A RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT APPLICATIONS FOR GRANT FUNDING FROM THE STATE OF COLORADO DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES STATE TRAILS PROGRAM FOR PLANNING AND CONSTRUCTION DESIGN FOR THE "NARROWS" SECTION OF THE POUDRE RIVER TRAIL AND TRAILS STEWARDSHIP SUPPORT

WHEREAS, the City manages approximately 11 miles of the Poudre River Trail within City limits and in unincorporated Weld County; and

WHEREAS, the "Narrows" section of the Poudre River Trail has structural issues due to the adjacency of the river and a sandstone bluff and requires significant design and repair to protect the Trail's current alignment; and

WHEREAS, the Natural Areas & Trails Division would benefit from additional trails stewardship seasonal staff; and

WHEREAS, supplemental funding opportunities are available through grant programs with the Colorado State Trails Program; and

WHEREAS, the City and the Poudre River Trail Corridor, Inc. will be co-applicants on one grant application for "Narrows" design and engineering; and

WHEREAS, a grant in the amount of up to \$45,000 from State Trails for the "Narrows" design requires a minimum 25% match of \$11,250; and, a grant in the amount of up to \$75,000 from State Trails for the Trails Stewardship pilot program requires a minimum 25% match of the grant funds in the amount of \$18,750 and

WHEREAS, grant funding will be used to work with consultants for the design and engineering of repairs to the "Narrows" section of the trail and to hire a seasonal Trail Stewardship crew to perform trail maintenance tasks; and

WHEREAS, the properties where the projects will occur will be under the control of the City of Greeley for at least 25 years and conserved for public outdoor recreation in perpetuity; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the residents of Greeley to receive this grant funding and to complete the projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GREELEY, COLORADO:

1. The Greeley City Council hereby supports and authorizes a submission of grant applications to the Colorado Department of Natural Resources.

- 2. The City Council authorizes the Greeley Culture, Parks and Recreation Department to execute any document or submit any electronic response that is necessary to obtain the grant funding.
- 3. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage.






Poudre River Trail @ The Narrows Local Vicinity Map







To whom it may concern:

The North Front Range Metropolitan Planning Organization (NFRMPO) is pleased to support the City of Greeley's application to the Colorado Parks & Wildlife Non-Motorized Trails Planning Grant. The Poudre River Trail is an important asset to both Greeley and the region, and it sees heavy recreational use year-round. The requested funding will allow the City of Greeley to improve a section of the Poudre River Trail that currently follows a narrow ridge between the top of an erodible river bluff and the river surface. This section of the trail has been subject to several major flood events resulting in erosion that is undermining the trail and causing significant long-term damage. As part of the Lower Poudre River Master Plan adopted by the City in 2019, the Narrows section has been identified as a section at risk of being undermined from both bank erosion caused by the river and drainage flowing over the trail on its path to the river.

For over 40 years, completing the 45-mile Poudre River Trail has been a priority among Northern Colorado partners. With a vision to connect Greeley to Fort Collins along one of the state's most historic and iconic rivers, it serves as the backbone of our regional trail system. Upon completion, it will connect residents in four of our region's largest and fastest growing communities, as well as unincorporated areas with otherwise limited recreation and transportation options.

As adopted in the NFRMPO's <u>2013 Regional Bike Plan</u>, the Poudre River Trail is one of the 12 Regional Active Transportation Corridors (RATC) and is the backbone of the regional trail network. This designation has been reaffirmed in subsequent plans at the local and regional level, including the NFRMPO's <u>2016 Non-Motorized Plan</u>, the <u>2045 Regional Transportation Plan</u> (RTP), the <u>2021 Active Transportation Plan</u> (ATP), and the <u>2050 RTP</u>. The NFRMPO believes the project aligns with the NFRMPO's <u>2050 RTP</u> vision which is to ensure the multimodal transportation system in Northern Colorado is safe, socially and environmentally sensitive, and strengthens the region's quality of life and economic vitality. This project will improve the trail's resiliency and lessen the trail's environmental impact. Improvement of this trail corridor will also provide better connections to surrounding communities.

