangered under Chapter W-10 and provided that the fish are killed prior to transportation from the point of take.

F. No person shall import, transport, possess, or release any aquatic nuisance species (ANS) except as authorized by the Division or permit issued under Title 35 C.R.S.

Basis and Purpose
Chapter W-0 - General Provisions

Basis and Purpose:

In January 2018, changes to Chapter W- 0, #012.C & D were finalized by the Colorado Parks and Wildlife Commission that established an acceptable possession list of aquatic species, and designated species compatible for food production. However, these regulations did not consider those aquaculture facilities that currently have redclaw crayfish in possession for food production purposes, and the approved regulations only included fish species.

Therefore, the Colorado Parks and Wildlife Commission found, pursuant to 24-4-103(6), C.R.S., that adoption of emergency regulatory changes proposed by agency staff were necessary to ensure the preservation of public health, safety and welfare, specifically to protect the public interest in reducing the loss of redclaw crayfish that are currently possessed legally by food production facilities within the state.

In February 2018, the Colorado Parks and Wildlife Commission finalized the emergency regulations, thereby including redclaw crayfish in the list of species able to be possessed by food production facilities. This final chapter, which was properly noticed under the Administrative Procedures Act, ensures that the emergency regulations passed in February become long-term regulations.

FINAL REGULATIONS - CHAPTER W-2 - BIG GAME

ARTICLE I - GENERAL PROVISIONS

#205 - ANNUAL BAG LIMITS AND MAXIMUM NUMBERS OF LICENSES PER PERSON

- A. Deer, elk, pronghorn, black bear, mountain lion, moose, rocky mountain bighorn sheep, and mountain goat

The annual bag and possession limit for deer, elk, pronghorn, black bear, mountain lion, rocky mountain bighorn sheep, and mountain goat shall be the total number of animals taken on all licenses which can be legally obtained by the hunter for each species during that license year, as established in the following lists. Big game taken during a hunting season established as a portion of the preceding license year's hunting seasons shall be counted as part of the preceding year's bag limit. When a license allows hunting in more than one Game Management Unit, the unit listed in the hunt code on the license shall determine the maximum number of annual licenses a license holder may obtain for that species.

Notwithstanding the ("List A," "List B," "List C") license categories set forth in this regulation, any license that is administratively converted to a private-land-only license as part of the Landowner Preference Program will retain the ("List A," "List B," "List C") status of its original hunt code.

1. Deer
 - a. One License - Any hunter may obtain one deer license.
 - b. Two Licenses - A hunter may obtain two deer licenses if at least one of them is:

 5. a disease management license, if available,

 - 1. an auction or raffle license for rocky mountain bighorn sheep,
 - 2. a special bighorn sheep management license, a special allocation Ranching for Wildlife license for donation to youths or hunters with mobility impairments,
 - 3. a disease management license, if available,
 - 4. a rewards program license (except that a hunter may not be issued more than one Turn In Poachers (TIPS) license per year, as provided in #002(J)).

8. Mountain Goat

- a. One License - Any hunter may obtain one mountain goat license. Provided further that application restrictions in regulation #206 apply.
- b. Any Number of Licenses - A hunter may obtain any number of the following mountain goat licenses:
 - 1. an auction or raffle license for mountain goat,
 - 2. a special mountain goat management license, if available,
 - 3. a disease management license, if available,
 - 4. a rewards program license (except that a hunter may not be issued more than one Turn In Poachers (TIPS) license per year, as provided in #002(J)).

- B. Exceptions to Bag Limit Calculation The following big game animals shall not be counted against an annual bag and possession limit for that species:

1. Accidental Hunter Take: Any big game animal accidentally taken by a hunter, provided that prior to any further hunting the individual self-reports the incident to the Division as soon as practicable and the Division verifies the claim of accidental kill. For the purposes of this regulation an "accidental kill" means any unintentional taking of wildlife not resulting from carelessness or negligence on the part of the hunter.
 - a. Determination of whether the taking involves carelessness or negligence shall be based on a consideration of the totality of circumstance surrounding the taking including but not necessarily limited to, number of shots fired, number of animals present, number of animals killed or wounded, type of firearm or ammunition used, angle and distance of shot, species of animal, topography, ground cover, and light or weather conditions.
2. Accidental Vehicle Kills: Any big game animal accidentally killed by a motor vehicle or train shall not be counted against an annual bag limit for that species.
3. Damage Kills: Any big game animal causing damage and taken under the authority of §33-3-106 C.R.S.
4. Southern Ute Tribal Lands: Any big game animal taken on a Southern Ute Tribal Lands permit.

#207 - SEASON PARTICIPATION

- A. A person may hunt in only one hunting season per license year for each big game species regardless of the method of hunting used, except in accordance with regulations #207B, #207C, and #242A.6 or in #205, when the purchase of more than one license per species is authorized or when the animal taken is not counted against an annual bag limit.
- B. Except on Ranching for Wildlife properties and in GMUs 61, 62 and 512, youths ages 12-17 may participate in any open regularly scheduled antlerless rifle elk or antlerless rifle deer hunt starting after the last day of the season listed on their original license, in the same DAU and for the same species listed on their original license, provided they possess an unfilled limited antlerless or either-sex elk or antlerless deer license originally valid in that same DAU from a season which has already been completed, comply with applicable regulations for the specific open regularly scheduled antlerless rifle hunt in which they participate, and are accompanied by a mentor if under 16 years of age. A mentor must be at least 18 years of age and comply with hunter education requirements. The mentor may not hunt except in units and in seasons for which they possess a valid license. Youths with an unfilled either-sex elk license who wish to hunt in any subsequent antlerless rifle season within the same DAU may do so provided that they must bring their license to the Division and have it converted to an antlerless license for the appropriate species prior to hunting. In GMUs 61 and 62, youth hunters may participate in the extended youth seasons as provided and restricted herein, except youth are further restricted to hunting in the same GMU where their original license was valid.
- C. Youths ages 12-17 may participate in any December pronghorn season in the following GMUs: 110, 111, 112, 113, 114, 115, 116, 117, 118, 119, 120, 121, 122, 123, 124, 125, 126, 127, 128, 129, 130, 132, 133, 134, 135, 136, 137, 138, 139, 140, 141, 142, 143, 144, 145, 146 or 147, provided they possess an unfilled pronghorn doe or either-sex license from a season which has already been completed for any other unit and comply with applicable regulations for the specific hunt in which they participate. Youths with unfilled either-sex pronghorn licenses who wish to hunt in the late youth pronghorn doe hunt may do so provided that they bring their license to the Division and have it converted to a doe pronghorn license prior to hunting.

- D. Any license marked or stamped for a season and unit, or portions thereof, is valid only as marked on the license.
- E. A person may only purchase an over the counter with caps bear license for the concurrent rifle bear season (hunt codes listed in #239.B) if they also possess a deer or elk license for an overlapping game management unit listed on that bear license. A person may hunt bear with an over the counter with caps rifle bear license during any regular rifle deer or elk season west of I-25 or in unit 140, only if they also possess a deer or elk license (filled or unfilled) valid any day of the regular rifle deer or elk seasons. The person may hunt bear in any unit(s) for which their bear license is valid. If the deer or elk license is a Private Land Only license, use of the bear license is restricted to private land as well. The restrictions of this subsection shall not apply to hunt codes BE083P1R, BE084P5R, BE048P5R, BE058P5R, and BE059P5R.
- F. Any person may take coyotes with an unfilled big game license in the same unit and season and by the same manner of take.

FINAL REGULATIONS - CHAPTER W-3 - FURBEARERS and SMALL GAME, EXCEPT MIGRATORY BIRDS

ARTICLE I - GENERAL PROVISIONS

#300 - Definitions

- A. **"Canada Lynx Recovery Area"** means the area of the San Juan and Rio Grande National Forests and associated lands above 9,000 feet extending west from a north-south line passing through Del Norte and east from a north-south line passing through Dolores and from the New Mexico state line north to the Gunnison basin (including Taylor Park east to the Collegiate Range). The GMUs included in the area are: 55, 65, 66, 67, 68, 70, 71, 74, 75, 76, 77, 78, 79, 80, 81, 551, 681, 711 and 751.
- B. **"Furbearers"** means those species with fur having commercial value and which provide opportunities for sport harvest including mink, pine marten, badger, red fox, gray fox, swift fox, striped skunk, western spotted skunk, beaver, muskrat, long-tailed weasel, short-tailed weasel, coyote, bobcat, opossum, ring-tailed cat and raccoon.
- C. **"Live Trap (Cage or Box)"** means a mechanical device designed in such a manner that the animal enters the trap through a door that closes, preventing the animal from exiting.
- D. **"Small game, except migratory birds,"** means:
 - 1. **Game birds**, including dusky grouse, Greater Sage-grouse, Gunnison Sage-grouse, mountain sharp-tailed grouse, white-tailed ptarmigan, pheasant, northern bobwhite, scaled and Gambel's quail, chukar partridge, Greater prairie-chicken and wild turkey; and
 - 2. **Game mammals**, including cottontail rabbit, snowshoe hare, white-tailed and black-tailed jackrabbit, fox squirrel, pine squirrel, marmot, and Abert's squirrel; and
 - 3. **Other small game**, including black-tailed, white-tailed and Gunnison prairie dogs, Wyoming (Richardson's) ground squirrel, prairie rattlesnake, and common snapping turtles.

NOTE: "Migratory Birds" is defined in regulation #500(A).

- E. **"Traps specifically designed not to kill"** means padded, laminated, or off-set steel jawed foothold traps, enclosed foothold, box traps, and cage traps, as conditioned elsewhere in these regulations.

ARTICLE II - SMALL GAME SEASON DATES, UNITS (AS DESCRIBED IN CHAPTER 0 OF THESE REGULATIONS), BAG AND POSSESSION LIMITS, LIMITED LICENSES AND PERMITS

#306 - Cottontail Rabbit, Snowshoe Hare, White-tailed & Black-tailed jackrabbit

- A. Season Dates and Units

No fee shall be required for the inspection and issuance of a legal possession seal, which shall remain attached to the hide until processed. Bobcat hides/pelts shall not be transported, shipped or otherwise taken out of Colorado until the hide(s)/pelt(s) are inspected and sealed. The legal possession seal, when attached to the bobcat or the pelt, shall authorize possession, transportation, and sale thereof. For the purposes of this regulation it is illegal to buy, sell, trade, or barter an untanned bobcat hide/pelt unless a permanent seal is affixed thereto. Only one legal possession seal shall be provided for each hide/pelt.

Basis and Purpose
Chapter W-3 - Small Game - Furbearers

Basis and Purpose:

These regulations amend the date structure for the 2018 hunting seasons for game birds (except migratory birds and turkeys) and all other species considered small game in Colorado and are the result of an annual review. These regulations are necessary to provide small game hunting opportunity and properly manage small game wildlife in Colorado. Small game populations are managed primarily for hunting and watchable wildlife recreational opportunity and to prevent or minimize damage to private property.

The statements of basis and purpose for these regulations can be viewed and copies obtained from the Colorado Division of Parks and Wildlife, Office of the Regulations Manager, Policy and Planning Unit, 1313 Sherman, Room 111, Denver, CO 80203.

The primary statutory authority for these regulations can be found in § 24-4-103, C.R.S., and the state Wildlife Act, §§ 33-1-101 to 33-6-209, C.R.S., specifically including, but not limited to: §§ 33-1-106, C.R.S.

EFFECTIVE DATE - THESE REGULATIONS SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE MAY 1, 2018 AND SHALL REMAIN IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UNTIL REPEALED, AMENDED OR SUPERSEDED.

FINAL REGULATIONS - CHAPTER W-5 - SMALL GAME - MIGRATORY BIRDS**ARTICLE I – GENERAL PROVISIONS****#500 – DEFINITIONS:**

- A. "Migratory birds" means those migratory birds included in the terms and conventions between the United States and any foreign country for the protection of migratory birds.
- B. "Migratory game birds" means sora, Virginia rail, sandhill crane, Wilson's snipe, mourning dove, white-winged dove, band-tailed pigeon, crows, ducks, coots, and geese.
- C. "Waterfowl" means ducks and geese.
- D. "Dark geese" means Canada geese, white-fronted geese, brant, and all other species of geese except light geese.
- E. "Light geese" means snow (including blue) geese, and Ross' geese.
- F. "Manipulation" means the alteration of natural vegetation or agricultural crops by activities that include but are not limited to mowing, shredding, discing, rolling, chopping, trampling, flattening, burning, or herbicide treatments. Manipulation does not include the distributing or scattering of grain, seed, or other feed after removal from or storage on the field where grown.
- G. "Natural vegetation" means any non-agricultural, native, or naturalized plant species that grows at a site in response to planting or from existing seeds or other propagules. Natural vegetation does not include planted millet. However, planted millet that grows on its own in subsequent years after the year of planting is considered natural vegetation.
- H. "Normal agricultural operation" means a normal agricultural planting, harvesting, post-harvest manipulation or agricultural practice that is conducted in accordance with 50 C.F.R. 20.11 (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, October 1, 2013).
- I. "Normal agricultural planting, harvesting, or post-harvest manipulation" means a planting or harvesting undertaken for the purpose of producing and gathering a crop, or manipulation after such harvest and removal of grain, that is conducted in accordance with 50 C.F.R. 20.11 (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, October 1, 2013).
- J. "Normal soil stabilization practice" means a planting for agricultural soil erosion control or post-mining land reclamation conducted in accordance with 50 C.F.R. 20.11 (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, October 1, 2013).
- K. "Non-toxic shot" means any shot type approved for use to take migratory game birds by the US Fish and Wildlife Service in 50 C.F.R. 20.21, ~~November 6, 2017~~October 1, 2013. This federal regulation, but not later amendments to or editions thereof, has been incorporated by reference and can be viewed and copies obtained as set forth in the "Incorporated References" section of Chapter 0 of these regulations.
- L. "Sinkbox" means a raft or any type of low floating device having a depression which affords a hunter a means of concealing himself below the surface of the water.

