Project Description:

WHO?

Motorcycle Trail Riders Association (MTRA), a non-profit 501 © (3) club in Grand Junction, CO, in cooperation with the Bureau of Land Management Grand Junction Field Office, is working to maintain and improve the local Motocross track and further develop the staging/parking area at the track. The project has been authorized by the BLM and will be managed/maintained by MTRA in partnership with the BLM.

WHERE?

The Motocross Track is located in Mesa County on the east side of 27 ¼ Road, approximately 2 miles north of the Grand Junction Regional Airport, on BLM-administered land. It is within the BLM-designated Grand Valley OHV Special Recreation Management Area (SRMA). The SRMA includes a 9,700 acre OHV open area, which is open to cross-country travel and contains hundreds of miles of existing OHV routes. West of the track lies the BLM-designated 107,900 acre North Desert Extensive Recreation Management Area (ERMA), which provides access to hundreds of miles of additional OHV trails stretching all the way to Rabbit Valley on the Colorado-Utah border and beyond into Utah. OHV usage of the entire area has increased exponentially over the last years, especially since the pandemic. This trend is expected to continue for the foreseeable future due to increased population growth on the Western Slope.

WHAT?

This grant will continue to fund maintenance of the Motocross Track in the Grand Valley OHV SRMA, via a multi-year phased approach. This request is for Phase 5 of the overall project. The BLM and the Grand Junction Regional Airport funded Phase 1 development for \$250,000; this included engineered access roads and parking areas surfaced with gravel/road base, and construction of a perimeter fence around the Motocross Track. Phase 2, funded by a CPW OHV Grant in 2020, imported soil/sand to amend the native soil and created a more durable riding surface; installed infrastructure to ensure proper drainage; re-shaped and realigned dirt features to create a safe and fun riding experience; and constructed a maintenance access road around the fenced perimeter. Phases 3 and 4 funded by CPW provided continued regular maintenance of the track, including heavy equipment rental to rip/grade the track surface, provide soil amendment and watering, and improved safety features, such as purchase/installation of a starting gate. Phase 5 will continue the maintenance/improvement process using the same methods, split between contractor and volunteer labor and equipment. The project goal is to create a high-quality, modern motocross track that will serve as the anchor for the BLM-authorized staging and event area that provides a major local/regional asset for OHV recreation.

The Motocross Track is the central feature of this facility. The existing one-mile long Motocross

mainly by volunteer efforts. It had deteriorated over time and did not drain properly in several locations, resulting in ponding and rut development. Damage is especially pronounced when wet conditions exist in the area's heavy clay soils. The improvements constructed to date have resulted in greatly improved drainage and track surface conditions, providing more durable and overall safer track conditions.

In addition to the CPW funded improvements, projects completed to date by a combination of BLM funding and volunteer efforts include a shade structure, 2 beginner's tracks, a skills-building endurocross track and a rock crawling area. Future plans include construction of restrooms and spectator viewing areas. Upgrading and protecting the Motocross Track is key to the success of the staging/event area as envisioned by BLM and MTRA.

As one result of the track improvements, in addition to greatly increased usage by recreational riders, the track hosted a WeBe Racing Hare Scrambles (https://weberacing.com/) event over the 2023 Labor Day weekend. The event was highly successful, bringing several hundred riders to the Grand Valley area, with the resultant positive economic impacts due to purchase of food, gas, lodging and accessories by the racers and their families.

WHEN?

This project will be started and finished in the 2025 season, as soon as funding is procured. The work will be completed on a regular basis, primarily in the warmer months when the ground is workable by heavy equipment.

Program Funding Acknowledgement –

The Motocross track has a Kiosk, including signs which showcase "Colorado OHV Program" stickers and acknowledgement of CPW's involvement and funding of the Project. This message is important to communicate to the public about changes/improvements to the Motocross Track, and the State's efforts to support opportunities for motorized recreation.

