- 1) Herman Gulch Trail Drainage Maintenance w/ Environmental Learning for Kids (ELK)
- Range/township/section: Arapaho National Forest, Clear Creek Ranger District
- Latitude and longitude: 39.715961, -105.867482
- CenterPoint: 1.5 miles up from the trailhead
- Trail: Herman Gulch Trail / Continental Divide Trail
- Public entrance points: Herman Gulch Trailhead
- Major project elements: We will be building a rock turnpike of roughly 20 feet, with a culvert through the middle for drainage. The turnpike will shed water underneath the tread surface—which currently suffers greatly from water pooling issues, erosion, and social use trails—and will concentrate use back onto the trail. An excellent stone quarry is located directly up the hill, making prep work for the project site minimal. Many social braids exist through the proposed section, allowing trail use to continue while the project is underway. Once the project is completed, all social trails will be decommissioned. This project is intended to engage youth from the Denver ELK Youth Naturally program to perform trail work alongside a backcountry camping experience.
- Local vicinity map: I70 (east-west), Redline=1.5 miles from Trailhead to project site
- Project site map: R=Rock quarry, P=project site (see photo), C=Camping





2) Devil's Thumb/High Lonesome Trail w/ Headwaters Trail Alliance

- Range/township/section: Arapaho National Forest, Sulphur Ranger District
- Latitude and longitude: 40.002192, -105.735050
- CenterPoint: The project site is roughly 2 miles east/north from the Devil's Thumb trailhead
- Trail: High Lonesome Trail / Continental Divide Trail
- Public entrance points: <u>Devil's Thumb Trailhead</u>
- Major project elements: About 2 miles from the Devil's Thumb Trailhead on the High Lonesome Trail there is a natural water creek crossing. Over years of growing use, the water crossing continues to get wider and trail users often throw logs in the creek to get across. This location is in need of a new planked bridge crossing to accommodate hikers, backpackers, and bikes alike. CDTC volunteers will work in collaboration with Headwaters Trails Alliance to construct a new bridge crossing in this location. Once completed, this project will provide a safer water crossing for all trail users in this area and will limit damage to the surrounding environment associated with trampled vegetation and aquatic habitats.
- Local vicinity map: Redline=2 miles from Trailhead to project site at the Hamilton Creek crossing
- Project site map: P=project site (Photo is example bridge from 2023 High Lonesome Bridge project)



3) San Juan Mountains Project w/ Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado

- Range/township/section: Rio Grande National Forest, Divide Ranger District
- Latitude and longitude: 37.534692, -106.879335
- CenterPoint: The 3.5 mile CDT corridor between the Archuleta Lake and South Fork Archuleta Trails
- Trail: Continental Divide Trail, Archuleta Lake, South Fork Archuleta Trail, and Spruce Lake areas
- Public entrance points: Big Meadows Road 410 from west Highway 160
- Major project elements: It will involve a 5 mile pack in from outside the Wilderness boundary near the western edge of Big meadows Reservoir. Base camp may be set up outside of the Weminuche Wilderness area for better partnership coordination which will require hikes into the project site each day. The CDT Trail Crew will likely backpack in the tools/supplies to camp closer to the project area with the help of pack support. This effort will be focused on cross cut work, corridor clearing, and general trail maintenance of this remote 3 mile section CDT over 5 days, with the first and last days mainly involving pack in/out of supplies. (Final details still being coordinated.)
- Local vicinity map: Highway 160, Redline=5 miles from Wilderness boundary to CDT
- Project site map: Project area = 3 mile redline along CDT, basecamp location still TBD





4) Community Stewardship Event in Leadville/Twin Lakes with Get Outdoors Leadville

- Range/township/section: San Isabel National Forest, Leadville Ranger District
- Latitude and longitude/Centerpoint: TBD
- Trail/Public Access Points: Turquoise Lake area TBD
- Major project elements: In mid July 2024 during Latino Conservation Week, a one-day initiative is planned to engage historically underrepresented groups along the CDT by providing an inclusive opportunity to support enhanced trail access within their communities. CDTC acknowledges the importance of connecting locals with their nearby trails and access points to the CDT. The project's specific location, likely around the Turquoise Lake area, will be determined with input from the community.
- Local vicinity map: TP=Tennessee Pass, TL=Turquoise Lake, Highways 24 and 91
- Project site map: TBD (Photo from 2024 Steamboat Springs event)



5) Trail Adopter Training in Colorado

- Range/township/section: Front Range (Golden/Denver/Fort Collins)
- Latitude and longitude/Centerpoint: TBD
- Trail/Public Access Points: TBD
- Major project elements: This project will take place between mid-April and early-May. The one day training will go over the Trail Adopter handbook that was created in coordination with VOC's Outdoor Stewardship Institute. The first half of the day will include outdoor classroom style education elements, with the second half of the day involving hands-on practice with basic trail maintenance functions including drainage work, corridor clearing, and trail signage guidelines. After completion of the training, volunteers will be eligible for adopting their own section of the CDT.