#501 – HUNTING HOURS

- A. One-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset, except as otherwise provided in this chapter.

#502 – MANNER OF TAKING

The following are legal methods of take for game species listed in this chapter. Any method of take not listed herein shall be prohibited, except as otherwise provided by statute or Commission regulation.

- A. Waterfowl and other migratory game birds:
 - 1. Shotgun - Any shotgun not larger than 10 gauge, not firing single slugs and incapable of holding more than three (3) shells in the magazine and chamber combined and fired from the shoulder. Shotguns of any description originally capable of holding more than three (3) shells total capacity shall have the magazine so cut off, altered or plugged with a one-piece filler which is incapable of removal without disassembling the gun, so as to reduce the total gun capacity to hold no more than three (3) shells in the magazine and chamber combined.
 - 2. Hand-held bow - With any hand-held bow provided that the arrow or bowstring is not held or drawn mechanically, except no bows may be used on any firing line designated by the Commission.
 - 3. Blinds - In the open or from a blind or other place of concealment on land or water except a sink box. When camouflaged with vegetation from agricultural crops, such camouflaging must not result in the exposing, depositing, distributing or scattering of grain or other feed.
 - 4. Vessels - From or by means of any vessel (excluding a sinkbox) having a motor or sails attached when the motor has been shut off and/or the sails furled, and its progress therefrom has ceased or from a vessel that is drifting or being propelled by hand, or by the aid of a vessel when used solely as a means of picking up dead or injured birds.
 - 5. Hawking or Falconry - By means of hawking or falconry.
 - 6. Decoys, dogs, and calls - By the aid of a dog, artificial decoys, or with the aid and use of birdcalls except recorded or electrically amplified calls or sounds, unless their use has been authorized elsewhere in this chapter.
- B. Non-toxic shot requirements
 - 1. Shot size - No person shall possess or use non-toxic shot of size larger than size T while taking or attempting to take ducks, geese, or coots anywhere in Colorado.
 - 2. Statewide, including all counties in Colorado in both the Central and Pacific flyways;
 - a. No person shall use or possess shot (either in shot-shells or as loose shot for muzzle-loading) other than non-toxic shot while taking or attempting to take ducks, geese or coots.
 - 3. Non-toxic shot is required on commercial wildlife parks, during field trials, and during dog training activities when taking captive-reared mallards in Colorado.
- C. Prohibition of baiting
 - 1. Migratory game birds and waterfowl may not be taken by the aid of baiting, or on or over any baited area, if the person knows or reasonably should know that the area is a baited area. It is unlawful to place or direct the placement of bait on or adjacent to an area for

the purpose of causing, inducing, or allowing any person to take or attempt to take any migratory game bird by the aid of baiting or on or over the baited area.

2. As used in this sub-paragraph "baiting" means the direct or indirect placing, exposing, depositing, distributing or scattering of salt, grain, or other feed that could serve as a lure or attraction for migratory game birds to, on or over any areas where hunters are attempting to take them. "Baited area" means any area on which salt, grain, or other feed has been placed, exposed, deposited, distributed, or scattered, if that salt, grain, or other feed could serve as a lure or attraction for migratory game birds to, on, or over areas where hunters are attempting to take them. Any such area will remain a baited area for ten days following the complete removal of all such salt, grain, or other feed.
3. Nothing in this regulation shall prohibit the taking of any migratory game bird, including waterfowl, coots, and cranes, on or over the following lands or areas that are not otherwise baited areas:
 - a. Standing crops or flooded standing crops (including aquatics); standing, flooded, or manipulated natural vegetation; flooded harvested croplands; or lands or areas where seeds or grains have been scattered solely as the result of a normal agricultural planting, harvesting, post-harvest manipulation or normal soil stabilization practice; or standing or flooded standing agricultural crops where grain is inadvertently scattered solely as a result of a hunter entering or exiting a hunting area, placing decoys, or retrieving downed birds.
4. Nothing in this regulation shall prohibit the taking of any migratory game bird, except waterfowl, coots, and cranes, on or over the following lands or areas that are not otherwise baited areas:
 - a. Areas where grain or other feed has been distributed or scattered solely as the result of the manipulation of an agricultural crop or other feed on the land where grown, or solely as the result of a normal agricultural operation.

#503 – LICENSE AND STAMP REQUIREMENTS

A. License required

1. A small game license is required to take all migratory game birds listed in #500(B) for which an open season exists.
2. Each hunter must call 1-866-COLOHIP (1-866-265-6447) or register online (www.colohip.com) prior to their first hunting trip of the season to register their intent to hunt migratory birds, and to obtain permit numbers if hunting sandhill cranes, and to provide harvest information for the previous season. "Season" means the period September 1 through March 15.

B. Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, no person who has attained the age of sixteen (16) years shall take any migratory waterfowl (ducks, geese and swans) unless at the time of such taking they have on their person an unexpired Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp (commonly called duck stamp), validated by their signature written across the face of the stamp in ink, or an electronic stamp issued through the Total Licensing System that provides a receipt as proof of purchase. This proof of purchase contains a unique code given to the purchaser instantly, and constitutes valid proof of purchase of a Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp for a period not to exceed 45 days from the date of purchase.

C. Colorado State Waterfowl Hunting Stamp

In addition to the Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp, no person who has attained the age of sixteen (16) years shall take any migratory waterfowl (ducks and

geese) unless they possess and carry on their person a valid Colorado State Waterfowl Hunting Stamp, validated by their signature written, in ink, across the face of the stamp.

1. A Colorado State Waterfowl Stamp may be obtained for collection or personal purposes, but shall not serve as the required state stamp for waterfowl hunting purposes.

D. Band-Tailed Pigeon Permit

Beginning with the 2016 band-tailed pigeon hunting season, no hunter shall take any band-tailed pigeons unless at the time of such taking they have on their person an annual band-tailed pigeon permit in addition to a small game license. An annual band-tailed pigeon permit can be purchased for \$5.00.

#504 - SPECIAL CLOSURES AND RESTRICTIONS

A. General

The State of Colorado is divided into two migratory waterfowl flyways consisting of the Pacific Flyway which includes all lands west of the Continental Divide, and the Central Flyway which includes all lands east of the Continental Divide.

1. A person may take in any one day, during the open season prescribed, not to exceed the number of migratory game birds and waterfowl permitted in this chapter. When so taken such birds may be possessed in the numbers specified in this chapter, except that no person on the opening day of the season may possess any migratory game birds or waterfowl in excess of the applicable daily limits and no person may possess any freshly killed migratory game birds or waterfowl during the closed season for such birds.
2. Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to permit the taking of migratory game birds or waterfowl on any Federal reservation or sanctuary, or any area of the United States set aside under any law, proclamation, or executive order for use as a bird, game, or other wildlife reservation, breeding ground, or refuge, or on any area designated as a closed area under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act except as may be permitted by these regulations.
3. No migratory game bird or waterfowl may be taken at any time, or by any means, from, on or across any highway, road, designated trail, or other right-of-way, whether public or private, within the exterior boundaries of any established national wildlife refuge.
4. Open seasons are established only on such migratory game birds and waterfowl as are herein designated. Exceptions to daily bag and possession limits and to the hours of hunting stated in Federal Migratory Bird regulations shall be as prescribed in this chapter.
5. Descriptions of all closures, specific areas, and areas with special restrictions in this chapter begin with the northern boundary and are described in clockwise rotation, with all roads or designations listed connecting to the next in the progression. The following standard abbreviations are used throughout this chapter:
Colorado State highways: Colo
County: Co
County roads: Co Rd
Interstate highways: I-
Road: Rd
U.S. (Federal) highways: US

Note: Migratory bird hunting closures and special provisions and restrictions for Division properties are found in Chapter 9.

B. Possession of Live Birds

Every migratory game bird wounded by hunting and reduced to possession by the hunter shall be immediately killed and become a part of the daily bag limit. No person shall at any time, or by any means, possess or transport live migratory game birds taken under the provisions of this chapter.

C. Possession of Plumage and Skin of Migratory Birds and Waterfowl.

1. No permit is necessary to possess and transport for his own use the plumage and skins of lawfully taken migratory game birds and waterfowl.
2. Personal use of feathers or skins - any person for his own use may possess, transport, ship, import, and export without a permit the feathers and skins of lawfully taken migratory game birds.

D. Commercial Use of Feathers

Any person may possess, purchase, sell, barter, or transport for the making of fishing flies, bed pillows, and mattresses, and for similar commercial uses the feathers of migratory waterfowl (ducks, geese, and swans) killed by hunting pursuant to these regulations, or seized and condemned by Federal or State game authorities except that:

1. No person shall purchase, sell, barter, or offer to purchase, sell, or barter for millinery or ornamental use the feathers of migratory game birds taken under authority of this chapter, and;
2. No person shall purchase, sell, barter, or offer to purchase, sell or barter mounted specimens of migratory game birds taken under authority of this chapter.

E. Most Restrictive Federal or State Law Shall Apply -

Federal and State laws and regulations govern the taking of all migratory birds, in all cases, the most restrictive State or Federal regulation shall apply by species.

F. Processing, Storage and Tagging Required

No person shall put or leave any migratory game birds at any place (other than at his personal abode), or in the custody of another person for picking, cleaning, processing, or storage (including temporary storage), or for the purpose of having taxidermy services performed, unless such birds or package or container of such birds has a tag attached, signed by the hunter, stating the hunter's address, the total number and species of birds, the date such birds were killed, and the hunter's hunting license number.

G. Custody of Birds of Another Person

No person shall receive or have in custody any migratory game birds belonging to another person unless such birds are tagged as required in item F.

H. Migratory Bird Preservation Facilities

No preservation facility shall:

1. Receive, possess or have in custody any migratory game birds belonging to another person for purposes of picking, cleaning, freezing, processing, storage or shipment, unless accurate records are maintained showing (1) the number of each species, (2) the date such birds were received, (3) the date such birds were disposed of, and (4) the name and address of the person to whom such birds were delivered, or
2. Destroy any records required to be maintained under this section for a period of one (1) year following the last entry on the record, or

3. Prevent any person authorized to enforce the provisions of this regulation from entering such facilities at all reasonable hours and inspecting the records and the premises where such operations are being carried on.

I. Closures

1. Waterfowl hunting is prohibited within the area bounded on the north by the Colorado-Wyoming state line; on the east and south by I-76, Colo 71, US 36, and I-70; and on the west by the Continental Divide and the Larimer-Jackson county line and in Bent, Crowley, Kiowa, Mesa, Otero, and Prowers counties.
 - a. Within fifty (50) yards on each side of the center line of any public road.
 - b. Within one-hundred-fifty (150) yards of any dwelling including the air space directly above this closure, without first obtaining permission from the owner, occupant, or person in charge of the dwelling.
2. Hunting is ~~prohibited or restricted~~restricted as specified ~~in the areas and on the dates listed~~ below:
 - a. Barr Lake State Park, Adams County
 1. A reservation is required to hunt and hunters must check-in and out at the check station. Reservations must be made in accordance with #901.A of these regulations.

- A. Falconry is a permitted means of taking migratory game birds during regular or extended seasons.
 - 1. Regular Seasons
 - a. General hunting regulations prescribed in this chapter, including seasons and hunting hours, apply to falconry. General season bag and possession limits do not apply to falconry.
 - b. Daily bag and possession limits for all permitted migratory game birds shall not exceed 3 and 9 birds, respectively, singly or in the aggregate. The falconry bag limit is not in addition to gun limits.
 - 2. Extended Seasons
 - a. There are no extended seasons.

Basis and Purpose:

These proposed regulations reflect the upcoming 2018-2019 migratory bird seasons and are the result of an annual review of the entire chapter related to migratory birds. The established seasons are necessary to manage migratory bird populations in Colorado in accordance with federal laws regulating migratory birds. These regulations allow migratory birds to be harvested in a manner, which helps maintain the biological integrity of the migratory bird population while at the same time providing recreational opportunity for hunters and wildlife viewers. The regulations are also consistent with Federal guidelines provided by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

Waterfowl and Hunting Closure Changes

-Within Chapter W-5, #504, Section I (Closures), the various subsections list properties that are primarily grouped by distinct types of closures. Subsection 2 are primarily properties with waterfowl closures, subsection 3 are mostly properties with general hunting closures, and subsection 4 are mostly properties with goose hunting closures. The previous exceptions were Mack Mesa Reservoir State Recreation Area that has a general hunting and trapping closure but was located under subsection 2, Trinidad State Recreation Area that has a waterfowl closure but was located under subsection 3, and Lower Latham Reservoir that has a general hunting closure, but was located under subsection 4. Therefore, these three properties have been moved to their more appropriate subsections for consistency within each subsection of Chapter W-5, #504, Section I.

