



Map of GMNC Trails as of spring 2023




Map of trails test groomed April 2023


Map of generalized area for snowshoe trail placement

The Grand Mesa, Uncompanier and Gunnison National Forests (GMUG), Grand Valley Ranger District manages 550,000 acres of public lands, managing approximately 750 miles of trails for multiple uses. A portion of theses trails are designated for non-motorized use, and unique and very popular subset are Nordic ski trails.

For over 30 years, the Grand Mesa Nordic Council (GMNC) and US Forest Service have partnered to manage a Nordic ski trail network on the Grand Mesa. This system is exceedingly popular, and draws winter enthusiasts from all over the west. The GMNC is interested in expanding the existing trail network to accommodate increased use, and to provide for a diversity of user experiences. While the Forest recognizes the desire for expansion, we do not have the capacity to conduct the necessary environmental analysis required as a prerequisite.