- This project will provide regular timely maintenance of the GJ Motocross Track. Specifically, it will provide for trucking in arena sand, ripping/tilling the sand and donated organic material into the track surface to improve water retention, regrading the surface to the proper grade/slope to maximize usage and durability, and watering the track to reduce dust.
- The project will protect/improve riding opportunities by keeping the track in optimal condition, grading to minimize ponding/rutting during wet weather periods and improving rider safety by reducing dust and hazardous ruts.
- This essential maintenance will keep the track in better condition for a longer period, maximizing
 usage by providing better riding opportunities for more users, especially younger riders learning
 riding skills within a controlled environment. The track had not been maintained on a regular basis
 for many years, resulting in haphazard riding conditions and sub-optimal riding experiences.
- By improving the overall condition of the track for a longer period, this project will promote an improved, safer and more satisfactory riding experience for riders of all levels, from beginner to expert, leading to improved rider participation in the sport.
- This project is a priority at this time, as the next phase in the plan to take advantage of the previous funding provided by CPW to maintain the track at a higher level and prevent degradation.
- There is a core group of about 400-500 riders that use the track on a regular basis. On any typical weekend during the riding season, there will be an average of 30-60 vehicles in the parking lot, with anywhere from 1-4 bikes per vehicle. Many riders also use the track in the early mornings/late evenings during the summer to avoid higher temperatures.
- This project provides long-term value and sustainability by providing all levels of riders, from young families with beginning riders to experienced racers, a safe, fun and easily accessible location to learn sound basic skills and improve advanced skills. The entire track is fenced to prevent access by other than 2-wheels, and to prevent vandalism and damage by unauthorized users. Since the entire track is visible from the parking areas, families can easily monitor younger/newer riders. It encourages proper usage of the facilities and infrastructure funded by both BLM and CPW to date. By continuing to build on the improvements funded by the first 4 phases, this project will enhance the sustainability of the track and the Grand Valley riding experience for years to come.

- MTRA is the lead organization on this project, and will provide an estimated 280 hours of volunteer labor by club members. As with the first 4 phases, MTRA will partner with the BLM on the oversight of the project to ensure all project actions are in compliance with the BLM Travel Management Plan for this area.
- There is no controversy caused by this project that MTRA or BLM is aware of.
- In addition to the MTRA volunteer hours, BLM donates use of a skid steer on an as-needed/available basis for track maintenance, averaging 10 days through the riding season. The USFS also donated 480 hours of work by their Heavy Equipment crew to assist with the project in 2023. MTRA members provide advertisement of the project via the MTRA website and Facebook page, as well as word of mouth at local shops and MTRA meetings.
- Total project cost is estimated at \$73,875 including in-kind contributions.




- Travel Management: This project uses educational signage at the trackside parking lot, along with visitor contact by club members, to encourage responsible usage, reduce conflicts between user groups, and increase compliance efforts to improve adherence to OHV regulation and designations. This project is consistent with BLM's Travel Management Plan by providing a central location for accessing the SRMA, reducing the amount of dispersed access and resultant resource damage.
- Education: MTRA installed a "Welcome Ride with Respect" sign at the parking lot to promote responsible rider behavior and courtesy between the multiple SRMA user groups.
- Enforcement and Compliance: This project improves compliance with OHV rules primarily via volunteer contact with riders during maintenance activities, as well as contact during periods of heavy usage. Via these contacts, club members inform riders of the benefits provided by the CPW funds and encourage proper use of both the track and the surrounding SRMA.



5-2- PROJECT SITE MAP





The BLM Grand Junction Field Office (GJFO) works closely with the Motorcycle Trail Riders Association (MTRA) to provide high quality OHV recreation opportunities in and around the Grand Valley. With funding from the Colorado Parks and Wildlife OHV Grant Program, MTRA has partnered with the BLM to enhance and maintain the motocross tracks (main track plus two kids' tracks) and enduro cross track in the Grand Valley OHV Special Recreation Management Area (SRMA). The primary goal of this SRMA is to "produce opportunities for visitors to experience the freedom to participate in a variety of motorized OHV recreation activities which lead to a variety of beneficial recreation and economic outcomes for participants and Grand Valley communities."

The motocross and enduro cross tracks are the hub of an OHV staging and event area with direct access to nearly a nearly 10,000-acre OHV open area. They also are key components for commercial and competitive events permitted by the BLM. Ongoing maintenance of these tracks is essential for providing safe and fun OHV opportunities for OHV recreationists on public lands near Grand Junction.

The BLM GJFO enthusiastically supports MTRA's efforts to maintain the motocross and enduro cross tracks, and we encourage CPW to continue their financial support for MTRA's track maintenance program. Their work over the past five years has made a significant difference in the conditions of these OHV tracks.
