Project Description:

The Good OHV Management Crew will develop, maintain and improve OHV trails, trailheads, parking and support facilities; reconstruct OHV trails and related facilities; produce, install and maintain signage for OHV trails and support facilities; develop, deliver and provide education and rider ethics training to the OHV riding community; maintain, supply and operate facilities owned by the USDA Forest Service and BLM that are used by OHV recreationalists; implement approved federal Travel Management Plans; and provide a field presence for visitor contacts, compliance and enforcement.

The Dillon Ranger District (DRD) on the White River National Forest is seeking funding to hire a three-person Good Management OHV Crew in 2025. In 2019, the district entered the Good OHV Management Program with Colorado Parks and Wildlife. This funding enables us to continue to build a successful and productive OHV program on the DRD. The crew will maintain and improve OHV trails, trailheads, install and maintain signs, implement the White River NF travel management plan, work with volunteer groups, and conduct patrols to provide education and enforcement for visitors.

WHO

The Dillon Ranger District (DRD) is in the White River National Forest. The DRD boundary follows the exact boundary of Summit County and encompasses 312,000 acres of National Forest lands. Summit County is in the heart of the Rocky Mountains, approximately 65 miles west of Denver in the central Rocky Mountain Region of Colorado. Dillon Ranger District's proximity to the Denver Metropolitan Area is one of the reasons it is such a popular area for recreation pursuits during both summer and winter months. The nearby communities of Breckenridge, Frisco, Silverthorne, Keystone, and Dillon provide a well-developed infrastructure to support recreation-based tourism.

WHERE

The system consists of 109 miles of OHV routes including 41 miles of motorized single-track. The crew will base out of the DRD office in Silverthorne and work in the following OHV areas:

- Swan River Area- North Fork Swan, Middle Fork Swan, Georgia Pass, Glacier Ridge, #10 Road, Garibaldi Gulch
- Montezuma Area- Deer Creek, Peru Creek, Webster Pass, Chihuahua Gulch, Warden Gulch, Radical Hill, Saints John
- Tenderfoot Mountain Motorcycle Trail System
- Breckenridge Area- Pennsylvania Gulch, Indiana Gulch, Boreas Pass, Spruce Creek
- Golden Horseshoe OHV Trail System
- Spring Creek Area- Lower/Upper Spring Creek, Mahan Lake
- Green Mountain Reservoir area- Brush Creek, Mumford Gulch, Cottonwood Gulch, Williams Divide Road

WHAT

The crew is responsible for basic OHV trail maintenance, construction and reconstruction of OHV trails, maintenance of trailhead facilities, installation of travel management signs, kiosk maintenance, trail clearing, visitor education/enforcement contacts, and OHV registration compliance checks. The crew will partner with Friends of the Dillon Ranger District, Mile High

Jeep Club, Summit County Open Space, Town of Breckenridge, Summit County Mountain Bike Alliance and Summit County Off-Road Riders for volunteer projects. See scope of work below for more details.

WHEN

The crew will work 6 months from May through the end of October. This will enable them to perform annual spring openings of OHV routes and then also work through most of the hunting seasons into late fall. The crew will work 4 days per week at 10 hours per day.

Program Funding Acknowledgement

The Tenderfoot Motorcycle Trail system map includes the Colorado Parks & Wildlife OHV program logo along with the information at the kiosk. We will add the program logo to other OHV trailheads this summer including Tiger Road, Peru Creek Road, and Montezuma area. We currently have the OHV program stickers on carsonite signs through the Golden Horseshoe trail system.

REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING NARRATIVE

For the FY25 grant request Colorado Parks and Wildlife has offered the opportunity to request funding above and beyond the standard \$85,000. That said, The DRD is requesting \$54,823 in additional funds to cover the following:

- \$18,000 to bring our crew on earlier in the spring and later in the fall.
- Increases (approx. \$36,823) in budget line items including PPE and general supplies, signage and buck and rail fencing, mini-excavator service/fuel, Moto/ATV/SxS/UTV maintenance and hand tool and power tool maintenance/replacement. This will enable us to keep up with inflation and an aging motorized equipment fleet while still providing for a baseline-of-need within these budget line items. Lastly this will enable the program to purchase a new high-clearance side by side as well.

*****HIRING INFORMATION/STRATEGY FOR 2025*****

For the 2023 field season the DRD had success filling our two seasonal OHV crew member positions at a higher pay grade to attract people to live in our resort-based, expensive community in 2023. For the 2024 field season we also already have "rehires" confirmed for the two crewmember positions for the 2024 field season.