-The closure date on the Colorado River in Grand County is intended to correspond with the bald eagle protection period in Grand County. Therefore, the closure date has been changed to November 14 for consistency with those dates.

-The goose hunting closure on Grand Lake and Windy Gap Reservoirs have been expanded to encompass all waterfowl hunting.

-Previously, waterfowl hunting was allowed on opening day and Labor Day weekend on Sweitzer Lake. However, Area 18 and State Park personnel recommend changing the regulation to prohibit waterfowl hunting until after Labor Day to reduce conflicts with other user groups.

- Similarly, hunting had been allowed after Labor Day for several years on Crawford State Park. However, Area 18 and State Park personnel recommend changing the regulation to state that all hunting is permitted after Labor Day only.

- Turks Pond SWA has a public access closure within a quarter mile of the high water line all around the lake to give migrating and wintering ducks and geese a resting place free from any hunting pressure. The closure also includes fishing and all human activity. The regulatory language in Chapter W-5 and Chapter W-9 for this closure previously did not match however. Therefore, new language has been added to both chapters for consistency, and to provide additional clarification on what is allowed and what is prohibited within the closure area.

-New Windsor Reservoir does not have public access for hunting and much of it is surrounded by private homes. Therefore, CPW staff believe hunting should be regulated by the private landowners around the reservoir. In addition, there were previous regulations within Chapter W-5 that restricted hunting near homes and from public roads that would still apply to this reservoir and will continue to provide safety near the public roads and dwellings. Thus, the specific regulations in Chapter W-5 for New Windsor reservoir were merely repetitive and were removed.

-Riverside reservoir is privately owned by the Riverside Irrigation Co. and public access is not allowed. Therefore, the goose hunting closure has been removed to avoid confusing customers about access being allowed for other types of hunting.

Modification of the Non-toxic Shot Definition

On November 6, 2017, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service approved addition of corrosion-inhibited copper shot as a new form of nontoxic shot for waterfowl hunting. To maintain compliance with these federal regulations, the federal register information contained within CPW's definition of "non-toxic shot" has been updated with this new CFR reference.

Addition of Stagecoach State Park to the Hunter Reservation System

Prior to the 2016 waterfowl season, CPW staff from Stagecoach State Park (SSP) and Area 10 established six (6) initial hunting zones to enhance waterfowl hunting opportunities at SSP, while addressing safety concerns related to hunting on the park with other nearby recreational activities. The six (6) initial hunting zones were expanded to nine (9) after consultations with local staff and the identified stakeholders. Waterfowl hunters utilized the new zones and adapted to the on park reservation system. However, this proved time consuming for park staff to administer. To enhance customer service and remove administrative burdens for park staff, Stagecoach State Park has now been added to the hunter reservation system for waterfowl hunting. This will allow hunters to reserve hunting zones and dates through the hunter reservation system, instead of requiring hunters to drive long distances only to find the zones occupied.

Additionally, to address safety concerns in one area of the park and to formally permit historical use of a second small game hunting area on the park, new boundaries for small game hunting at Stagecoach State Park have also been established.

Change in Season Dates for Dark Geese in the North Park, South Park/San Luis Valley Zones of the Central Flyway

Colorado has several dark goose zones in the Central Flyway portion of the state, and the timing of the season can be different in each zone. Previously in the Front Range, North Park, and South Park/San Luis Valley zones, a short period of the season (usually about 2 weeks) was open early in the federal frameworks (late September/early October) to provide early season hunting opportunity at higher elevations where large resident Canada goose populations occur. The remainder of the season in these zones was then traditionally backed up from the latest season date allowed in the federal frameworks (mid-November to mid-February), leaving a split in the seasons from mid-October through mid-November.

In the Northern Front Range dark goose zone, this approach allows harvest of resident Canada geese during the early season segment, and still provides ample hunting opportunity later in the season when many Front Range goose hunters most actively hunt. However, in the North Park and South Park/San Luis Valley dark goose zones, many Canada geese have left these high-elevation areas by mid-October to early November. Therefore, the dark goose season dates have been adjusted in these zones, to start on the same day as the duck season in the Mountain/Foothills duck zone and continue for 105 days with no split to provide the most dark goose hunting opportunity.

Boundary Change for the Eastern/Western Zones of the Pacific Flyway

Colorado had not utilized zones in our portion of the Pacific Flyway until the 2016-17 hunting season. As with any new regulations, it takes some time to fully realize consequences of change. In this case the east-west zone split utilized mostly county lines to divide the zones across the state, and in doing so the line between the east and west zones at Moffat and Routt Counties split Elkhead Reservoir in half.

This unintended consequence created a law enforcement issue for CPW and was confusing to the waterfowl hunting public. It was difficult for a hunter on the shore, or water, at the reservoir to know exactly where the boundary line was and the season dates vary between the east and west zones. Including all of the portions of Elkhead Reservoir and the associated Elkhead Reservoir State Park in the eastern zone will clarify the boundary for hunters and law enforcement personnel.

The statements of basis and purpose for these regulations can be viewed and copies obtained from the Colorado Division of Parks and Wildlife, Office of the Regulations Manager, Policy and Planning Unit, 1313 Sherman, Room 111, Denver, CO 80203.

The primary statutory authority for these regulations can be found in § 24-4-103, C.R.S., and the state Wildlife Act, §§ 33-1-101 to 33-6-209, C.R.S., specifically including, but not limited to: §§ 33-1-106, C.R.S.

EFFECTIVE DATE - THESE REGULATIONS SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE MAY 1, 2018 AND SHALL REMAIN IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UNTIL REPEALED, AMENDED OR SUPERSEDED.

CHAPTER P-1 - PARKS AND OUTDOOR RECREATION LANDS

ARTICLE I - GENERAL PROVISIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL PARKS AND OUTDOOR RECREATION LANDS AND WATERS

100 - PARKS AND OUTDOOR RECREATION LANDS

PARK-SPECIFIC RESTRICTIONS

C. In addition to the general land and water regulations, the following restrictions shall also apply:

1. Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area

- a. Except in established campgrounds where toilet facilities are provided, all overnight campers must provide and use a portable toilet device capable of carrying human waste out of the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area. Contents of the portable toilet must be emptied in compliance with law and may not be deposited within the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area, unless at a facility specifically designated by the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area.
- b. Building or tending fires is allowed pursuant to regulation # 100b.7., except at the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area fire containers must have at least a two inch rigid side. Fire containers must be elevated up off the ground.
- c. Swimming is permitted in the Arkansas River from the confluence of the East Fork/Lake Fork of the Arkansas within the boundaries of the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area. All persons under the age of 13 swimming in the Arkansas River within the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area must wear a properly fitting U.S. Coast Guard approved wearable personal flotation device.
- d. No motorboats shall be permitted on the Arkansas River from the confluence of the East Fork/Lake Fork of the Arkansas to the west end of Pueblo Reservoir.
- e. Innertubes, air mattresses, and similar devices are permitted on the Arkansas River from the confluence of the East Fork/Lake Fork of the Arkansas within the boundaries of the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area. All occupants of these devices must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved wearable personal flotation device.
- f. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.
- g. Recreational gold mining within the Arkansas Headwaters Recreation Area is allowed, except where prohibited as indicated by posted signs.

2. Barr Lake State Park

- a. No dogs or other pets shall be permitted in the wildlife refuge area.
- b. Visitors shall be required to remain on designated trails and boardwalks in the wildlife refuge area.
- c. No fishing or boating shall be permitted in the wildlife refuge area.
- d. Visitors shall be required to remain on the designated trails on Barr Lake Dam.
- e. No horses shall be permitted on the Barr Lake Dam.
- f. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats and boats with electric trolling motors or gasoline motors of 10 horsepower or less shall be permitted.
- g. Only shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for waterfowl hunting during the regular waterfowl hunting seasons, in the areas and at the times posted.

- h. Shotguns loaded with birdshot may also be used for dove hunting in the areas and at the times posted.
- i. All hunters must register prior to beginning hunting and check out at the conclusion of hunting, at the hunter registration area.

3. Bonny Lake State Recreation Area

- a. No public access, hunting, fishing or boating shall be permitted in the North Cove Waterfowl Refuge Area from the first day in November through the last day in January.
- b. During deer and elk seasons, any lawful method of hunting may be used for hunting such big game; and beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of hunting may be used during hunting seasons for small game, in areas not posted as prohibiting such use or uses.

4. Boyd Lake State Park

- a. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, and only in areas not posted as prohibiting such use.

5. Castlewood Canyon State Park

- a. No dogs or other pets shall be permitted in the East Canyon area.
- b. No horses shall be permitted in the east canyon area.
- c. It shall be unlawful to climb, traverse, or rappel, on or from rock formations in the East Canyon area.
- d. Visitors shall be required to remain on the designated trails in the East Canyon area.

6. Chatfield State Park

- a. Entrance to and exit from the dog off leash areas are permitted only at designated access points.
- b. A handler may bring a maximum of three dogs at one time into the designated dog off leash area.
- c. Handlers must possess a leash and at least one waste bag for each dog in the designated dog off leash area.
- d. Sport dog trainers shall obtain a special use permit to access and use the designated upland and flat-water sport dog training areas.
- e. Handlers in the dog off leash area and the sport dog training areas must have a visible and valid dog off leash annual pass or dog off leash daily pass.
- f. Only pistols or other mechanisms incapable of discharging live ammunition may be used at the dog training area.
- g. A valid permit is required to launch or land any hot-air balloon.

7. Cherry Creek State Park

- a. Entrance to and exit from the dog off leash areas is permitted only at designated access points.
- b. A handler may bring a maximum of three dogs at one time into the designated dog off leash area.
- c. Handlers must possess a leash and at least one waste bag for each dog in the designated dog off leash area.
- d. Sport dog trainers shall obtain a special use permit to access and use the designated upland sport dog training area.

- e. Handlers in the dog off leash area and the sport dog training area must have a visible and valid dog off leash annual pass or dog off leash daily pass.
- f. Use of shotgun shells on the trap/skeet range with shot size larger than size 7 is prohibited.
- g. Only pistols or other mechanisms incapable of discharging live ammunition may be used at the dog training area.

8. Cheyenne Mountain State Park

- a. No dogs or other pets shall be permitted outside of the developed facilities area.
- b. Smoking shall be limited to developed areas only and shall not be permitted in the backcountry, or on the archery range, parking lot or trail system.
- c. Hunting shall be prohibited.
- d. It shall be unlawful to climb, traverse or rappel on or from rock formations.
- e. Any person 17 years of age or older who is shooting on the field/3D portion of the archery range must obtain and maintain on one's person a proper and valid daily or annual Cheyenne Mountain Park archery range individual permit.
- f. Public access is prohibited on the archery range from sunset to sunrise.
- g. Any person 16 years of age or younger entering the archery range must be under adult supervision at all times.
- h. Broadheads, crossbows, alcoholic beverages, and firearms, including, but not limited to, BB guns, pellet guns, and air rifles, are prohibited on the archery range.
- i. No dogs or other pets shall be permitted on the archery range.

9. Crawford State Park

- a. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

10. Eldorado Canyon State Park

- a. The use of all portable grills and stoves (including, but not limited to, charcoal, gas, and wood) is prohibited outside of designated high-use pads.
- b. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through March 31, only hand-held bows and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons in the western portion of the parks known as crescent meadows.
- c. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only primitive weapons (hand-held bow and muzzle-loading rifles) may be used to hunt big game animals in the western portion of Eldorado Canyon State Park known as Crescent Meadows.

11. Eleven Mile State Recreation Area

- a. It shall be unlawful, except by law enforcement officers on official duty, to operate or park snowmobiles on land or on the frozen water surface of the reservoir, unless otherwise posted at the park entrances.
- b. It shall be unlawful to operate or occupy boats on the surface of the reservoir from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise.
- c. It shall be unlawful to enter upon, use or occupy the islands on the reservoir.
- d. It shall be unlawful to enter, use or occupy the lands or waters of Eleven Mile State Recreation Area lying to the east of the restrictive buoy line.
- e. Water skiing is prohibited on Eleven Mile Reservoir.
- f. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

12. Golden Gate Canyon

- a. No boats, rafts or other floating devices of any kind shall be permitted on lakes within Golden Gate Canyon State Park, except as part of an organized class in canoeing sponsored by the Division.
- b. In Jefferson County, excluding the 160-acre parcel known as the Vigil Ranch and the posted strip of land along Gilpin County Road 2: During deer and elk seasons, any lawful method of hunting may be used for hunting such big game; and beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of hunting may be used during hunting seasons for small game, in areas not posted as prohibiting such use or uses. Provided further that hunters must visit the designated check station to check in prior to hunting and check out after hunting.
- c. During deer and elk seasons that are in the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of hunting deer and elk may be used in areas not posted as prohibiting such use in that portion of Golden Gate Canyon State Park located in Gilpin County, otherwise known as the Green Ranch. Only hunters selected through a special drawing prior to the beginning of big game seasons are permitted to hunt the Green Ranch portion of Golden Gate Canyon State Park.

13. Harvey Gap State Recreation Area

- a. No dogs or other pets shall be permitted except when used for hunting during the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day.
- b. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats and boats with electric trolling motors or gasoline motors of 20 horsepower or less shall be permitted on Harvey Gap Reservoir.
- c. Water skiing is prohibited on Harvey Gap Reservoir.
- d. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, and only in areas not posted as prohibiting such use.

