The Good OHV Management Crew will develop, maintain and improve OHV trails, trailheads, parking and support facilities; reconstruct OHV trails and related facilities; produce, install and maintain signage for OHV trails and support facilities; develop, deliver and provide education and rider ethics training to the OHV riding community; maintain, supply and operate facilities owned by the USDA Forest Service, CPW, and BLM that are used by OHV recreationalists; implement approved federal Travel Management Plans; and provide a field presence for visitor contacts, compliance and enforcement by authorized Good Management programs.

Work in 2024 and 2025 will be largely focused on implementing the record of decision of the PSICC travel management MVUM. The forest expects 2 years' time to be able to match what's on the map to what's on the ground and make the necessary changes. Changes to our MVUM include the change of some roads to trails open to all vehicles. The UAMTC will be instrumental in shaping these changes on the ground and working to ensure the OHV recreation opportunities are posted, maintained, and open to applicable users.

The UAMTC will continue to focus on annual maintenance of our motorized trails including clearing drains, installing crib walls, adding erosion control devices to ensure our trails are sustainable and remain open to all allowed users. Deferred maintenance projects will include minor reroutes, heavy reconstruction of trails, and additions of larger needs such as turnpikes. This crew responds immediately to safety issues including rock fall, landslides, etc. and is critical to ensuring our OHV opportunities remain safe, sustainable, and open.

Assist with the potential new motorized trail proposals. Many users created trails currently braid system routes and are continuing to grow. Designating certain trails open will help add motorized single track to the area as well as help to better manage the area. Four Mile Travel Management area is currently only offering 13 miles of motorized single track and the demand is showcased by continuous use on the non-system routes. The crew has worked to create a map with all known existing routes in the area. The Four Mile Travel Management area is contingent on the Trail conservation plan that is currently being revised however the OHV crew will be integral in implementing the final record of decision for the PISCC Motor Vehicle map.

Other Projects – Bear Creek drainage installation, rock work near West Creek along the Rainbow Trail, Sand Gulch – turnpike maintenance, Crib wall installation along Silver Creek and 108.

Collaborative efforts on our multiuse trails with local partners CCMR, CORE, and SMT to help maintain and ensure positive OHV recreation opportunities are protected. Work parties involving these groups continue to benefit the local recreating public and pave a positive path forward for multi-use recreationalists.

Continue to provide the OHV recreating public with informational/ educational events. Messages and partners will include Leave No Trace, Tread Lightly, Stay The Trail and staffing at OHV related events such as enduro and trails courses. Posting of "OHV Dollars at Work" decals and signs at all OHV trail heads. Crew continues to wear uniform jersey with the same decal on the back and educates public on how the registration dollars directly impact keeping trails open.




E-1 Vicinity Map & E-2 Project Site Maps







Envision Chaffee County and the Envision Recreation in Balance Regional Partnership supports the funding request for the Upper Arkansas Motorized Trail Crew (UAMTC) - a Good Management crew. The crew works on local and neighboring OHV trails from spring through fall and is a key component to ensuring our OHV recreation opportunities are maintained.

Envision believes the UAMTC plays an integral role in maintaining sustainable trails as use increases, helping to retain quality outdoor recreation experiences. This is a key need and an important opportunity.

In the 2023 Chaffee County Recreation Survey, with 1,248 respondents, roughly 50% of respondents say the quality of their outdoor recreation experiences has degraded in the past 5 years. One of four top factors is impact from increasing (and sometimes irresponsible) motorized use including route damage, speeding and off trail use. Examples of comments received to an open-ended question about why experience quality has changed include, ""Degraded roads, erosion, trash, dog waste, too many users and extreme concern for human-caused wildfires.", "OHVs flying down roads" and "We loved to 4-wheel back-country high mountain passes. Now these "jeep roads" are impassible for us, worn away by OHVs". The UAMTC is a critical asset, providing much needed boots on the ground to help address these issues and to ensure that high quality motorized recreation is sustainable.

Chaffee County is also working to complete a county-wide Trails System and Conservation Plan. The plan will identify critical needs and opportunities to improve the existing trail/route system for people and for wildlife. Funding the UAMTC crews will provide essential resources to help implement top community priorities.

The Envision Recreation in Balance Partnership strongly recommends approve of the UAMTC proposal, supporting route maintenance and positive user behaviors.