- Range/township/section: San Isabel National Forest
- Latitude and longitude/Centerpoint: TBD
- Trail/Public Access Points: Potentially Cottonwood South Trail and/or South Texas Creek, access at Cottonwood Pass
- Major project elements: Project elements to be determined.
 The Colorado Trail Foundation Project schedule will be solidified in early 2024, and at that time the co-located CDT projects will be identified and prioritized. This potential project near Cottonwood Pass will likely be at high altitudes, and could take place within the Collegiate Peaks Wilderness.
- Local vicinity map: Photos from Cottonwood pass area








7) Colorado Fourteeners Initiative Partner Project - Grays Peak

- Range/township/section: Arapaho National Forest, Dillon Ranger District
- Latitude and longitude: 39.638423, -105.812429
- Centerpoint: The project will be around 2-3 miles south/west from the trailhead
- Trail: Grays Peak Trail / Continental Divide Trail
- Public Access Points: Grays and Torreys Summer Trailhead
- Major project elements: Greys Peak, which is the official high point of the CDT, sees extremely high usage and requires consistent trail maintenance work through drainage improvements and surface hardening to protect nearby alpine environments. CDTC will be supporting CFI's efforts in the area again for 2024.
- Local vicinity map: Redline=2.75 miles from trailhead to intersection with Torreys cutoff trail
- Project Site Map: P=Project site area (photo from 2023 project)





8) Crew Chef Training with Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado


- Range/township/section: Front Range/Denver Metroa Area
- Latitude and longitude/Centerpoint: TBD
- Trail/Public Access Points: TBD
- Major project elements: CDTC is requesting a virtual Crew Chef
 Training through VOC in conjunction with a hands-on component in the Denver area for prospective volunteers. The exact
 location and timetable are still to be determined, but it probably occurs in the spring before the field season in Colorado fully
 starts.

9) Regional Trail Adopter Meetups

- Range/township/section: Prospective locations include Steamboat Springs, the Denver area, and/or Southern Colorado (e.g. Pagosa Springs or South Fork)
- Latitude and longitude/Centerpoint: TBD
- Trail/Public Access Points: TBD
- Major project elements: Big Agnes is the official CDT Adopter for the 75+ miles of the trail near Steamboat Springs. Coordinating an event with them in conjunction with a Pride on the Divide hike as part of CDTC's Gateway Community Outreach efforts in June is an option. CDTC has several Trail Adopters who live on the Front Range but adopt sections of the trail near Georgetown, Colorado. With CDTC's Birthday in May, there is a possibility to coordinate a meetup in May along the I70 corridor. Pagosa Springs and South Fork are also designated CDT Gateway Communities with nearby Trail Adopters, and CDTC might be able to coordinate a meetup in conjunction with a April or May VOC Cross Cut Training.

The USDA's Forest Service is the lead agency for administering the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail (CDNST). As documented in the Interagency Memorandum of Understanding, we work closely with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), National Park Service (NPS), and the lead trail-wide partner, the Continental Divide Trail Coalition (CDTC), to manage and maintain a continuous, protected route for the 3,100 mile-long CDNST. The purpose of this letter is to express my full support for the CDTC's 2024 administrative/support work in Colorado to strengthen relationships with wildlife managers and agency partners and to increase volunteerism throughout the state. Since 2012, CDTC has worked alongside federal land management agencies to protect and manage the CDNST.

With work along 20 National Forests, 4 National Park Service units and 13 Bureau of Land Management field offices, CDTC has stepped into a unique partner role as a convening and facilitating organization, as well as one with unparalleled skill in stewarding the CDT. CDTC's approach to bringing multiple partners, organizations, and communities into the work to protect the CDT is critically important for the long-term protection and management of the CDT. The partnerships and supportive work that CDTC will undertake in Colorado in 2024 will be critical to our future three-year Great American Outdoor Act project, which will address critical trail deferred maintenance from 2025-2028.
