

What is BGSS?

- BGSS guides annual big game hunting regulations.
- Sets the timing, length, and number of seasons for hunting big game in Colorado.
- CPW's BGSS framework covers 5 years.
 - Current BGSS expires at the end of 2024.

What does CPW consider?

- Various biological, social, and economic factors
- Internal staff input and public input from resident and nonresident members of the public
- Financial implications to CPW and local economies and huntingrelated businesses.

Early Seasons

Recommendation: Status Quo + optional additional stand-alone limited archery antlered deer season.

- Early seasons were the major focus of the previous 2020-2024 BGSS process.
- Some concern over safety issues, but most hunters are content with the Status Quo.
- Creates an archery buck hunt that doesn't overlap with other methods of take.
- Highly desirable opportunity.

Regular Rifle Seasons

Recommendation: Revert to the previous (2015-2019) season structure, 5-9-9-5.

- Previous BGSS is more congruent with the current population management goals for elk and mule deer.
- Split support between current and previous BGSS.
- 3rd season reverts to 9 days (2 weekends).
- Helps to address access concerns.
- Removes overlap with Thanksgiving holiday.

First Rifle Deer Season

Recommendation: Optional, limited deer hunting during the first rifle season when necessary to meet biological objectives and/or social management objectives.

Would be determined on a herd-by-herd basis (DAUs).

- Would manage to herd objectives.
- Provides additional regional flexibility.
- Could potentially reduce hunter crowding and pressure on deer during the 2nd and 3rd rifle seasons.
 Would maintain focus on a quality elk hunting experience.





Second Rifle Pronghorn Season

Recommendation: Second 9-day rifle pronghorn season starting the third Saturday in October. Would be optional and determined on a herd-by-herd basis (DAUs).

- Provides additional regional flexibility to distribute license allocation to meet management objectives.
- Would reduce hunter crowding/pressure during opening weekend.
- General public support.


OTC Archery Elk and Rifle Elk - Public Outreach





Winter 2023 OTC Survey - Overview

- Roughly 6,000 invitations to elk hunters via email.
- 50-50 distribution to archery & firearm hunters.
- 75-25 distribution to resident & non-resident hunters.
- Opinions on alternatives, influences, possible behavior change.
- 26% response rate.





Winter 2023 OTC Survey - Results Overview

Alternatives	Overall, similar results between archery & rifle alternatives: Most supported - limited licenses (OTC, draw) available by management area
	Least supported - status quo, eliminating OTC
Influences	Again, similar results between archery & rifle alternatives. Top influences: Herd health Overcrowding



Limit nonresident OTC, draw available by management unit. Status quo for residents.







Limit resident & nonresident OTC, draw available by management unit.





Winter 2023 OTC Survey - Key Takeaways

Approach 1 (limit resident and nonresident OTC)	 Draw applications likely to increase. With methods of take combined, equal proportion of those likely to hunt in CO more often & those likely to no longer hunt in CO (14% for both).
Approach 2 (limit nonresident OTC)	 With methods of take combined, higher proportion of survey takers likely to hunt in CO more often (20%) than those likely to no longer hunt in CO (11%).
Comparing Approaches	 Approach 1: slightly higher proportion likely to no longer hunt in CO (14%) vs. Approach 2 (11%). Approach 2: higher proportion likely to hunt in CO more often (20%) vs. Approach 1 (14%)









Status Quo (Staff Preferred Alternative)	No change.
Alternative R1 in the OTC survey.	
Alternative 1	Limit nonresident rifle licenses - limited licenses available through the draw by management area
Alternative R5 in the OTC survey.	(DAU or GMU); status quo OTC for residents.
Alternative 2	Phased limitation of all resident and nonresident
Alternative R6 in the OTC survey + phased limitation	rifle licenses - limited licenses available through the draw by management area (DAU or GMU).





Administrative Changes - Cow Moose

Recommendation: Optional late cow moose season that is additional to the regular October 1-14 moose rifle season, and is valid for all regular rifle deer and elk seasons (with no hunting during the breaks between seasons) when necessary to meet management objectives for moose.

- Increases cow moose hunting opportunity and should increase cow moose harvest without increasing crowding.
- Will allow for more management flexibility.





Administrative Changes - PLO Black Bear

Recommendation: PLO rifle bear licenses are not required to be unlimited OTC for every population/DAU (managers could still choose an unlimited PLO OTC strategy).

 Allows CPW flexibility to assign bear PLO seasons to either unlimited OR limited licensing strategy based on bear management plan objectives and trajectories.





BGSS Cycle Length

Recommendation: Status Quo; maintain the current five-year cycle length.

- Allows for flexibility and adaptiveness to complex challenges.
- Allows staff to be responsive to changing biological conditions and social issues.
- Public generally wants to maintain 5 year structure.
