Project Description: With this grant application, the BLM Grand Junction Field Office (GJFO), located on the Western Slope of Colorado (Map 1) and managing 1.2 million acres of public lands, will have crucial maintenance preformed on large equipment purchased by the CPW Grant Program.

The GJFO currently has:

- Skid Steer
- 50" Sutter Trail Dozer
- 30" Sutter Trail Dozer
- Volvo Mini Excavator

The equipment will be used to maintain existing routes and build new ones. We are actively working on expanding recreation opportunities in Bangs SRMA, North Desert ERMA, and Cactus Park RMA. Current demand of existing routes is increasing, so maintaining those routes and providing more opportunities are recognized as priorities for our office. This equipment will so be made available to neighboring Field Offices and Ranger districts.

The Grand Junction BLM has a strong working relationship with not only the USFS, but also multiple clubs that have grant funded equipment which have been made available to GJFO when they aren't being used on the higher elevation USFS projects. These groups include Western Slope ATV Association (WSATVA), Motorcycle Trail Riders Association (MTRA), and Timberline Trail Riders. Our office has been able to accomplish some early and late season projects that would have been impossible without this additional equipment and hopes to continue this approach.

WHO

The Grand Junction Field Office, which includes McInnis Canyon and Dominguez-Escalante NCAs, manages over 1 million acres of BLM public lands. Most of the field office is within a short drive from communities in the Grand Valley (Grand Junction, Fruita, Palisade). With a population over 150,000, the Grand Valley is a popular place to work and retire because of its proximity to recreation opportunities on public lands. The area has also seen an increase in visitors from around the state and the nation due to rising demand for quality outdoor recreation. The BLM estimates over 1.1 million recreational visits annually. The vast majority of recreational visits to the field office are trail-based, including ATV and UTV riding, jeeping, and motorcycle riding along with other non-motorized trail activities.

WHERE

Most work will be focused in Recreation Management Areas where management objectives are focused on OHV trail recreation (Grand Valley Open Area, North Desert, parts of Bangs Canyon, Gateway, Barrel Springs, Horse Mountain, Rabbit Valley, Cactus Park, Hunting Grounds, and Sawmill Mesa-Wagon Park). The crew will also work throughout the Grand Junction Field Office

in Mesa, Montrose, Delta and Garfield Counties. All the work will be conducted on BLM-administered public lands managed by the Grand Junction Field Office.

WHAT

This Grant will be used for maintaining the equipment that has been purchased by the CPW Grant Program. Typically, this equipment will get serviced once or twice a season, depending on how much the equipment get used for project work. Occasionally we have needed major repairs for this heavy equipment. In 2023, the Sutter 480 needed a complete engine rebuild. This fund will also be used to fix or maintain CPW purchased USFS housed equipment.

This grant will also fund a swamper for 6 months. The swamper will be used to work with Equipment Operators, whether they are on USFS public lands or BLM public lands.

WHEN

This work will be performed during the 2025 and early 2026 season.

Program Funding Acknowledgement – The equipment used by the crew includes a decal that notifies the public that the equipment is funded by the Colorado Parks and Wildlife OHV program. Notification sign will be on site to notify public that this project is funded by CPW OHV program. Both notifications include *Colorado Registration Dollars at Work* logo.

1. Need for & Benefit of the Project (25 points):

Describe the objectives of your project and how it will benefit, and protect riding opportunities while protecting resources in the project area. (Use the following as a guideline for describing your project)

This project will ensure crucial maintenance is performed on large equipment purchased by the CPW Grant Program. The equipment will be used to maintain existing routes and build new ones. Equipment that is inadequately maintained may cause delays for improving and expanding riding opportunities so, well-maintained equipment is critical to the success of OHV trail building and maintenance efforts. These efforts also reduce impacts to natural resources caused by trail riding activities and enhance riding experiences by achieving trail management objectives. Trails in the GJFO are managed for a wide variety of riding opportunities and skill levels. Regular maintenance with working equipment will support and protect the vast riding opportunities that draw OHV enthusiasts to our field office.

This Grant would also fund a swamper for Equipment Operations on USFS and BLM lands. The swamper is needed to assist the operator with many duties. Checking fluid levels, loading/unloading equipment, providing safety with an extra set of eyes to make sure operator is performing work in a safe environment.

2. Partnerships, Support and Leverage (25 points):

Grand Junction BLM's major Partner with this grant is the USFS. The Forest Service has hired a fulltime Equipment Operator to perform work on public lands. This operator works on BLM managed lands in the Spring and Fall to extend their season and provide much needed maintenance on roads and trails in the Grand Junction Field Office.

Grand Junction BLM also works cooperatively with several other surrounding BLM units including two National Conservation Areas, the Uncompander Field Office; Mesa, Delta, and Garfield Counties; Colorado Parks and Wildlife; the Uncompandere, and Grand Mesa National Forests and private landowners to maintain connectivity and develop user friendly route systems.

The GJFO also works with Western Slope ATV Association, the Grand Mesa Jeep Club, the Bookcliff Rattlers Motorcycle Club, the Motorcycle Trail Riders Association, Stay the Trail Colorado, Grand Valley Trails Alliance, and other groups to design and maintain routes that provides for the unique needs, riding experiences, and challenges for each group. This project has not caused any known controversy within our community and several letters of support illustrate the importance of this project to the local community. Many partners contribute through donations, contributions, materials, and volunteer services that contribute to proactive management of trail resources in the Grand Valley.

3. Resource Protection, Enhancement and Restoration relative to eligible OHV grant activities

(25 points):

This project will ensure crucial maintenance is performed on large equipment purchased by the CPW Grant Program. The equipment will be used to maintain existing routes and build new ones which encourages riders to utilize existing opportunities instead of creating them. Poorly maintained trails often lead to cross-country travel and other activities that increase erosion and threaten other natural resources. These activities can result in pressure to close trails. With equipment in consistent working condition, efforts to improve drainage structures, prevent erosion, and provide sustainable riding opportunities will be efficient and timely. Providing and maintaining riding opportunities without delays will have positive direct and indirect benefits to critical resources in our project area. Examples of resources that will be protected include wildlife habitat, saline soils, cultural resources, threatened plant species, and riparian habitat.

The new trails that we are constructing with this equipment are primarily located in Recreation Management Areas where management objectives are focused on OHV trail recreation (Grand Valley Open Area, North Desert, parts of Bangs Canyon, Gateway, Barrel Springs, Horse Mountain, Rabbit Valley, Cactus Park, Hunting Grounds, and Sawmill Mesa-Wagon Park). The crew will also work throughout the Grand Junction Field Office in Mesa, Montrose, Delta and Garfield Counties. All the work will be conducted on BLM-administered public lands managed by the Grand Junction Field Office.

4. Travel Management Plan Implementation, Education and Enforcement (25 points):

The GJFO's Resource Management Plan (RMP) describes the long-term management objectives for all resources including recreation. The Travel Management Plan (TMP) works in tandem with the RMP and is designed to help achieve the objectives outlined in the RMP, including objectives for OHV recreation areas. Maintaining the equipment that allows GJFO to accomplish the outlined OHV objectives and funding a BLM swamper will be the primary work done with the fund from this grant.


Many of the trails to be maintained are multiple-use trails shared with mountain bikes, hikers, and equestrian users. The crew will make public contact with these users which will promote multiple-use trails and provide visibility for the CPW OHV grant program. The visibility and public outreach of the project's crew will help educate users about how the OHV registration fee impacts all types of recreation opportunities. Connecting OHV objectives with non-OHV users is vital to maintaining a sense of community between different recreators and the BLM's multiple-use principles.
