1. PROJECT NEED

15 points

A. Give a detailed description of the project, including information such as mileage or width of trail maintenance, re-route or restoration plans, and any other trail components/structures.

The South San Juan Wilderness (SSJW) is a pristine and ecologically diverse area known for its breathtaking landscapes and extensive non-motorized trail system. However, over the years, these trails have experienced wear and tear, and hazard trees have posed safety risks to hikers, backpackers, horseback riders and other outdoor enthusiasts. This project proposal outlines a comprehensive effort to address these issues by utilizing Conservation Legacy Trail and Saw Crews. The primary objective of this project is to perform maintenance on approximately 180 miles of non-motorized trails within the (SSJW). This includes clearing debris, repairing erosion damage, improving trail signage, and restoring trail tread to ensure safe and enjoyable recreational experiences. Hazard Tree Mitigation: To enhance the safety of trail users, the project will identify and mitigate hazard trees along the trail system. Hazard trees pose a significant risk during adverse weather conditions and need to be removed or made safe to prevent accidents.

B. Describe the project's urgency and why it is being pursued at this time.

The South San Juan Wilderness Non-Motorized Trail Maintenance and Hazard Tree Mitigation project is urgently needed due to immediate safety risks from deteriorating trails and hazard trees. With increasing visitation to the area, addressing these hazards is essential to prevent accidents and strain on resources. Furthermore, a time-sensitive funding opportunity through CFLRP can significantly enhance resources for this project, aligning with broader conservation goals to preserve the ecological integrity and recreational value of the SSJW, ensuring long-term sustainability for future generations.

C. Describe the current condition of the existing trail. Include how it arrived at its current condition.

The (SSJW) currently faces degraded trail conditions due to a chronic lack of resources and maintenance. Over the years, insufficient funding and staffing have left the non-motorized trail system in disrepair, with eroded paths, fallen debris, and the persistence of hazard trees, endangering the safety of outdoor enthusiasts. This neglect has not only hindered public access and enjoyment but also resulted in the deterioration of the wilderness's ecological integrity as trails become prone to erosion, causing downstream impacts on sensitive ecosystems. Urgent intervention is required to rectify these trail conditions and restore the area's safety and ecological vitality, highlighting the pressing need for the proposed project's timely execution and the opportunity to match CFLRP funds for a comprehensive and sustainable solution.

2. COMMUNITY BENEFIT

The South San Juan Wilderness Non-Motorized Trail Maintenance and Hazard Tree Mitigation project offers substantial benefits to local communities in Conejos County, including its Hispanic demographics. By creating job opportunities and engaging local youth in the Conservation Legacy Crews, the project not only contributes to skill development and employment but also fosters a sense of ownership and stewardship among community members. Additionally, as improved trail conditions enhance the recreational appeal of the wilderness area, it is likely to attract more visitors, boosting tourism-related businesses and providing an economic stimulus to the county. This, in turn, can bolster local economies, generate revenue through increased visitation, and create a ripple effect of economic growth, all while preserving the area's natural beauty and cultural heritage, which holds great significance to the Hispanic communities in Conejos County.

B. Outline any deficiencies or barriers to access this project would address or improve for the abovementioned community.

This project would significantly alleviate several barriers to access that have long hindered the communities in Conejos County and the greater San Luis Valley (SLV). First and foremost, it would address the pervasive effects of the beetle kill epidemic, which has left the wilderness area densely populated with dead and hazardous trees, rendering trails unsafe and practically impassable. Moreover, the project would tackle the historical lack of trail maintenance, which has reduced accessibility for trail users, including the Hispanic communities, and prevented them from enjoying their natural surroundings. By revitalizing and maintaining the trail system, this project would provide safe and accessible recreational opportunities, fostering a stronger connection between the communities and their cherished wilderness, while mitigating the environmental hazards posed by the beetle kill epidemic.

C. Estimate the number of people and/or types of user groups that will have access to recreational opportunities as a result of this project. Include methods for determining this estimate.

This project is estimated to significantly expand recreational opportunities for a diverse range of user groups, including hikers, horseback riders, outfitter guides, fishermen, hunters, and youth groups. To determine the precise numbers and types of users who will benefit, we will employ the National Visitor Use Monitoring (NVUM) data collection method, which involves systematic surveys and counts of wilderness visitors over a specific timeframe. By analyzing historical NVUM data for the (SSJW) and conducting updated surveys following project completion, we can confidently estimate the increase in user numbers across these various categories. This data-driven approach will provide accurate insights into the project's impact on recreational access, ensuring that the benefits are quantified and validated for each user group.

3. PROJECT MANAGEMENT

A. Give a detailed description of who will oversee the trail work. Include who will perform the maintenance activities (staff, volunteers, conservation corps, contractors, etc.)