We anticipate the same outcome for 2025. It also helps significantly that we can offer seasonal employees either Forest Service housing or housing at Keystone Ski Resort for a subsidized rate. If federal hiring in 2025 proves unsuccessful we would like the opportunity to explore hiring 2 single-placement Rocky Mountain Youth Corps interns with the money identified in the budget for the "OHV Crew Members".

EQUIPMENT PURCHASING STRATEGY

The Forest Service contracting process for purchasing new equipment was ineffective in 2023. We requested to purchase a side-by-side funded through the Good Management Trail Crew Grant that was never processed through Forest Service contracting (The USFS Regional Office put a temporary freeze on any new equipment purchases as of fall 2023). With this current situation we have found another way to acquire new equipment. This process will entail setting up a contract through our close partner the Friends of the Dillon Ranger District (FDRD). We have already discussed this with FDRD, and they are willing and able to assist with the purchase when the time presents itself.



2025 Season Work Plan for the Dillon OHV Trail Crew


In spring of 2025, the crew will focus on annual trail openings which includes opening gates, clearing trees from trails, and basic drainage maintenance during spring run-off. They will update signage as needed at the motorized trailheads and travel management kiosks. As the summer progresses, they will perform a combination of trail maintenance and rehabilitation projects along with visitor contacts on the higher use areas of the Dillon Ranger District.

Highlights of the season's work will include:


- Early season gate and OHV route opening project with the Mile-High Jeep Club on high elevation OHV routes including webster pass road #285, radical hill road #286 and deer creek road #5
- Multi-season project: Directional sign (16 signs in total, within the system) installation within the Golden Horseshoe motorized singletrack trail system.
- Clear trails throughout the season of downed trees especially in the mountain-pinebeetle-kill forests.
- Multi-season project: Travel Management implementation/maintenance including signs, restoration and rehabilitation of non-system routes, and patrols in all the Dillon Ranger District priority OHV areas.
- Installation of U-channel road signs on all high alpine roads along the Continental Divide.
- Maintain travel management kiosks at all motorized trailheads including Spring Creek, Tiger, Montezuma, Tenderfoot/Frey Gulch.
- Multi-season project: ongoing heavy maintenance with CPW-funded mini-x and hand work focused on drainage and erosion issues on motorcycle trails in the Tenderfoot Motorcycle trail system and the Golden Horseshoe OHV trail system including (for summer 2025): Tenderfoot Mountain Trail #9509, Monkey Butt Trail #9510, Power Line Trail #9504, Moab Trail #9501, One Step Over Trail GH-45.
- Maintain infrastructure (gates, width limiters) associated with seasonal wildlife closures in Tenderfoot Motorcycle Trail System, Williams Divide Road, and Golden Horseshoe.
- Conduct patrols and public contacts at least 1 day a week rotating through all the OHV areas on the district.
- Host a "Stay the Trailer" event at one of the high-use OHV trailheads on the district.
- Coordinate and partner with the Friends of the Dillon Ranger District, Summit County Off-Road Riders and Summit County Mountain Bike Alliance for volunteer trail maintenance projects in the Tenderfoot Mountain Motorcycle trail system
- Support and collaborate with the White River National Forest Road crew to address mechanized heavy maintenance needs on level 2-3 OHV routes.
- Conduct OHV patrols associated with hunting seasons including archery, muzzle loading and rifle seasons that occur through October.
- Restoration and rehabilitation of user-created routes across the Dillon Ranger District to benefit natural resources such as wildlife.





E-3 Dillon OHV Trail Crew 2025 – price quote and desired equipment from budget



Due to the variable and rugged high alpine terrain throughout the district roads we require a more capable vehicle to perform the maintenance/patrol goals we set out to accomplish, which is why we are asking for a high clearance side-by-side. The roads we are patrolling require high clearance vehicles by nature, and as such we have never had a capable vehicle to patrol certain areas where the public is recreating. By purchasing a vehicle of these capabilities, we will increase our ability to perform OHV road/trail maintenance as well as educate users on responsible OHV recreation in sensitive high alpine tundra areas. A perfect example of this is Radical Hill Road; this is popular high clearance 4x4 road that has larger boulders and rock drops that stock Jeeps and side-bysides cannot safely travel.

Quote includes extra accessories to make side-by-side capable of handling the increased difficulties of system roads needed to make public contacts in safe manner. These accessories include an enclosed cab, and larger 32" tires. These are needed to safely patrol the roads on the Continental Divide and provide a comfortable and protected place from the harsh elements while in the high alpine terrain.


