The Paths to Mesa Verde Project is being administered by the Federal Highway Administration Central Federal Lands Highway Division (CFLHD). Therefore the Paths to Mesa Verde is a Federal Project and will be administered to meet all federal standards. Federal NEPA requirements will guide the Environmental Clearances. The PTMV will impact artificially created wetlands within the Highway 160B ROW (Borrow ditch) between the Town of Mancos and the Highway 160 B junction. An Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) 404 permit is required and Wetland Land Banking will be used to offset the impacts to wetlands within the CDOT ROW. A floodplain development permit Notice to Proceed has been issued by the County and requires the AOCE 404 permit.



REGIONAL & LOCAL PROJECT LOCATION


PATHS TO MESA VERDE (PTMV)



ABOVE; The overall pathway concept is shown in red. This map illustrates the improved accessibility that the proposed pathway would provide to public facilities. Public facilities are diverse and plentiful. The pathway will provide direct access to the BLM Cortez SRMA, which includes 27 miles of world class mountain bike trail in the BLM Phil's World Trail system near Cortez, and 12.6 miles of world class mountain bike trail on the BLM Aqueduct Trail system near Mancos. The trail will also provide direct access to the BLM Chutes and Ladders dispersed camping area which is favored by trail riders. The PTMV will also provide access to trails on State of Colorado Land Board Lands, the trail system at the Montezuma County Fairgrounds and access to the many community events held there, The Montezuma Cortez High School, All Mancos schools K-12, the Pueblo Community College Southwest, the recently restored McElmo Flume and interpretive pullout, and numerous mom and pop businesses along the route. The long-range vision includes regional trail connections to Durango, Rico and Towacc and collaboration with those adjacent communities is already underway. The PTMV alignment is planned to lie 100% within the existing CDOT ROW on the Mancos side to minimize impacts to Big Game. Montezuma County is coordinating with CDOT and CPW on proposed Big Game Crossings and are considering those in our design.

Overall Pathway Concept and Status

PATHS TO MESA VERDE




Segment B is currently in PE Design Phase. Plans are at the CDOT 30% FOR Level. 90% plans are anticipated ready for review in spring 2024 and final plans are scheduled for May 2024 making Segment B "shovel ready."

Segment A is the last leg of the PTMV and it requires additional planning. The County has secured \$688,250 in planning dollars for ROW planning and acquisition, a final route alignment and engineering design. Planning work on this section began spring 2023.

PHASE 1 CURRENT STATUS; The Mancos Side, Segments C & D, are currently under Central Federal Lands Highway Division (CFLHD) project administration through the transportation alternatives Program (TAP). CFLHD has committed \$4.7 million with \$990,000 in local match already secured. PE is currently at the 30% FIR review level, 90% FOR is anticipated in Spring 2024, and final design is anticipated by Spring of 2025. Construction is currently scheduled for spring of 2026 and should be competed in one construction season. Final environmen-