The oversight of project trail work, monitoring, and data collection in the (SSJW) will be managed by dedicated U.S. Forest Service (USFS) staff who possess extensive experience and expertise in wilderness conservation and trail maintenance. These USFS professionals will play a crucial role in coordinating and supervising the various aspects of the project, ensuring its successful execution. The actual trail work and on-ground efforts will be carried out by skilled and motivated teams, including the Southwest Conservation Corps and Ancestral Lands Crews. These crews, comprised of young adults and tribal conservation corps members, will be at the forefront of trail maintenance, hazard tree mitigation, and data collection activities. Their hard work and commitment will be instrumental in achieving project objectives while simultaneously providing valuable training and employment opportunities to the next generation of conservation stewards.

B. Outline any CPW State Trails funding received in the last five years and if the project(s) were completed on time, on budget and within scope. While our District has regrettably not secured a CPW State Trails grant due to a shortage of matching funds, we have been fortunate to secure multiple similar grants from various sources to support our trail maintenance initiatives. These include grants from the Colorado Youth Corps Association, the Colorado State OHV Grant Program, and funds allocated through the Secure Rural Schools Act. This robust financial support has enabled us to consistently achieve on-time and complete results in our trail maintenance projects. Despite the internal USFS staffing issues for maintenance activities, these successful grant acquisitions have reinforced our commitment to preserving and enhancing our trail systems, ensuring they remain accessible and enjoyable for all outdoor enthusiasts.

4. PLANNING

A. Discuss the process that identified this maintenance project as a priority.

The prioritization of this maintenance project was driven by a comprehensive process that considered multiple factors. Firstly, the deteriorating trail conditions, marked by erosion, debris, and hazard trees, were identified as a pressing safety concern for outdoor enthusiasts. The evident need for immediate attention was further underscored by a decline in the quality of recreational experiences in the (SSJW). Recognizing the urgency, the project sought to leverage CFLRP matching funding, which not only aligned with broader conservation goals but also presented a time-sensitive financial opportunity. Additionally, the engagement of youth crews through the Conservation Legacy Trail and Saw Crews not only addressed the need for skilled labor but also reflected a commitment to fostering the next generation of conservationists. Thus, a thorough analysis of declining trail conditions, financial opportunities, and the strategic inclusion of youth engagement collectively identified this project as a priority for the preservation and enhancement of the (SSJW).

This project is well-supported by trail maintenance categorical exclusions (CE), as it aligns with the forest management guidelines that allow for certain trail maintenance activities without the need for extensive environmental analysis. These exclusions recognize the importance of regular trail upkeep in ensuring public safety and access. Furthermore, this project strongly resonates with the goals and objectives outlined in the new Rio Grande National Forest Plan, which emphasizes the preservation of wilderness areas, enhancement of recreational opportunities, and the engagement of local communities in stewardship efforts. The project's commitment to maintaining and improving the non-motorized trail system in the South San Juan Wilderness harmonizes with the overarching principles of the Wilderness areas areas while fostering public enjoyment and understanding of these unique landscapes.

5. MAINTENANCE AND SUSTAINABILITY

A. Explain how the site will be maintained and monitored after the grant funded work is complete (operation and maintenance plans, future budgeting commitments, etc.)

Following the completion of grant-funded trail work, the trail system in the (SSJW) will be subjected to an ongoing monitoring and maintenance regime. This will involve regular trail condition surveys conducted by trained personnel to identify any emerging issues. Additionally, site visits will be scheduled to assess the effectiveness of prior maintenance efforts and address any new challenges. Public feedback will be actively solicited and considered to ensure that user experiences and safety concerns are addressed promptly. Furthermore, the project team will proactively pursue additional funding sources, including grants and partnerships, to sustain long-term trail maintenance efforts, ensuring that the trails remain safe, accessible, and enjoyable for the community and outdoor enthusiasts in the years to come. This comprehensive approach to monitoring, maintenance, and funding sustainability will help preserve the (SSJW) as a pristine and well-kept natural gem.

B. Describe the best management practices that will be used to construct the trail to ensure that the trail and its amenities will be sustainable.

To ensure the long-term sustainability of the trails in the (SSJW), the project will diligently adhere to the (USFS) Trail Management Objectives and Trail Maintenance Standards. These guidelines will serve as a blueprint for responsible and sustainable trail management practices. By aligning trail work with USFS objectives, we will prioritize the protection of natural resources, minimize environmental impacts, and enhance the overall visitor experience. Additionally, adherence to the Trail Maintenance Standards will ensure that trails are constructed and maintained to withstand the rigors of use and the challenges posed by the wilderness environment. This approach not only guarantees that the trails remain accessible and safe but also preserves the wilderness's ecological integrity.

6. WILDLIFE AND NATURAL RESOURCES

The project's positive impacts on wildlife and natural resources will be rigorously evaluated through a (USFS) interdisciplinary approach. This approach will involve collaboration among experts in various fields, including biology, ecology, hydrology, and botany, to comprehensively assess the ecological effects of trail maintenance and hazard tree mitigation activities. By conducting thorough studies and assessments, the project aims to minimize disruptions to wildlife habitats, preserve water quality, and protect the overall health of the ecosystem. Additionally, monitoring efforts will ensure that any unintended consequences are identified and addressed promptly, further enhancing the project's commitment to the responsible and sustainable management of the (SSJW), ultimately benefiting both wildlife and natural resources.

