STEWARDSHIP ELIGIBILITY

Why is this program a good fit for your organization?

Stewardship of our area public lands is the cornerstone of Durango Trails and one which has been upheld for over 32 years. Durango Trails partners with our area land managers, saving them hundreds of thousands of dollars each season addressing trail maintenance, signage, stewardship, and communication needs to area trail users. As the go-to trails organization, Durango Trails has a responsibility to elevate trail experiences by planning, building, and maintaining our trail network, educating our trail users, and sharing best practices for maintenance, leave no trace, and share the trail ethics. Last year, we maintained 100 miles of trail, which included 26 trails improved, miles of vegetation cleared, hundreds of downed trees, nearly 1,000 grade reversals, and more. And yet, there is so much more to be done. This pilot program aligns perfectly with our mission and will give us the resources to expand the impact of our trail crew and ambassador team to address large deferred maintenance projects which will return regionally important trails to sustainable and world-class levels.

STEWARDSHIP WORK PLAN

Describe the type of trail stewardship and the anticipated work plan your organization would perform if funded by this opportunity.

Durango Trails anticipates several trail projects for the 2024 season with this funding opportunity: 1) Partner with the USFS on drainage improvements to Dry Fork, Hoffheins, and lower Colorado Trail at Junction Creek. We began this work in 2017 but have been unable to continue the drainage improvements necessary. We plan to do heavy maintenance on trail areas sitting on the fall line, create grade dips, grade reversals, and erosion control devices to improve the ability for the water sheet flow off the trail. 2) Address specific drainage issues and critical erosion impacts on the BLM trails in our managed area including the Durango-area Grandview trails, and BLM-portions of Skyline, Smokejumper, Ridgeview and Animas. In addition, our newly launched Trail Stewardship Ambassador will be stationed at trailheads to educate trail users about trail stewardship.

STEWARDSHIP CREW

Describe your current ability to hire and support trail crews who perform non-motorized trail maintenance.

Our business model is to train and hire crew leaders who work throughout the season and also manage volunteer events. Our crew leads receive annual Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado Training, Certified Sawyer training, and 1st Aid Wilderness training. We have crews that work from March through November, and are local folks who prefer seasonal work. We pay a living wage, provide paid time off, and offer a variety of employee recognition and retention programs. In addition, we partner with Fort Lewis College to hire 3 interns a year, 1 of whom would be specifically assigned to this work.

Our professional trail crew is supported by a committed and energetic volunteer base of over 400 per season.

AREA OF IMPACT

Describe the importance of the trail system that would be positively impacted by this work to both the local community and the State of Colorado.

The project focus is Durango-area National Forest and BLM land. The state and regionally important Colorado Trail is a gem ending in our backyard, and it connects to the popular Dry Fork and Hoffheins trails. This system is used by locals and tourists alike, including through-hikers and bikers from across the state, local equestrians, and more. Our area BLM trails provide world-class recreational opportunities.

These highly-used trails are part of the robust trail system that makes Durango and the surrounding areas a sought-after location for new residents and visitors alike. Colorado's outdoor recreation industry accounts for \$9.6 billion in value-added (GDP) annually and contributed 120,000 direct jobs in 2020. According to the 2017 SCORP report, 92% of Colorado residents participate in outdoor recreation each year. Colorado's outdoor economy contributes to a higher quality of life, making people and communities happier and healthier.