14. Highline Canal State Trail

- a. No swimming, tubing or rafting shall be permitted.
- b. No fires shall be permitted.

15. Highline Lake State Park

- a. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats and boats with electric motors shall be permitted on Mack Mesa Reservoir.
- b. Boats shall be prohibited on Highline Lake from the first day in October through the last day in February, except that hand-propelled craft may be used to set out and pick up decoys and retrieve downed waterfowl in the area open to hunting.
- c. Only shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for waterfowl hunting during the regular waterfowl hunting seasons, in the areas and at the times posted.
- d. Small game hunting is also allowed at Highline Lake State Park, using an allowable method of take for the species hunted, in the areas and at the times posted.
- e. All hunters must register prior to beginning hunting and check out at the conclusion of hunting, at the hunter registration area.

16. Jackson Lake State Park

- a. Boats shall be prohibited on Jackson Reservoir from the first Monday in November through the last day of migratory waterfowl seasons, except as posted and except that hand-propelled craft may be used to set out and pick up decoys

and retrieve downed waterfowl on the areas of such lakes open to hunting of migratory waterfowl.

- b. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, and only in areas not posted as prohibiting such use.

17. James M. Robb - Colorado River State Park

a. Colorado River Wildlife Area

- (1) In accordance with applicable management plans, no dogs or other pets shall be permitted, except on designated trails.
- (2) No fires shall be permitted.
- (3) No swimming shall be permitted.
- (4) In accordance with applicable management plans, public access is restricted to designated roads and trails from March 15 to May 30 of each year.
- (5) No boats, rafts or other floating devices of any kind shall be permitted on lakes.

b. Fruita, Connected Lakes, Corn Lake and Island Acres Sections

- (1) Except for the swim area at Island Acres, only hand-propelled craft, sailboats and boats with electric motors shall be permitted.
- (2) Only shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for waterfowl hunting during the regular waterfowl hunting seasons, in the areas and at the times posted. All hunters must hunt from designated blinds and hunters with reservations take priority.
- (3) Hunting is prohibited in Fruita and Connected Lakes sections.

c. 34 Road Parcel

- (1) No public access except for waterfowl hunting on weekends during designated waterfowl hunting seasons.
- (2) Waterfowl hunters must have a valid reservation to hunt the 34 Road blind.
- (3) Hunters may hunt from designated blinds only.
- (4) All other use of this property is prohibited.

d. Pear Park Section

- (1) No boats, rafts or other floating devices of any kind shall be permitted on lakes between 30 Road and 29 Road.

18. John Martin Reservoir State Recreation Area

- a. No public access shall be permitted on the north shore area of John Martin Reservoir State Recreation Area from the first day of November through March 15 of every year or as posted except to retrieve downed waterfowl.
- b. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats and boats with electric motors shall be permitted on Lake Hasty.
- c. No unauthorized boats, rafts, or other floating devices of any kind shall be permitted on the waters below John Martin Dam to the Arkansas River bridge.
- d. No public access shall be permitted east of the waterfowl closure line to the dam from the first day of November through March 15 of every year or as posted except to retrieve downed waterfowl.

19. Lake Pueblo State Park

- a. Jumping, diving or swinging from cliffs, ledges or man-made structures is prohibited, including, but not limited to, boat docks, marina infrastructure and the railroad trestle in Turkey Creek.

- b. Inertubes, air mattresses and similar devices are permitted, below the dam on that part of the Arkansas River within the boundaries of Pueblo State Recreation Area. All occupants of these devices must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved wearable personal flotation device.
- c. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, and only in areas not posted as prohibiting such use.

20. Lathrop State Park

- a. Boats shall be prohibited on Horseshoe Reservoir from the first Monday in November through the last day of migratory waterfowl seasons, except as posted and except that hand-propelled craft may be used to set out and pick up decoys and retrieve downed waterfowl on the areas of such lakes open to hunting of migratory waterfowl.
- b. Water skiing is prohibited on Horseshoe Reservoir.
- c. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons west from a north-south line corresponding with the existing barbed-wire fence between Horseshoe Lake and Martin Lake.

21. Lone Mesa State Park

- a. During any authorized big game hunting season, any lawful method of hunting deer, elk, and bear may be used in areas not posted as prohibiting such use in Lone Mesa State Park. Only hunters who possess a valid Lone Mesa State Park hunting permit are permitted to hunt.

22. Lory State Park

- a. During deer and elk seasons, any lawful method of hunting may be used for hunting such big game; and beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of hunting may be used during hunting seasons for small game, in areas not posted as prohibiting such use or uses; except that hunting is not permitted on Saturdays and Sundays.
- b. During the spring turkey hunt at Lory State Park, it shall be permitted to hunt turkey by legal methods on Mondays and Tuesdays only. All other days of the week shall be closed to spring turkey hunting.

23. Mancos State Park

- a. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats, boats with electric trolling motors and boats with gasoline motors operated at a wakeless speed shall be permitted on Mancos Reservoir.
- b. Water skiing is prohibited on Mancos Reservoir.

24. Mueller State Park

- a. No dogs or other pets shall be permitted outside of the developed facilities area.
- b. It shall be unlawful, except by law enforcement officers on official duty, to operate snowmobiles and off-highway vehicles.
- c. No boats, rafts or other floating devices of any kind shall be permitted on lakes within Mueller State Park.
- d. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of controlled hunting may be

used, during hunting seasons, in areas not prohibiting such use on Mueller State Park. Hunters may access the posted hunting area only from Trail 5 at the Visitor Center, Trail 11 at the Livery parking lot or Lost Pond Picnic Area and Trail 13 at the group campground. All weapons must be completely unloaded when the hunter is outside the posted hunting area boundary.

25. Navajo State Park

- a. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

26. North Sterling State Park

- a. Boats shall be prohibited on North Sterling Reservoir from the first Monday in November through the last day of migratory waterfowl seasons, except as posted and except that hand-propelled craft may be used to set out and pick up decoys and retrieve downed waterfowl on the areas of such lakes open to hunting of migratory waterfowl.
- b. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting in areas not prohibiting such use on North Sterling State Park, except as follows:
 - (i) Hunting is prohibited from the dam, and
 - (ii) Hunting is prohibited from the frozen surface of the lake.

27. Paonia State Park

- a. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

28. Pearl Lake State Park

- a. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats, boats with electric trolling motors and boats with gasoline motors operated at a wakeless speed shall be permitted.
- b. Water skiing is prohibited on Pearl Lake.
- c. During deer and elk seasons, any lawful method of hunting may be used for hunting such big game; and beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of hunting may be used during hunting seasons for small game, in areas not posted as prohibiting such use or uses.

29. Ridgway State Park

- a. No boats, rafts, or other floating devices shall be permitted on any waters within the Pa-Co-Chu-Puk Recreation Site, below Ridgway Dam.
- b. On all areas of the park east of Highway 550: during deer and elk seasons, any lawful method of hunting may be used for hunting such big game; and, during the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of hunting may be used during hunting seasons for small game, in areas not posted as prohibiting such use or uses.
- c. During any authorized hunting season from October 1 to April 30 of each year, and any approved special season, any lawful method of hunting may be used on all lands at Ridgway State Park open to public access west of Ridgway Reservoir, except that the area bounded by Dallas Creek on the south and the site closure signs on the north shall be closed to all hunting.
- d. During any authorized waterfowl hunting season from October 1 to April 30 of each year, and any approved special season, waterfowl hunting shall be permitted within the Dallas Creek Recreation Site at Ridgway State Park; except that hunting shall be prohibited between the park road and U.S. Highway 550 and in other areas posted as prohibiting such use.

- e. During approved special seasons, any lawful method of hunting may be used in the following areas (or special hunting zones) as defined:
 - (i) (Zone 1) Elk Ridge Mesa, including the closed Elk Ridge Campground, and
 - (ii) (Zone 2) That area bounded by a distance of 100 yards south of park headquarters, on the north; Ridgway Reservoir on the west; ¼ mile from Colorado Highway 550 on the south; and ¼ mile from the main park road on the east and,
 - (iii) That area bounded by Ridgway reservoir's main cove on the north; ¼ mile from the Elk Ridge road on the west; the intersection of the Elk Ridge and main park roads on the south; and ¼ mile from the main park road on the east at Ridgway State Park and,
 - (iv) The Pa-Co-Chu-Puk Recreation site at Ridgway State Park.

30. Rifle Falls State Park

- a. It shall be unlawful to climb, traverse, or rappel on or from rock formations.

31. Rifle Gap State Park

- a. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

32. Roxborough State Park

- a. No dogs or other pets shall be permitted.
- b. No fires shall be permitted.
- c. It shall be unlawful to climb, traverse or rappel on or from rock formations.

33. Saint Vrain State Park

- a. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats and boats with electric motors shall be permitted, except on Blue Heron Reservoir.
- b. Only hand or trailer launched vessels with electric or gasoline motors of 10 horsepower or less, operated at a wakeless speed shall be permitted on Blue Heron Reservoir.

34. Spinney Mountain State Recreation Area

- a. It shall be unlawful, except by law enforcement officers on official duty, to operate or park snowmobiles on land or on the frozen water surface of the reservoir, unless otherwise posted at the park entrances.
- b. It shall be unlawful to operate or occupy boats on the surface of the reservoir from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise.
- c. It shall be unlawful to enter upon, use or occupy the islands on the reservoir.
- d. It shall be unlawful to enter, use or occupy the lands or waters of Spinney Mountain State Recreation Area between November 16 and April 30, unless the reservoir is ice-free and the area is otherwise posted as open for public use.
- e. It shall be unlawful to enter, use or occupy the lands or waters of Spinney Mountain State Recreation Area between the hours of one hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise, or as otherwise posted.
- f. Water skiing is prohibited on Spinney Mountain Reservoir.
- g. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

35. Stagecoach State Park

- a. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbows and hand-held bows, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot

may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, ~~on the western half of the reservoir.~~

- b. ~~Only shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for waterfowl hunting during the regular waterfowl hunting seasons, in the designated waterfowl hunting zones.~~
- c. ~~Small game hunting is also allowed at Stagecoach State Park in the area bounded on the north by the Yampa River; on the south and east by the park boundary; and on the west by the Elk Run Trail.~~
- d. ~~All waterfowl hunters must register prior to beginning hunting and check out at the conclusion of hunting at the hunter registration area.~~

36. State Forest State Park

- a. No boats, rafts or other floating devices of any kind shall be permitted on lakes within The State Forest, except that wakeless boating shall be allowed on North Michigan Reservoir.
- b. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats, boats with electric trolling motors and boats with gasoline motors operated at a wakeless speed shall be permitted on North Michigan Reservoir.
- c. Water skiing is prohibited on North Michigan Reservoir.
- d. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

37. Staunton State Park

- a. No boats, rafts or other floating devices of any kind shall be permitted on lakes within the park.

38. Steamboat Lake State Park

- a. During deer and elk seasons, any lawful method of hunting may be used for hunting such big game; and from the Tuesday after Labor Day through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, any lawful method of hunting may be used during hunting seasons for small game, in areas not posted as prohibiting such use or uses.

39. Sweitzer Lake State Park

- a. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, and only in areas not posted as prohibiting such use.

40. Sylvan Lake State Park

- a. Only hand-propelled craft, sailboats and boats with electric motors shall be permitted.
- b. Water skiing is prohibited on Sylvan Lake.
- c. During any hunting season all year, lawful methods of hunting may be used in areas not prohibiting such use.

41. Trinidad Lake State Park, Archery Range

- a. Dogs or other pets are prohibited.
- b. Smoking is prohibited.
- c. Broadheads, crossbows, and firearms, including, but not limited to, BB guns, pellet guns, and air rifles are prohibited.
- d. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited.
- e. Any person 16 years of age or younger, must be under the direct supervision of an adult at all times.
- f. Public access is prohibited between sunset and sunrise.

- g. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, and only in areas not posted as prohibiting such use.

42. Vega State Park

- a. During the period beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day and continuing through the Friday prior to Memorial Day, only bows and arrows including crossbow and hand-held bow, unless otherwise restricted, and shotguns loaded with birdshot may be used for hunting during hunting seasons, and only in areas not posted as prohibiting such use.

Chapter P-1 - Parks and Outdoor Recreation Lands

Basis and Purpose:

Addition of Stagecoach State Park to the Hunter Reservation System

Prior to the 2016 waterfowl season, CPW staff from Stagecoach State Park (SSP) and Area 10 established six (6) initial hunting zones to enhance waterfowl hunting opportunities at SSP, while addressing safety concerns related to hunting on the park with other nearby recreational activities. The six (6) initial hunting zones were expanded to nine (9) after consultations with local staff and the identified stakeholders. Waterfowl hunters utilized the new zones and adapted to the on park reservation system. However, this proved time consuming for park staff to administer. To enhance customer service and remove administrative burdens for park staff, Stagecoach State Park has now been added to the hunter reservation system for waterfowl hunting. This will allow hunters to reserve hunting zones and dates through the hunter reservation system, instead of requiring hunters to drive long distances only to find the zones occupied. Additionally the reservation system will reduce the amount of time SSP staff needs to spend coordinating and maintaining an in-office reservation system.

