

El Paso County contains some of Colorado's most significant landscapes. The convergence of the high plains and Rocky Mountains is more dramatic here than at any other point along the Front Range. The land rises abruptly to more than 14,100 feet, and well-known landmarks such as the Garden of the Gods outcrop along the edge that marks the transition between mountains and plains. Within this remarkable setting, residents and visitors value and enjoy the parks, open space, trail, and recreation opportunities that the natural environment supports, as well as the facilities and programs that El Paso County Parks provides. Population growth and continuing urbanization create a need for additional recreational opportunities and efforts to protect some of the county's distinctive landscapes.

El Paso County Parks currently manages approximately 7,855 acres of park land, 138 miles of trails, and approximately 2,500 acres of conservation easements. These park and open space areas provide outdoor recreation opportunities and habitat preservation while regional trails provide critical non-motorized connections between communities within the county.

El Paso County Parks has a long history of collaboration with other governmental agencies and organizations to ensure that local and regional efforts are well coordinated and informed. Without a strong regional approach to open space and trail planning, these open space and trail networks will be disjointed and not adequality protect key landscapes within the county nor provide suitable regional trail connections.

Currently only the county has a parks master plan that addresses the need for parks, open space, and regional trail connections in the northern area of the County, which the Town of Monument is located. However, since the county focuses on regional parks and trails, there is no strategic plan in place to guide development of parks, open space, or trails within the town. This is a critical gap that needs to be addressed, as the town and county are seeing significant growth in the northern area of the county.

El Paso County Parks fully supports the Town of Monument's application to fund the development of a Parks, Trails, Open Space, and Recreation Master Plan. This plan will provide a forward thinking, long-range planning document that the town and county can use to ensure that the recreational and preservation needs of the town and county are being addressed. Furthermore, this plan will be used to ensure that regional trail connections are being developed which will provide key non-motorized connections between the town and several of the county's regional parks.
