
Pronghorn Biology

- Fastest land mammal in N.
 America
- Black horn sheath
 - Shed annually
- Nine-month gestation
 - Twins = 15-20% of mom's body weight

- 31,000 pronghorn
 - ~40% of statewide population
- 1.1 million people
- 31,000 mi²
 - 80% overall pronghorn range
- Landownership
 - 81% private
 - 19% federal & state