Improving the Poudre River Trail will help the NFRMPO achieve its regional transportation goals. We strongly support this project and appreciate Greeley's efforts in building out and futurizing the trail.

Thank you for the opportunity to express our support for the City of Greeley's application to the Colorado Department of Natural Resources State Trails program for the Poudre River Trail Narrows Planning project. This is an urgent safety matter for the many recreation users in the Signature Bluffs Natural area as this section of trail is being damaged by erosion from flood events.

The Cache la Poudre River National Heritage Area is a renowned area that offers ample opportunities for adventure on a healthy working river filled with abundant wildlife and breathtaking scenery. Premiere facilities, including trails, visitor centers, and interpretive exhibits, make Northern Colorado a beautiful place to live and visit. The river's heritage stems from conflicts over water use, which led to the development of Western water law, innovative irrigation techniques, and water measurement devices. As part of the implementation of our 2022 Strategic Interpretive Plan, we are working to champion the National Heritage Area as a whole.

The Poudre River Trail is one of The City of Greeley and Larimer County's top priorities. Once Larimer County addresses the gaps in the trail in the coming year, the Poudre River Trail will be over 40 continuous miles in length, from Bellvue, north of Fort Collins, to Island Grove Park in Greeley. The pending loss of an existing section of the Poudre River Trail referred to as the "Narrows" in the Greeley managed section of the regional trail would be a devasting blow to a project 25 years in the making.

This letter is in support of the City of Greeley's grant application to State Trails to study the Narrows Section of the Poudre River Trail located just to the west of the Red Barn at 71st Avenue.

The main objective of our Cycling Without Age program is to provide free trishaw rides to members of our community who are housebound, living in supported living situations, have mobility challenges or simply want to find themselves in nature. Since our Greeley trishaws are housed in the Red Barn, the Narrows Section of the Trail is important for our ability to ride west along the River to the Poudre Learning Center and Windsor.

If this section of the Poudre Trail were to become unusable, we would be required to re-route our trishaws through an adjacent residential subdivision along public streets without a designated bike lane. This would be a much less desirable alternative for our pilots because we would be sharing the street with passenger vehicles and away from this beautiful, historic section of the Poudre River.

If the City designs improvements to the Narrows section of the Poudre Trail (to insure its continued and sustainable use for future community residents), it would be a very important project for all of us to support!

Dear Karen:

I would like to express my support the City of Greeley's grant application to evaluate the Poudre River Trail section, known as the Narrows.

The Narrows section of the Poudre Trail is one of the most beautiful stretches of the trail, with its tunnel of shade and the natural bluffs along the south side. It is one of my favorite sections. Erosion of the river banks has required the erection of some temporary fences along the way that make the narrows even more narrow and making walking and biking traffic somewhat hazardous under certain situations. The section is within short walking distances from two of the most central trail heads in Greeley, and connects the East and the West ends of the trail. A failure of the Narrows section of the trail caused by erosion or other natural deterioration would in my view be somewhat catastrophic for the increasing number of our community that use the trail on a regular basis.

Maintaining and buttressing the existing Narrows section is of utmost importance but ideally, I would hope The City would also consider extending the width of the trail in parts of this section. Currently The Narrows section is off-limits to the local Cycling Without Age trishaw rides provided for the elderly and disabled in our community. In the narrowest section, the passage is not wide enough when a trishaw meets a recumbent bike or a three-wheel bike, requiring the approaching bike/trike to turn around or back up. A widening of only a foot or two would allow a slow transport of these wide cycles meeting each other in the Narrows.

I was very encouraged to see that the city is pursuing this grant project to examine and address the needs of the Narrows section. If I can help in any way, please let me know. My e-mail is stevejbrinkman@gmail.com