Additionally, to address safety concerns in one area of the park and to formally permit historical use of a second small game hunting area on the park, new boundaries for small game hunting at Stagecoach State Park have also been established.

The statements of basis and purpose for these regulations can be viewed and copies obtained from the Colorado Division of Parks and Wildlife, Office of the Regulations Manager, Policy and Planning Unit, 1313 Sherman, Room 111, Denver, CO 80203.

The primary statutory authority for these regulations can be found in § 24-4-103, C.R.S., and the state Parks Act, §§ 33-10-101 to 33-33-113, C.R.S., and specifically including, but not limited to: §§ 33-10-106, C.R.S.

EFFECTIVE DATE - THESE REGULATIONS SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE MAY 1, 2018 AND SHALL REMAIN IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UNTIL REPEALED, AMENDED OR SUPERSEDED.

FINAL CHAPTER W-9 - WILDLIFE PROPERTIES**ARTICLE I - GENERAL PROVISIONS****#900 - REGULATIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL WILDLIFE PROPERTIES, EXCEPT STATE TRUST LANDS****A. DEFINITIONS**

1. "Aircraft" means any machine or device capable of atmospheric flight, including, but not limited to, airplanes, helicopters, gliders, dirigibles, balloons, rockets, hang gliders and parachutes, and any models thereof.
2. "Water contact activities" means swimming, wading (except for the purpose of fishing), waterskiing, sail surfing, scuba diving, and other water-related activities which put a person in contact with the water (without regard to the clothing or equipment worn).
3. "Youth mentor hunting" means hunting by youths under 18 years of age. Youth hunters under 16 years of age shall at all times be accompanied by a mentor when hunting on youth mentor properties. A mentor must be 18 years of age or older and hold a valid hunter education certificate or be born before January 1, 1949.

B. Public Access to State Wildlife Areas

1. Only properties listed in this chapter are open for public access. The Director may open newly acquired properties for public access for a period not to exceed nine (9) months pending adoption of permanent regulations. In addition, the Director may establish and post restrictions based upon consideration of the following criteria:
 - a. The location and size of the area.
 - b. The location, type and condition of roads, vehicle parking areas and the number and type of sanitary facilities available.
 - c. The number of users and vehicles the area will tolerate without significant degradation to wildlife resources, and public or private property.
 - d. Opportunity to assure public safety, health and welfare.
2. If a property is opened for public access pursuant to this provision, the property shall be posted with a list of applicable access restrictions. It shall be unlawful for any person or vehicle to enter any such property, except in accordance with its posting and the applicable restrictions.

C. Prohibited Activities

Except as specifically authorized by contractual agreement, official document, public notice, permit or by posted sign, the following activities are prohibited on all lands, waters, the frozen surface of waters, rights-of-way, buildings, and other structures or devices owned, operated, or under the administrative control of Colorado Parks and Wildlife:

1. To enter, use, or occupy any area or portion thereof for any purpose when posted against such entry, use, or occupancy.
2. To enter, use, or occupy any area for any commercial purpose or to conduct land, water, oil, gas, or mineral investigations, surveys, or explorations of any kind.
3. To operate any form of vehicle (motorized or non-motorized) except on established roads or within designated camping or parking areas. All motor vehicles and the operators

thereof must be in compliance with all Colorado statutes and regulations pertaining to motor vehicle operation.

4. To operate a motor vehicle in excess of posted speed limits or in excess of 25 miles per hour where not posted.
5. To leave a camp, pitched tent, shelter, motor vehicle, or trailer unattended for more than 48 hours, or to camp or to park a travel trailer or camper on any one state wildlife area for more than 14 days in any 45-day period.
6. To build, erect, or establish any permanent structure or to plant any vegetation. Only portable blinds or tree stands and steps may be erected by the public on state wildlife areas. No nails may be driven into trees. Portable blinds or tree stands intended for use to hunt any big game or waterfowl during an established season may be erected on state wildlife areas no earlier than 30 days prior to the season in which they are used. All man-made materials used for blinds or tree stands during big game or waterfowl seasons must be removed within 10 days after the end of the season in which they are used. Any other portable blind or tree stand used for any other purpose must be removed at the end of the day in which they are used. The Customer Identification Number of the owner and the date(s) to be used must be displayed on the outside of all portable blinds and on the underside of all tree stands in a readily visible area. However, the erection or placement of any blind or tree stand by any person does not reserve the blind or tree stand for personal use. All such blinds and tree stands remain available for use to the general public on a first come, first-served basis.
7. To remove, modify, adjust, deface, destroy, or mutilate any building, structure, water control device, fence, gate, poster, notice, sign, survey or section marker, tree, shrub or other vegetation or any object of archaeological, geological, or historical value or interest.
8. To litter in any form, to leave fish, fish entrails, human excrement, waste water, containers or cartons, boxes or other trash, garbage or toxic substance on any area or to bring any household or commercial trash, garbage or toxic substance to a Division-controlled area for disposal, or to dump trailer waste into any toilet or sanitary facility.
9. To set or build a fire without provision to prevent the spreading thereof, or to leave a fire unattended.
10. To release or allow livestock to graze or range on any area, except that horses, mules, llamas, and burros may be used when in direct association with wildlife recreational activities.
11. To possess, use or apply explosives (other than lawful firearm ammunition), fireworks, poisons, herbicides, insecticides or other pesticides.
12. To release wildlife or privately-owned game birds, except privately-owned game birds released for field trials, including group dog training, or on those state wildlife areas where release for dog training is specifically authorized in #901.B of these regulations; or to permit dogs, cats, or other domestic pets to run at large (not on a leash) on any area, except dogs lawfully used while actively hunting, or while training dogs for hunting, or during Division licensed field trials.
13. To excavate or dig trenches, holes, or pits.
14. To leave vessels beached, at anchor, moored or docked unattended overnight, except in areas designated for that purpose.

15. To fish from, block or impede any Division-controlled boat ramps or boat docks when in conflict with boaters or as posted.
16. To snorkel, scuba dive, or spearfish with the aid of diving mask, swim fins, snorkel, and/or air tanks, except in waters where swimming is permitted, when location is properly identified by a "divers down flag," and when the scuba diver has a valid S.C.U.B.A. diver's certificate issued by a recognized S.C.U.B.A. training organization.
17. To engage in any unlawful conduct or act as defined in Title 18, C.R.S.
18. To utilize any air or gas inflated floating device as a means of transportation upon or across the surface of the water unless such device is of multi-compartment construction and has a rigid motor mount for those devices propelled by gasoline or electric motors. Single compartment air or gas filled flotation devices are restricted to designated swimming areas.
19. To promote, sponsor, or conduct or participate in boat regattas, paintball shooting, questing, or other non-wildlife oriented activities.
20. To launch or land any aircraft.
21. To leave any decoys or anything used as decoys set up in the field or on the water overnight.
22. To swim, except in designated waters or in association with specifically authorized water contact activities.
23. To discharge a firearm or bow within designated parking, camping, or picnic areas.
- ~~24.~~ To possess the following types of ammunition and/or firearms: tracer rounds, armor-piercing rounds, military hardened rounds with explosive or radioactive substances, .50 caliber BMG rounds, or fully automatic firearms.
- ~~25-24.~~ ~~To fish in any waters within the any Division fish hatchery, rearing, or distribution unit, including but not limited to, streams, rearing ponds, holding areas, and raceways, except in designated areas of these properties which are managed for public fishing; and to fish in fish rearing ponds on any other Wildlife property, as posted.~~
- ~~26-25.~~ To possess, store, or use hay, straw, or mulch which has not been certified as noxious weed free in accordance with the Weed Free Forage Crop Certification Act, Sections 35-27.5-101 to 108, C.R.S., or any other state or province participating in the Regional Certified Weed Free Forage Program. See Appendix A of this chapter. All materials so certified shall be clearly marked as such by the certifying state or province. Exempted from this prohibition are persons transporting such materials on Federal, State, or County roads that cross CDOW property; and hay produced on the property where it is being used.
- ~~27-26.~~ Upon notification by authorized Colorado Parks and Wildlife personnel of a violation of any of the above (or any other law of the State of Colorado) and where the unlawful activity is not immediately and permanently discontinued or if it is of a continuing nature, the violator(s) may be required to leave Colorado Parks and Wildlife property for a minimum of 72 hours.
- ~~28-27.~~ To trap, unless such trapping is done in accordance with the provisions of 33-6-204 (General Exemptions), 33-6-205 (Exemptions for Departments of Health), 33-6-206 (Nonlethal Methods Exemptions), #901 and Chapter 3 of these regulations. Persons

wishing to use the above-mentioned exemptions must have prior authorization from Colorado Parks and Wildlife.

~~29.28.~~ To conduct field trials or group dog training without first obtaining a field trial license, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 8 of these regulations.

4. D. Limitation of People and Vehicle Usage

1. The Director of Colorado Parks and Wildlife may establish and enforce a limitation not to exceed sixty (60) days, on public occupancy of the land and water areas owned or leased by the Division.

The Director shall use only the following criteria when establishing such limitation:

- a. The location and size of the area.
 - b. The location, type and condition of roads, vehicle parking areas and the number and type of sanitary facilities available.
 - c. The number of users and vehicles the area will tolerate without significant degradation to wildlife resources, and public or private property.
 - d. Opportunity to assure public safety, health and welfare.
2. Whenever such limitation is exercised, the area(s) involved shall be posted indicating the specific number of persons or vehicles permitted within the area at all times when such area is posted. It shall be unlawful for any person or vehicle to enter any such area(s) posted as being fully occupied or after being advised by an officer of the Division that the area is full.
 3. The Division may waive these restrictions for daytime use during a specified period of time for organized supervised groups whose numbers exceed the limitations set forth. Written approval must first be obtained from the appropriate Regional Manager.

E. Closure of Properties to Public Use

1. The Director of Colorado Parks and Wildlife may establish and enforce temporary closures of, or restrictions on, lands or waters owned or leased by the Division, or portions thereof, for a period not to exceed nine months, when any one of the following criteria apply:
 - a. The property has sustained a natural or man-made disaster such as drought, wildfire, flooding, or disease outbreak which makes public access unsafe, or where access by the public could result in additional and significant environmental damage.
 - b. The facilities on the property are unsafe.
 - c. To protect threatened or endangered wildlife species, protect wildlife resources from significant natural or manmade threats, such as the introduction or spread of disease or nuisance species, changing environmental conditions or other similar threats, protect time-sensitive wildlife use of lands or waters, or facilitate Division-sponsored wildlife research projects or management activities.
2. Whenever such closure is instituted, the area(s) involved shall be posted indicating the nature and purpose of the closure. It shall be unlawful for any person or vehicle to enter any such area(s) posted as closed.

F. Criteria for Activities Requiring Express Authorization - Whenever an activity requires expressed authorization (e.g. target practice) the Division shall grant or deny permission based on consideration of public safety and wildlife resource protection.

G. Commercial Use of State Wildlife Areas

1. Except as provided herein, commercial use of state wildlife areas, including, but not limited to, the provision of any goods or services to members of the general public using the state wildlife area, is prohibited. However, commercial uses of state wildlife areas may be allowed by the Division when:
 - a. such commercial use will not adversely impact wildlife resources or habitat;
 - b. there is a demonstrated need for the goods or services to be provided as part of such commercial use;
 - c. such commercial use will not unreasonably interfere with the primary wildlife related recreational uses of the state wildlife area by members of the general public;
 - d. the state wildlife area, and its existing facilities, can safely accommodate such commercial use; and
 - e. Such commercial uses may be exclusive or nonexclusive, as determined by the Division to be necessary for the proper management of the state wildlife area in light of the criteria set forth above and the compensation provided to the Division.

2. Prior to making any commercial use of a state wildlife area, a person must enter into a commercial use contract with the Division providing for such use. Such contract shall, at a minimum, include provisions regarding:
 - a. the specific goods or services to be provided;
 - b. user number restrictions;
 - c. seasonal or time restrictions;
 - d. record-keeping requirements, including, but not limited to, a requirement that the contractor maintain records regarding the goods and services provided, the date(s) and time(s) the person provided these goods and services on the property, and the number of goods or services provided, by user day, for a period of at least three years. Such records shall be available for inspection by the Division;
 - e. compensation to the Division: a minimum fee equal to 5% of the gross income generated by the activity shall be paid to the Division, but in no event shall any fee for a commercial use contract be less than \$100. The \$100 minimum shall be paid at the time the contract is signed;
 - f. the term or length of the agreement, and a provision providing for cancellation or termination of the agreement for any failure to comply with the terms and conditions of the agreement and any applicable laws;
 - g. any other provision necessary to protect wildlife resources, habitat or public safety, to prevent conflict with primary wildlife related recreational uses of the state wildlife area by the general public or to properly administer the commercial use and the commercial use contract, including bonding requirements.

3. Incidental commercial services such as the renting of pack animals or their services to remove harvested animals; emergency vehicle repairs or tow services; or other similar incidental services may be provided to wildlife recreational users without a commercial use agreement when the service is relatively infrequent, the provider does not advertise for or solicit business specifically for a state wildlife area and maintains a separate place of business, and the service is not one for which the provider is required by law to obtain a guide or outfitter license.