Please accept this letter of support from the Central Colorado Mountain Riders (CCMR) for the 2025 OHV Good Management Grant for the Upper Arkansas Motorized Trail Crew (UAMTC). The UAMTC works on our local OHV trails from Spring through Fall ensuring our recreation opportunities are protected and maintained. Not only has the crew helped foster excellent relationships with organizations such as ours, but they also help neighboring districts and land managers strengthen their OHV recreation and non-motorized recreation opportunities.

CCMR is an all-volunteer, 501 nonprofit organization. Our mission is to preserve, maintain and create motorized trail opportunities in the central Colorado area through cooperation, education, etiquette, and stewardship. We represent over 200 off-highway motorcycle enthusiasts all of whom contribute to the CPW OHV funding annually with the purchase of hundreds of OHV stickers. CCMR partners with public lands managers, working with the USFS and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to preserve the sport of motorized trail riding and multiuse recreation.

The UAMTC consistently provides positive community impact by providing trail maintenance and construction keeping our trails open and safe. Specially, on Nationals Trails Day, last June, the UAMTC assisted CCMR and the local mountain bike club on a major workday with more than 50 people. The UAMTC also assisted CCMR with designing several Rainbow Trail reroutes to improve trail maintainability. CCMR then let subcontracts, using the OHV Trail Maintenance grant, to make these trail improvements. The UAMTC provided invaluable support throughout these projects. The UAMTC also proved continual support during the CCMR managed Youth Corps Rainbow Trail project this Fall. More than 18 miles of multiuse trail was improved and made safer for all users. CCMR recognizes and values the retention of these highly skilled crew members.

CCMR is also aware and appreciates the support provided by the high number of hours the UAMTCs puts on their motorcycles each season and highly recommends the equipment upgrades they are requesting to enable the crew to safely perform their duties.

SMT has worked alongside the UAMTC crew and seen first-hand the value they bring to protecting and maintaining recreation opportunities in our area, and to fostering excellent relationships with local clubs and organizations. As a few examples, together this year we:

- Partnered for a second-straight year on National Trails Day with Central Colorado Mountain Riders (CCMR), the local motorized trail stewards, for a major volunteer event on the Rainbow Trail. More than 50 volunteers participated in routine maintenance to repair damage from the 2019 Decker Fire and subsequent rainstorms.
- Cleared lingering cornices on the Monarch Crest, also with CCMR, to mitigate resource damage from people riding around the snow.
- Completed the final bit of tread to open the new South Fooses Creek Trail.

There is an increasing need for UAMTC's work in our valley. The local population is growing, and recreational tourism is rising, necessitating more routine trail maintenance. With the Chaffee County Trails and Conservation Plan now underway, we also expect to soon identify critical infrastructure needs and opportunities to improve and expand the current trail system. The UAMTC will play a key role in planning, building and maintaining these new trails.

SMT believes the UAMTC plays an integral role in supporting the sustainability of well-loved trails in our area, and we look forward to working with the UAMTC in providing world-class trail experiences for the public to enjoy. SMT strongly recommends the approval of the Upper Arkansas Motorized Trail Crew grant request, and we pledge our support towards the continuation of this project.

Provide a trail crew work plan for the 2025 work season

(H). 2024-2025 UAMTC Work Plan

- Work through NEPA process, if NEPA starts, to propose and plan motorized single track trail system at
 Four Mile Travel Management Area. Work would deeply involve local partners and likely require much
 time spent with District Resource Specialists to mitigate various concerns.
- Clear down trees from the Rainbow and all motorized trails on the Salida Ranger District as we always do.
- Assist other adjacent USFS Districts such as the Leadville Ranger District and the San Carlos Ranger District to complete trail work.
- Continue to clear and reinforce burn scar areas along the Rainbow Trail such as redefining tread work and felling hazard trees.
- Work with local Trail Adopters to plan their work on adopted trail sections.
- Work with Central Colorado Motorcycle Riders to aid in maintaining, constructing, and improve trail systems
- Educate OHV users on how OHV Sticker money is spent, educate users on OHV rules and regulations, and build trust and respect with OHV Community by assisting Partners with quality OHV project work.
- Install crib walls on Silver Creek section of the Rainbow or have Trail Adopters perform this work.
- Install infrastructure at 4 mile to prevent OHV resource damage.
- Install travel management signs and width limiters as needed.
- Implement new trail designations with the finalized MVUM ROD district wide. New signage, gates and rehab is anticipated where FS roads have become trails on the Salida Ranger District. On the ground planning will be necessary to prevent motorized users from becoming confused with new changes.
- Perform heavy rock tread armoring work on Poplar Gulch trail and West Creek area.
- Install drainage and clear corridor along high use motorized trails.
