No mitigation required because all impacts have been reduced to negligible through planning & collaboration with the resources agencies. The County has a 404 permit for the project from the Army Corps & BLM has completed a NEPA review. Permanent impacts to aquatic resources have been kept to 186 sq ft of the Molly Ditch, 526.94 sq ft of the Molly Ditch wetlands, & 10 sq ft of the North Fork riverine wetland. The Corps and/or BLM have completed compliance with the ESA and NHPA. All work inside critical habitat for western yellow-billed cuckoo will be done outside the period of potential occupancy by the species. No eligible historic resources will be affected by the project. Potential impacts from construction of the clear span bridge over the North Fork will be managed by installing erosion control measures prior to vegetation clearing.

The County has entered into a trail maintenance plan with the Delta County School District that includes control of noxious weeds along the trail on at least an annual basis. Th ongoing maintenance is expected to reduce the presence of noxious weeds along the trail compared to present conditions.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE: The applicant is responsible for adhering to all applicable environmental compliance regulations including: Migratory Bird Treaty Act; concurrence with US Fish and Wildlife Service if any federally listed species of concern exist in project area; Clean Water Act section 404; US Army Corps of Engineers 404 permits; raptor buffer guidelines and incorporation of CPW recommended wildlife best management practices; CO Senate Bill 40 (33-5-101-107, CRS 1973 as amended); Colorado Historical, Prehistoric and Archeological Resources Act. All required permits must be acquired prior to submitting a non-motorized trails grant application.