H. Special (Non-Wildlife Related) Use of State Wildlife Areas

1. Except for uses or activities otherwise specifically prohibited by these regulations, the Division may allow special (non-wildlife related) uses of state wildlife areas. Special uses may only be allowed if:
 - a. such use will not adversely impact wildlife resources or habitat;
 - b. such use will not interfere with wildlife-related recreational uses of the state wildlife area by members of the general public;
 - c. such use is non-commercial in nature; and

- d. the state wildlife areas, and its existing facilities, can safely accommodate such use.
2. Prior to making any special use of a state wildlife area, a person must enter into a special use agreement with the Division. Such agreement shall, at a minimum, include provisions regarding:
 - a. the nature of the special use;
 - b. user number restrictions;
 - c. time and date restrictions;
 - d. compensation to the Division: A minimum fee of \$100 shall apply to all special use agreements, but in no event shall the compensation received by the Division be less than the costs of administering such use, including, but not limited to, staff time;
 - e. cancellation or termination of the agreement for any failure to comply with the terms and conditions of the agreement and any applicable laws; and
 - f. any other provision necessary to protect wildlife resources, habitat or public safety, to prevent conflict with primary wildlife related recreational uses of the state wildlife area by the general public or to properly administer the special use and the special use agreement, including bonding requirements.

I. Utility and Road Easements

1. The Director may grant easements, for a term not to exceed twenty-five (25) years, on properties owned in fee title by the Division after consideration of the following:
 - a. financial consideration for the easement represents fair market value and is no more than \$100,000;
 - b. the easement is customary or minor in nature, or is a replacement, modification or confirmation of an existing easement; and
 - c. the easement is not detrimental to wildlife habitat, water resources, or the operation of a hatchery, fish rearing facility or administrative facility and is in the public interest.

J. Leases

1. The Director may execute documents related to existing leases wherein the Division is either the lessor or lessee, after consideration of the following:
 - a. the document is a renewal, extension or amendment of an existing lease;
 - b. the renewal or extension is for a term not to exceed twenty-five (25) years;
 - c. total consideration for the entire potential term of the renewal, extension or amendment represents fair market value and is no more than \$100,000; and
 - d. the renewal, extension or amendment supports, protects, enhances or is not detrimental to wildlife habitat, water resources or the operation of a hatchery, fish rearing facility or administrative facility and is in the public interest.

ARTICLE II - PROPERTY-SPECIFIC PROVISIONS

#901 - PROPERTY-SPECIFIC REGULATIONS

(See Appendix B for a list of properties without property-specific regulations, to which only restrictions in #900 apply)

A. Except as specified in #901.A.1 below, on those properties which have reservations available or required, reservations may be made by calling 1-800-846-9453. Reservations are not accepted more than 14 days in advance of the hunt date, nor after 12:00 noon on the day before the hunt date, or Friday at 12:00 noon for Sundays and holidays falling on Monday. Hunters who wish to cancel a reservation must do so no later than 12:00 noon on the day before the hunt date. Failure to hunt a reserved area without prior cancellation, or follow check station procedures, may cause forfeiture of the privilege to make reservations for the remainder of the hunting season. Hunters are limited to a maximum of one reservation per hunt date and one reservation per phone call. Hunters must possess a valid license for the species to be hunted in order to make a reservation. Reservations are not transferable. The individual named on the reservation must be at the property on the day of the hunt and be a licensed hunter for the species to be hunted. Hunters with reservations may only hunt the hunt area specified on the reservation.

1. Reservations may be made on the following properties by calling 970-255-6161. All other restrictions listed in #901.A apply.
 - a. Colorado River Island State Wildlife Area
 - b. Franklin Island State Wildlife Area
 - c. Highline Lake State Park
 - d. Horsethief Canyon State Wildlife Area
 - e. James M. Robb Colorado River State Park
 - f. Orchard Mesa State Wildlife Area
 - g. Tilman Bishop State Wildlife Area

B. In addition to or in place of those restrictions listed in regulation #900, the following provisions or restrictions apply:

1. **Adams State Wildlife Area - Routt County**
 - a. Public access is prohibited from December 1 through June 30.
 - b. Camping is prohibited.
 - c. Campfires are prohibited.
 - d. Dogs are prohibited, except as an aid in hunting grouse.
 - e. Vehicle access is prohibited beyond the parking area.
2. **Adobe Creek Reservoir State Wildlife Area - Bent and Kiowa Counties**
 - a. Public access is prohibited from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise daily, except for fishing.
 - b. All terrain vehicles, dirt bikes, and snowmobiles are prohibited.
 - c. Public access to the frozen surface of the lake is prohibited.
 - d. Public access to the dams, inlets, and outlet structures is prohibited, except for fishing.
3. **Almont Triangle State Wildlife Area - Gunnison County**

II. ARTICLE III - STATE TRUST LANDS

III.I.#902 REGULATIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL STATE TRUST LANDS LEASED BY COLORADO PARKS AND WILDLIFE

A. DEFINITIONS

1. "Youth mentor hunting" means hunting by youths under 18 years of age. Youth hunters under 16 years of age shall at all times be accompanied by a mentor when hunting on youth mentor properties. A mentor must be 18 years of age or older and hold a valid hunter education certificate or be born before January 1, 1949.

B. Public Access to State Trust Lands Leased by Colorado Parks and Wildlife

1. Public access is prohibited from March 1 through August 31, unless otherwise posted.
2. All newly enrolled properties are closed to public access until September 1 of the year of enrollment, unless otherwise posted.
3. Public access is prohibited from one-half (1/2) hour after sunset to one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise, except as posted, in accordance with the lease agreement with the State Land Board.

4. Public access is restricted to hunting, fishing, and watchable wildlife activity.

C. Prohibited Activities

Except as otherwise provided in these regulations, the following provisions apply to all State Trust Lands leased by Colorado Parks and Wildlife:

1. It is unlawful for any person to enter, use or occupy any area or portion thereof for any purpose when posted against such entry, use or occupancy.
2. Motorized vehicle use is restricted to designated roads.
3. Littering is prohibited. All trash must be packed out by State Trust land users.
4. Camping and fires are prohibited, unless otherwise posted.
5. Access is by foot or horseback only, unless otherwise posted.
6. No outfitting or non-wildlife related public access is permitted.
7. Target practice or non-hunting-related shooting is prohibited.
8. It is unlawful to possess the following types of ammunition and/or firearms: tracer rounds, armor-piercing rounds, military hardened rounds with explosive or radioactive substances, .50 caliber BMG rounds, or fully automatic firearms.
9. It is unlawful to possess, store, or use hay, straw, or mulch which has not been certified as noxious weed free in accordance with the Weed Free Forage Crop Certification Act, Sections 35-27.5-101 to 108, C.R.S., or any other state or province participating in the Regional Certified Weed Free Forage Program. See Appendix A of this chapter. All materials so certified shall be clearly marked as such by the certifying state or province. Exempted from this prohibition are persons transporting such materials on Federal, State, or County roads that cross State Trust Lands leased by the Division, and hay produced on the property where it is being used.

D. Criteria for Posting Prohibited Activities

When these regulations provide that an activity is prohibited, except as posted or permitted as posted, Colorado Parks and Wildlife may control these activities by posting signs. Colorado Parks and Wildlife shall apply the following criteria in determining if an activity shall be restricted or authorized pursuant to posting:

1. Public safety.
2. Proximity to a calving or lambing area.
3. Proximity to a corral, loading chute or similar structure maintained for the purpose of handling domestic livestock.
4. Proximity to private structures such as outbuildings, houses, barns, storage sheds or similar structures.
5. Proximity to agriculture equipment.
6. Whether protection of roads or trails is necessary to prevent excessive damage caused by human use.
7. Negative impacts on wildlife resources or domestic livestock, or agricultural products.
8. Whether the area can provide additional public benefits and remain consistent with all applicable agreements.

E. Closure of Properties to Public Use

1. The Director of Colorado Parks and Wildlife may establish and enforce temporary closures of, or restrictions on, lands or waters leased by the Division from the State Land Board, or portions thereof, for a period not to exceed nine months, when any one of the following criteria apply:

- a. The property has sustained a natural or man-made disaster such as drought, wildfire, flooding, or disease outbreak which makes public access unsafe, or where access by the public could result in additional and significant environmental damage.
 - b. The facilities on the property are unsafe.
 - c. To protect threatened or endangered wildlife species, protect wildlife resources from significant natural or manmade threats, such as the introduction or spread of disease or nuisance species, changing environmental conditions or other similar threats, protect time-sensitive wildlife use of lands or waters, or facilitate Division-sponsored wildlife research projects or management activities.
2. Whenever such closure is instituted, the area(s) involved shall be posted indicating the nature and purpose of the closure. It shall be unlawful for any person or vehicle to enter any such area(s) posted as closed.

ARTICLE IV – STATE FISH UNITS

#904 – REGULATIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL STATE FISH UNITS

A. Prohibited Activities

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in these regulations, the following provisions, as well as the provisions in #900.B.2 and #900.C, apply to all Division State Fish Units:
 - a. To fish in any waters within any Division fish hatchery, rearing, or distribution unit, including but not limited to, streams, rearing ponds, holding areas, and raceways, except in designated areas of these properties, which are managed for public fishing.
 - b. Waders or other fishing equipment are prohibited.
 - c. Camping is prohibited.
 - d. Fires are prohibited.
 - e. Hunting is prohibited.
 - f. Target practice is prohibited.
 - g. Pets and other domestic animals are prohibited.
 - h. Rock climbing is prohibited.
 - i. Vessel launching and takeout are prohibited.
 - j. Water contact is prohibited.
 - k. Feeding the fish is prohibited, except with fish food provided by the Division.
 - l. Throwing anything besides Division provided fish food into the water is prohibited.
 - m. Overnight parking is prohibited.

#905 – PROPERTY SPECIFIC REGULATIONS

A. Finger Rock State Fish Unit – Routt County

- 1. Hunting is limited to outside of the designated safety zones, as posted.
- 2. Discharge of firearms or bows is limited to outside of the designated safety zones, as posted.

B. Pitkin State Fish Unit – Gunnison County

- 1. Fishing is prohibited, except in Quartz Creek.

C. Poudre River State Fish Unit - Larimer County

- 2. Discharge of firearms or bows is limited to outside of the designated safety zones, as posted.

D. Rifle Falls State Fish Unit - Garfield County

- 1. Hunting is limited to outside of the designated safety zones, as posted.

E. Roaring Judy State Fish Unit – Gunnison County

- 1. Public access is prohibited from 1 hour after sunset to 1 hour before sunrise.
- 2. Discharge of firearms or bows is limited to outside of the designated safety zones, as posted.
- 3. West of Hwy 135, hunting is restricted to archery equipment for big game and shotguns for waterfowl.

4. Target practice is limited to designated areas, as posted.
5. Public access prohibited from December 1 – May 15 on that portion of the property east of Hwy 135.

ARTICLE IV – BOATING RESTRICTIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL DIVISION CONTROLLED PROPERTIES, INCLUDING STATE TRUST LANDS LEASED BY COLORADO PARKS AND WILDLIFE

9064 - AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES (ANS)

- A. All vessels and other floating devices of any kind, including their contents, motors, trailers and other associated equipment, are subject to inspection in accordance with inspection procedures established by the Division prior to launch onto, operation on or departure from any Division-controlled waters or vessel staging areas.
- B. Any aquatic nuisance species found during an inspection shall be removed and properly disposed of in accordance with removal and disposal procedures established by the Division before said vessel or other floating device will be allowed to launch onto, operate on or depart from any Division-controlled waters or vessel staging areas.
- C. Compliance with the above aquatic nuisance species inspection and removal and disposal requirements is an express condition of operation of any vessel or other floating device on Division-controlled waters. Any person who refuses to permit inspection of their vessel or other floating device, including their contents, motor, trailer, and other associated equipment or to complete any required removal and disposal of aquatic nuisance species shall be prohibited from launching onto or operating the vessel or other floating device on any Division-controlled water. Further, the vessel or other floating device of any person that refuses to allow inspection or to complete any required removal and disposal of aquatic nuisance species prior to departure from any Division-controlled water or vessel staging area is subject to quarantine until compliance with said aquatic nuisance species inspection and removal and disposal requirements is completed.
- D. Any person operating a vessel or other floating device may be ordered to remove the vessel or device from any Division-controlled water by any authorized agent of the Division if the agent reasonably believes the vessel or other floating device was not properly inspected prior to launch or may otherwise contain aquatic nuisance species. Once removed from the water, the vessel or other floating device, including its contents, motor, trailer and associated equipment shall be subject to inspection for, and the removal and disposal of aquatic nuisance species.
- E. It is unlawful for any person to, or to attempt to, launch onto, operate on or remove from any Division-controlled water or vessel staging area any vessel or other floating device without first submitting the same, including their contents, motors, trailers and other associated equipment, to an inspection for aquatic nuisance species, and completing said inspection, if such an inspection is requested by any authorized agent of the Division or required by any sign posted by the Division. Further, it is unlawful for any person to fail to complete the removal and disposal of aquatic nuisance species if such removal and disposal is requested by an authorized agent of the Division or required by any sign posted by the Division.
- F. It is unlawful for any person to, or to attempt to, launch onto, operate on or remove from any Division-controlled water or vessel staging area any vessel or other floating device if they know the vessel or other floating device, including their contents, motors, trailers, or other associated equipment, contain any aquatic nuisance species.