B. Describe any wildlife and natural resources issues raised by CPW staff during the application consultation.

The project's implementation timing has been strategically planned to avoid critical periods such as hunting season and calving areas, ensuring minimal disruption to wildlife and their habitats. Activities will be scheduled outside of hunting seasons, recognizing the importance of maintaining this traditional outdoor activity. Additionally, efforts will be made to steer clear of known calving areas during sensitive times to safeguard the well-being of wildlife populations, particularly ungulates. By respecting these critical timeframes, the project underscores its commitment to responsible and wildlife-friendly trail maintenance and hazard tree mitigation, promoting harmony between outdoor recreation and the region's diverse fauna.

C. Explain how potential wildlife and natural resource impacts will be avoided, minimized, and/or mitigated (trail realignment, seasonal closures (include dates), signage, gates, game cameras, etc.)

Potential wildlife and natural resource impacts will be systematically addressed through a multi-pronged approach. Trail maintenance and hazard tree mitigation activities will be strategically planned to avoid these areas during critical times, such as nesting, calving, and migration. Where avoidance is not feasible, strict adherence to US Forest Service guidelines and best management practices will be enforced to minimize disturbances and ensure responsible construction and maintenance. Continuous monitoring will provide early detection of any unforeseen impacts, allowing for immediate corrective action. This meticulous approach, integrating careful planning, responsible execution, and vigilant monitoring, will safeguard wildlife and natural resources, minimizing disruptions while promoting the long-term ecological health of the (SSJW).

7. PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT & PARTNERSHIPS

A. Outline public engagement activities for this project (public meetings, comment periods, surveys, etc.)

USFS trail maintenance activities fall under the category exempt from environmental analysis by the Secretary of Agriculture, recognizing their low impact on the environment. As such, the level of public outreach for this project aligns with its complexity and the potential for significant environmental impacts. While the project's primary focus is on responsible and routine trail maintenance, ensuring the safety and accessibility of these valuable recreational resources, the engagement with the public will be scaled to the project's scope. Emphasis will be placed on transparent communication, soliciting feedback, and addressing any concerns to maintain transparency and community involvement, even though it falls within the exemption category due to its essential and environmentally low-impact nature.

B. Describe any partnerships that will ensure the project's success (public agencies, conservation or recreation groups, local businesses, etc.)

Our project benefits significantly from long-standing partnerships with the Southwest Conservation Corps, a trusted organization known for its expertise in trail maintenance and conservation efforts. Over the years, our collaboration with them has yielded successful results in preserving and enhancing wilderness areas. Additionally, we are excited to announce a new partnership with Ancestral Lands, a dynamic organization specializing in engaging tribal conservation corps members in meaningful conservation work. This collaboration brings fresh energy and a diverse perspective to our project, ensuring its success by tapping into the unique skills and insights that Ancestral Lands brings to the table. These strong, combined partnerships leverage experience and innovation, underpinning our commitment to the project's goals while fostering a broader and more inclusive approach to wilderness preservation.

C. Describe how potential opposition to this project or its implementation will be identified, addressed and managed.

While we do not anticipate significant opposition to this project, we recognize the importance of proactive engagement and open communication with all stakeholders. To identify any potential opposition, we will employ a transparent and inclusive approach, seeking input from local communities, environmental organizations, and other relevant parties early in the planning process. This will allow us to address concerns and incorporate feedback into the project design where feasible. Additionally, our commitment to public outreach and collaboration ensures that any issues can be managed through constructive dialogue and adaptive management strategies, ultimately fostering a spirit of cooperation and shared stewardship in our efforts to enhance and maintain the (SSJW).

8. BUDGET AND FUNDING

The source of matching funds for this project has been secured for 2024, and there is a commitment to matching future funds from the (CFLRP) for the district over the next five years. CFLRP funds have been identified as a top priority for the forest, and this project aligns perfectly with the program's objectives. The secured match for 2024 provides the initial financial support needed to launch the project, and the commitment to matching future CFLRP funds ensures a sustainable funding source over the coming years. This strategic financial planning ensures the project's stability and long-term success, allowing us to address critical trail maintenance and hazard tree mitigation needs in the (SSJW) effectively.

If this funding application is unsuccessful, several negative consequences could unfold. Firstly, the lack of financial support would impede our ability to perform essential trail maintenance, leading to further deteriorating trail conditions that pose safety risks and hamper recreational access in the (SSJW). Additionally, the inability to address hazard trees could result in heightened dangers for outdoor enthusiasts during adverse weather conditions. Moreover, the loss of (CFLRP) matching funds would not only jeopardize the project's financial stability but could also have ripple effects on other forest priorities. It might lead to a strained relationship with partners, including the Southwest Conservation Corps and Ancestral Lands, potentially affecting their willingness to engage in future projects. Furthermore, the erosion of trail conditions would likely exacerbate, impacting both ecological integrity and visitor experiences in the long run. Overall, the consequences of an unsuccessful funding application could have far-reaching implications for the (SSJW) and its stakeholders.