Basis and Purpose:

These changes to Chapter W-9 constitute an annual review of the chapter, including but not limited to, adding and removing wildlife properties based on real estate transactions that occurred since March of 2017. Other specific regulatory changes are detailed below.

Property Consistency Changes and Clean-ups

- Regulations on the Arikaree SWA have been removed, which restricted hunting to youth/mentor hunting only in certain designated areas. The previous youth/mentor area was established when the property was first acquired, in anticipation of high levels of public use, which has not transpired. Therefore, this youth/mentor hunting area has been removed.
- Field Trials are now prohibited by regulation on Bravo and Messex SWAs. The lease agreements on portions of Bravo SWA already prohibited field trials, which is now specified by regulation. Additionally, Messex SWA is not conducive to field trials because it consists of a checkerboard of easements that make up the property intermixed with private land. Therefore, to avoid conflicts, field trials are now prohibited at these SWAs.
- Several regulations on Overland Trail SWA, Overland Trail STL, as well as Atwood and Ford Bridge STLs have been removed, specifically those related to hunting reservations, limits on number of hunting days, and check-in and out procedures. Since these areas are not in high demand and do not provide quality hunting, the previous regulations were no longer necessary. These changes will also create consistency with other nearby river properties.
- Regulations relating to small game hunting around ponds and allowing target practice on Jackson Lake SWA have also been removed for consistency with other waterfowl properties.
- Regulations related to blinds on augmentation ponds on Tamarack SWA have also been removed, since blinds no longer exist on this property.
- Night hunting is no longer allowed on Brush Prairie Ponds SWA. The City of Brush, who owns the property, has raised safety concerns about night hunting on the property due to its adjacent location to the Xcel power plant and several residential homes. Target practice is now also prohibited for similar safety reasons.
- All SWAs and STLs in Area 3, except those associated with reservoirs and fishing, are now closed from 9pm – 4am for consistency. Also, for consistency, all of the regulations on these applicable SWAs and STLs have been modified to have the same reservation dates, the same stipulations for the launching and takeout of vessels, and that same check-in provisions, which also comply with the new night-time closure.
- Mandatory check-in and out procedures have been added via regulation for the Lonetree Tract of Elliott SWA and other applicable SWAs starting September 1 for consistency amongst SWAs managed primarily for waterfowl.

- Fishing is now prohibited on Andrick Ponds SWA. This property is used solely for waterfowl and turkey hunting and all of the ponds on the property are either augmentation ponds or brood stock ponds, where fishing is not compatible.
- Complaints of loud music and parties at night have increased at Jumbo and Prewitt SWAs. Therefore, new nighttime quiet hours have been added for these properties as well as prohibiting target practice for public safety.
- Reservations have been limited to three per hunter annually on Centennial Valley SWA in Area 4 for consistency with other waterfowl reservation properties along the South Platte River. This property also experiences high hunting demand, which necessitates the limit on annual reservations.
- Closure dates for the Mitani-Tokuyasu SWA have been modified from March 1-August 15 to March 1-August 31 for consistency with the other SWAs in Area 4. Horse use is also now similarly prohibited.
- Sandy Bluffs SWA, with associated property regulations, have been added to Chapter W-9. The closure date on the Sandy Bluffs STL have also been adjusted for consistency with the SWA, since both properties are adjacent to each other.
- Duck Creek STL and applicable property specific regulations have now been added to Chapter W-9. This property has been open for several years, but was previously not listed in Chapter W-9. The State Land Board and area office have asked for the property to be added to the chapter so that specific access provisions can be enforced and so the public is better informed of these restrictions.
- Float tubes or craft propelled by hand or electric motors are now allowed for fishing, setting decoys, or retrieving downed waterfowl on Red Lion and Prewitt SWAs for consistency with the other three SWAs in Area 3 that have reservoirs and allow fishing and hunting.
- New restrictions on Bravo STL prohibit access from March 1–August 31 annually, and only allow deer hunters on the property opening weekend of the regular plains rifle deer season and the first day and weekend of the late plains rifle deer season. These new restrictions were requested by the State Land Board for consistency with other STLs and the adjacent SWA.
- Waterfowl and small game hunting on Centennial Valley SWA during the waterfowl seasons is now restricted to Saturdays, Sundays, Wednesdays, and legal holidays, for consistency with the other SWAs located along the South Platte River. Additionally, since the designated trail no longer exists on Centennial Valley SWA, this access restriction has been removed from regulation.
- New regulations have been established on Sandsage and Stalker Lake SWAs to state that only bows and shotguns loaded with birdshot are permitted for hunting on these properties. Previously only archery was allowed for deer hunting. Since small game hunting opportunities are also available on these properties, this change to regulation also allows hunting with shotguns, as long as birdshot ammunition is used.
- An archery range has also been established on Stalker Lake SWA and because of the close proximity to residential homes, a new regulation has been established that limits target practice to bows only and only from this new archery range.

Camping on Brown's Park SWA

Previously there were no regulations on some of the units in Brown's Park SWA to prohibit camping in areas that would be detrimental to the property. Although conflicts have been minimal in the past,

establishing regulations where camping is prohibited will provide greater clarity to the public who utilize this property.

Name Change of Rabbit Creek Unit of the Cherokee SWA

The Rabbit Creek unit was renamed and dedicated in 2006 in the memory of Roy Brown, a former wildlife technician, to the Roy Brown Unit. CPW real estate records list the parcel as the Roy Brown Unit and maps generated from the GIS unit refer to the parcel as the Roy Brown Unit, however, the parcel was still referred to as the Rabbit Creek Unit in Chapter W-9 regulations and in the regulation brochures. To correct this discrepancy and alleviate confusion to the public, the Rabbit Creek Unit has been changed to the Roy Brown Unit via regulation as well.

Closing Hunting at Home Lake SWA

Home Lake is an easily accessible SWA east of the City of Monte Vista that is bounded on all sides by County Road 3 East and Sherman Lake Circle. The placement of the roads surrounding the lake lends itself to local residents walking dogs, jogging, riding bicycles, driving vehicles, and an overall, high level of public use. Veterans from the nursing home frequently utilize the newly constructed handicap-accessible asphalt walkway and pier for fishing and wildlife viewing. Middle school students and teachers regularly walk across CR 3 East to Home Lake on lunch breaks, class field trips, and after school to enjoy the wildlife. Home Lake also serves as a popular fishery for Monte Vista residents, who fish the lake year-round. Many of these anglers use kayaks, canoes, float-tubes, and motorboats to fish the deeper areas of the lake. Due to the large numbers and variety of waterfowl at Home Lake, wildlife viewing is also a popular activity. Therefore, there is a high potential for conflicts between hunters, homeowners, students, veterans, anglers, wildlife viewers, and non-wildlife recreationists in this heavily used and easily accessible SWA. Prohibiting hunting on Home Lake will significantly reduce the inherent risk to the public, homeowners, students, and veterans while providing an important and permanent rested area for waterfowl.

New Open Dates for Playa Blanca SWA

Playa Blanca State Wildlife Area (SWA) is located southwest of Alamosa and is comprised of flooded wetland impoundments, primarily managed for waterfowl. Previously, public access was permitted on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from November 1 through January 30 annually. Playa Blanca SWA was otherwise closed for the remainder of the year and provided no other public access to hunters, anglers, or wildlife viewers. Modifying the open dates on the property to be July 16- February 14 annually on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays will provide the public with more waterfowl and small game hunting opportunities throughout the entire length of the waterfowl hunting season and provide the public with summer fishing opportunities near the City of Alamosa. It will also make management of the property consistent with other nearby wetland SWAs, providing protection for waterfowl during the nesting season.

Amendments to Rosemont Reservoir SWA

Historically Rosemont Reservoir had a seasonal closure from November 1 through May 10. Float tubes and picnicking were also restricted on Rosemont Reservoir SWA. However, a new lease was signed between Colorado Springs Utilities (CSU) and Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) on January 1, 2017, which will now allow the SWA to be opened to anglers during ice-off conditions, allow for the use of float tubes, and allow for picnicking year round. Shooting and ice fishing on the property have always been prohibited, but staff wanted these restrictions added to the regulations to make it easier for the public to know what is permitted.

Amendments to Turk's Pond Closure Language

Turks Pond SWA has a public access closure within a quarter mile of the high water line all around the lake to give migrating and wintering ducks and geese a resting place free from any hunting pressure. The closure also includes fishing and all human activity. The regulatory language in Chapter W-5 and Chapter W-9 for this closure previously did not match however. Therefore, new language has been added to both chapters for consistency, and to provide additional clarification on what is allowed and what is prohibited within the closure area.

Establishment of San Luis Hills SWA

In April 2016, Western Rivers Conservancy, a conservation group from Oregon, purchased approximately 17,020 acres along the Rio Grande River in Costilla County. The property was then transferred to Costilla County under the agreement that it would be managed by Colorado Parks and Wildlife as a State Wildlife Area under a Memorandum of Understanding. USFWS purchased a conservation easement on the property to protect it from development.

The property is one of a few remaining large intact tracts of land along the Rio Grande Corridor. It is the largest tract of public land in Costilla County. It lies within the Rio Grande Natural Area between the Alamosa National Wildlife Refuge to the north, and New Mexico's Rio Grande Wild and Scenic River corridor to the south. The Rio Grande River forms the property's west boundary and includes nearly five miles of important riparian habitat along the river.

Establishing the property as San Luis Hills State Wildlife Area will formalize CPW's management authority over the area, allowing state statutes and regulations to protect and improve the wildlife and habitat on the property. This property will also provide hunting and fishing access to the residents and visitors to Costilla County, along with other SWA management benefits.

Establishing Camping as First-Come First Serve at San Luis Lake SWA

In 2016, Colorado Parks and Wildlife combined San Luis Lake State Park and San Luis Lake State Wildlife Area, with the property currently being managed wholly as a State Wildlife Area. During the transition year of 2017, CPW maintained the reservation process during the busy season. However, the reservation process created multiple conflicts amongst campers, which required CPW personnel involvement.

Removing the reservation process for camping on San Luis Lakes SWA will minimize CPW personnel time, while still maintaining the opportunity to respond as needed. This removal of the reservation process also simplifies camping operations to the public and maintains consistency with other surrounding campgrounds, which currently operate on a first-come, first serve basis, including part of the Great Sand Dunes and Zapata Campgrounds.

Creation of Wind in the Willows SWA Regulations

On December 13, 2013, Colorado Parks and Wildlife purchased a public fishing easement that allowed pedestrian access for fly-fishing only, which was named the Wind in the Willows SWA. Shortly after the closing of the public fishing access easement, special regulations were adopted in Chapter W-1 regarding the fishing restrictions agreed to in the access easement. However, the property was not included in Chapter W-9 at that time. Including the property in Chapter W-9 will now ensure inclusion of the other restrictions identified in the access easement including prohibitions on nighttime use, dogs/other pets, fires, overnight camping, and fishing by any means other than with artificial flies.

"Easement Area" as used in the Wind in the Willows regulation means the area of the property that has pedestrian access for fly-fishing only. The Easement Area specifically is the area twenty (20) feet beyond the banks on either side of the Lake Fork of the Gunnison River between the northerly and southerly boundaries of the property.

New Regulations for Maybell State Trust Land (STL)

Maybell STL currently has no designated camping areas and there are no plans to designate any in the future. There has been significant conflict in the past regarding camping on the Maybell STL, partly because many hunters got confused when they read the regulations. Therefore, the wording has been changed to clarify to the public that there is no camping allowed on this STL.

Similarly, the entire portion of the Maybell STL west of Moffat County Road 19 has been signed as closed to motor vehicles due to the fact that under the current STL regulations, vehicles are limited to designated roads, and no designated roads exist in that portion of the property. Adding regulatory wording that

specifically closes the western portion of the STL to vehicles will make that provision more clear and will help with enforcement in the future.

Enrollment of Whetstone Mountain into the STL Public Access Program

Whetstone Mountain STL is bordered by National Forest Service lands to the north and west; private lands to the east, and a mix of private and public lands to the south. It also provides access to some public lands that would otherwise be inaccessible. The property provides elk, mule deer, black bear, and small game hunting opportunity as well. Based on these recreational values, Whetstone Mountain has now been enrolled in the Public Access Program with access allowed via foot and horseback, from the last Saturday in August through the end of February annually.

New Article Specific to State Fish Units

Within the hatchery section of CPW, there was interest in updating the State Fish Unit regulations and creating general hatchery regulations that would be applicable to all State Fish Units in the state instead of grouping them in with State Wildlife Areas. Therefore, a new article (Article IV) has been created for just State Fish Units (hatcheries), with regulations in #904 being applicable to all hatcheries and regulations in #905 being hatchery specific.

The vast majority of the hatchery specific regulations are pre-existing, having just moved from #901 to #905. Several hatcheries no longer require hatchery-specific regulations, since their provisions are now covered under #904. Most of the new hatchery specific regulations designate which areas of the property are open to hunting, as an exception to the general “no hunting” provision stated in #904.

The statements of basis and purpose for these regulations can be viewed and copies obtained from the Colorado Division of Parks and Wildlife, Office of the Regulations Manager, Policy and Planning Unit, 1313 Sherman, Room 111, Denver, CO 80203.

The primary statutory authority for these regulations can be found in § 24-4-103, C.R.S., and the state Wildlife Act, §§ 33-1-101 to 33-6-209, C.R.S., specifically including, but not limited to: §§ 33-1-106 and 33-1-107, C.R.S.

EFFECTIVE DATE - THESE REGULATIONS SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE MAY 1, 2018 AND SHALL REMAIN IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UNTIL REPEALED, AMENDED OR SUPERSEDED.

FINAL REGULATIONS- CHAPTER W-16 - PARKS AND WILDLIFE PROCEDURAL RULES**ARTICLE I - MEETINGS****#1601 - Conduct of Meetings**

See Article 4 of Title 24, CRS, for rule making and other applicable meeting and hearing requirements

A. Regular Meetings

1. Public Presentation - In addition to normally scheduled opportunities to testify on matters before the Commission, persons or groups wishing to participate in a regular Commission meeting may request to be placed on the agenda by submitting a written request to the Director at least 30 days before the meeting. The public may participate during the meeting at the discretion of the Chairman or ~~president~~ presiding officer.

B. Adjudicatory Hearings

1. Review of Game Damage Settlements and Claim Denials

See §§ 33-3-101 to 204, CRS, for additional detail and requirements

- a. Game Damage Claims Settled by Agreement Between Claimants and the Division
 - 1) Only settlements of game damage claims equaling or exceeding \$5,000 in total value must be reviewed by the Commission, and then only where the damage is something other than forage loss to wild ruminants on privately owned or leased private land. All other settlements may be paid by the Division without Commission review.
 - 2) Review will be based on the written materials and documentary evidence provided to the Commission by the Division and, unless the Commission directs otherwise, there will be no oral presentations or further submittals to the Commission on the settlement.
 - 3) Except as may otherwise be directed by the Commission, game damage settlements will be reviewed at the next regular meeting of the Commission following their receipt, provided the settlement, together with its supporting materials and documentation, is received by the Commission at least thirty days prior to the meeting.
- b. Game Damage Claims Recommended for Denial by the Division
 - 1) Any claimant seeking or otherwise requiring Commission review of a game damage claim recommended for denial by the Division, or a game damage claim where the claimant and the Division have otherwise failed to reach a settlement, shall file a written request for review with the Commission. The requirement for a written request for review applies to all claimants, including claimants that have waived arbitration of a forage loss to wild ruminants on privately owned or leased private land. Such request for review shall be mailed to the Commission within ten (10) days of claimant's receipt of the Division's written notice of denial or offer of settlement unacceptable to the claimant.
 - 2) The request for review shall include:
 - a. the claimant's name, address and telephone number;
 - b. a narrative statement of the claim, including the amount at issue and a complete statement of the factual and statutory basis supporting payment of the claim as requested;
 - c. copies of the ten (10) day notification(s) and proof of loss filed with the Division;
 - d. copies of the written documentation submitted with, and in support of, the proof of loss;
 - e. any other documentary evidence supporting the claim or disputing the grounds stated as the basis for the Division's action in its notice of denial or offer of settlement, including photographs, and;

- f. any other written materials supporting the claim or disputing the grounds stated as the basis for the Division's notice of denial or offer of settlement, including signed statements by third party witnesses.
- 3) Commission review will be based on the request for review and any written materials or documentary evidence provided to the Commission by the Division in response to the request for review submitted by the claimant, and unless the Commission directs otherwise, there will be no oral presentations or further submittals to the Commission.
- 4) Except as may otherwise directed by the Commission, such claims will be reviewed at the next regular meeting of the Commission following their receipt, provided the request for review is received by the Commission at least thirty days prior to the meeting.

2. License Suspension Appeals

See § 33-6-106, CRS for additional detail and requirements

- a. All license suspensions will be heard initially and decided by the Commission's hearing examiner. A copy of the hearing examiner's initial decision shall be sent to the licensee by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the last known address of such person. The hearing examiner's decision shall advise him or her of the right to appeal that decision to the Commission. Any person seeking or otherwise requiring Commission review of the hearing examiner's decision shall file a written request for review with the Commission (and provide a copy to the hearing examiner). Such request for review shall be mailed to the Commission within thirty (30) days of receipt of the hearing examiner's decision. If a timely appeal is not made to the Commission, the hearing examiner's decision shall become effective as of (1) the date stated therein (in no event sooner than 35 days after the issuance of such decision) or (2) the date of licensee's receipt of the decision or of attempted delivery to the licensee's last known address, whichever is later. If a timely appeal is made to the Commission, the hearing examiner shall send notice to the licensee of the date of their scheduled hearing before the Commission and advise that the hearing examiner's initial decision to suspend is automatically stayed pending Commission review and final action.
- b. The request for review shall include:
 - 1) the person's name, address, telephone number and case file number;
 - 2) a narrative statement of the person's position, including a complete statement of the factual and statutory basis supporting relief from the decision of the hearing examiner and the relief requested;
 - 3) copies of any written documentation or documentary evidence submitted to the hearing examiner;
 - 4) copy of the hearing examiner's decision, including the findings of fact and conclusions of law, and;
 - 5) a copy of the transcript of the hearing on the suspension of license privileges conducted by the hearing examiner. The person requesting review shall be responsible for the production of the transcript.
- c. Commission review will be based on the request for review and any additional written materials and documentary evidence provided to the Commission by the hearing examiner in response to the request for review, and unless the Commission directs otherwise, there will be no oral presentations or further submittals to the Commission.
- d. Except as may otherwise be directed by the Commission, license suspensions will be reviewed at the next regular meeting of the Commission following their receipt, provided the request for review is received by the Commission at least thirty days prior to the meeting. The decision of the Commission shall become effective the date of the licensee's receipt of the decision or the date of attempted delivery to the licensee's last known address.
- ~~e. Written notice of the final decision of the commission shall be sent to the licensee by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the last known address of such person. The notice shall advise the licensee that he or she may appeal the Commission's suspension decision to the state district court as provided in § 24-4-106, C.R.S., by bringing an action for judicial review within 30 days after such action becomes effective. If such judicial action is initiated, the~~

~~licensee may contemporaneously apply in writing to the Commission (and provide a copy to the hearing examiner) for a stay of the license privileges suspension pending review and final action by the district court. If requested, the Commission shall automatically grant such stay.~~
e. Written notice of the final decision of the commission shall be sent to the licensee by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the last known address of such person. The notice shall advise the licensee that he or she may appeal the Commission's suspension decision to the state district court as provided in § 24-4-106, C.R.S., by bringing an action for judicial review within 35 days after such action becomes effective. If such judicial action is initiated, the licensee may contemporaneously apply in writing to the Commission (and provide a copy to the hearing examiner) for a stay of the license privileges suspension pending review and final action by the district court.

- f. When deciding upon the duration of any license privileges suspension term, the hearing examiner will consider the facts of the underlying violation(s) giving rise to the criminal conviction(s) and the administrative license suspension hearing, along with all relevant written materials and documentary evidence contained in the Division's records, all written materials and documentary evidence provided by the party prior to the administrative license suspension hearing, and all evidence provided during the hearing, and will give specific consideration to the absence or presence of the following factors:
- 1) Whether the violation(s) caused or resulted in the take of wildlife, injury or death of a person, or damage to or destruction of public or private property;
 - 2) The number of violations arising from the same transaction or occurrence;
 - 3) Whether the violation(s) involved the take of species listed as endangered, threatened or of special concern;
 - 4) Whether the violation(s) involved the take of trophy wildlife;
 - 5) Whether the violation(s) showed an intentional, knowing, or negligent disregard for wildlife or public safety;
 - 6) Whether the violation(s) involved intentional, knowing or negligent action on behalf of the party;
 - 7) Whether the party has any prior violations of wildlife statutes or regulations, or violations of state or federal law committed while hunting, fishing, or engaging in a related activity;
 - 8) Whether the party has any prior license suspensions;
 - 9) Whether the violation(s) occurred while the party was subject to a prior suspension or otherwise unlicensed;
 - 10) Whether the violation(s) involved any assault or threat to or resisting a peace officer;
 - 11) Whether the party self-reported the violation(s) or otherwise attempted to remedy or ameliorate the harm caused by the violation(s);
 - 12) The experience and age of the party and other social factors or circumstances associated with the violation(s);
 - 13) Whether the party interfered with or hindered the investigation of the violation(s);
 - 14) The criminal penalties imposed as part of the violation(s);
 - 15) Whether the party acted alone or in concert with other parties;
 - 16) The species and the number of wildlife taken, and;
 - 17) Whether the violation(s) involved any specified illegal manner of take (use of bait, traps, snares, poison, etc.).

Based on all the evidence presented, the hearing examiner will determine the weight to be given to any factor and that factor's effect on the duration of the suspension term.

3. Review of Petitions for Declaratory Orders

See §§ 24-4-105(11), CRS for additional detail and requirements

- a. Any person may petition the Commission for a declaratory order to terminate a controversy or to remove uncertainty as to the applicability to the petitioner of any statutory provision or any rule or order of the Commission.
- b. The petition must be in writing and shall include:

- 1) the petitioner's name, address and telephone number;
 - 2) the statutory provision, rule or order at issue;
 - 3) a narrative statement of all facts necessary to show the nature of the controversy or uncertainty and the manner in which the statutory provision, rule or order applies or potentially applies to the petitioner;
 - 4) whether the petitioner holds any permits, passes, or registrations issued pursuant to Articles 10 through 15 of Title 33, C.R.S., as amended.
- c. The Commission will determine, in its discretion and without notice to the petitioner, whether to rule upon the petition. In determining whether to rule upon a petition filed pursuant to this regulation, the Commission will consider the following matters, among others:
- 1) Whether a ruling on the petition will terminate a controversy or remove uncertainties as to the applicability to the petitioner of any statutory provision or of any regulation of the Commission.
 - 2) Whether the petition involves any subject, question or issue which is the subject of a formal or informal matter or investigation currently pending before the Commission or a court involving one or more of the petitioners.
 - 3) Whether the petition involves any subject, question or issue which is the subject of a formal or informal matter or investigation currently pending before the Commission or a court but not involving the petitioner.
 - 4) Whether the petition seeks a ruling on a moot or hypothetical question or will result in an advisory ruling or opinion.
 - 5) Whether the petitioner has some other adequate legal remedy, other than an action for declaratory relief pursuant to Rule 57, Colorado R. Civ. P., which will terminate the controversy or remove any uncertainty as to the applicability to the petitioner of the statute, regulation, or order in question.
- d. Commission review, if any, will be based on the petition and any additional written materials and documentary evidence provided to the Commission by the Division in response to the petition, and unless the Commission directs otherwise, there will be no oral presentations or further submittals to the Commission.
- e. Except as may otherwise be directed by the Commission, petitions for declaratory orders will be reviewed at the next regular meeting of the Commission following their receipt, provided the petition is received by the Commission at least thirty days prior to the meeting.
- f. If the Commission determines that it will rule on the petition, the following procedure will apply:
- 1) The Commission may rule upon the petition based solely upon the facts presented in the petition. In such a case:
 - i. Any ruling of the Commission will apply only to the extent of the facts presented in the petition and any amendment to the petition.
 - ii. The Commission may order the petitioner to file a written brief, memorandum or statement of position.
 - iii. The Commission may set the petition, upon due notice to petitioner, for a non-evidentiary hearing.
 - iv. The Commission may dispose of the petition on the sole basis of the matters set forth in the petition.
 - v. The Commission may request the petitioner to submit additional facts in writing. In such event, such additional facts will be considered as an amendment to the petition.
 - vi. The Commission may take administrative notice of the facts pursuant to the State Administrative Procedure Act and may utilize available experience, technical competence and specialized knowledge in the disposition of the petition.

- ~~3) copies of any written documentation of documentary evidence in support of the petitioner's request for review.~~
- ~~c. Commission review will be based on the request for review, and any written materials or documentary evidence provided to the Commission by the Division, in response to the request for review submitted by the claimant, and unless the Commission directs otherwise, there will be no oral presentations or further submittals to the Commission.~~
- ~~d. In the case of termination of a suspension, unless waived by the Commission at that same hearing, a petitioner must complete the following requirements prior to the purchase of any license:
 - ~~1) Pay a reinstatement fee of three hundred dollars;~~
 - ~~2) Perform forty hours of service under the Division's direction on wildlife or state parks projects; and~~
 - ~~3) Successfully pass a Hunter's Safety course.~~~~

Basis and Purpose
Chapter W-16 - Procedural Rules

Basis and Purpose:

These regulatory changes are being made, as requested by the Office of Legislative Legal Services (OLLS), to stay consistent with Colorado Revised Statutes. State statute 24-2-106 allows 35 days for an individual to appeal to the district court on a commission's suspension decision, whereas the previous regulation # 1601.B.2.e only provided 30 days. Additionally, state statute 24-4-106(5) provides guidance that a stay of a license suspension should only be considered "if irreparable injury would otherwise result", whereas the previous regulation #1601.B.2.e stated, "if requested, the Commission shall automatically grant such a stay." Since the Committee of Legal Services voted not to extend this regulation, based on the concerns voiced by the OLLS, regulation #1601.B.2.e needed to be readopted by the Commission with these changes implemented in order to remain valid.

Similarly, the Committee of Legal Services also voted not to extend regulation #1601.B.5 related to mid-term suspension reviews based on repeal of the mid-term suspension review statute 33-6-106(9). Therefore, this regulation was deleted in its entirety.
