PROJECT SELECTION CRITERIA

Needs and Urgency of the Project (40 points):

A. Describe the need for this project.

We will be purchasing a 2021 yr Bison Bombardier groomer. It would come from one of the Aspen ski areas. These groomers are in a 2 year lease program and are serviced and maintained at a high level. These machines will have 3,000-3,500 hrs. We usually put 250-300 hrs on a groomer per season, so this should last us 10 years or more. This will upgrade our current machine which is a 2009 BR350 groomer which has approximately 6,000 hrs. We have had this groomer since 2016 and feel it is time to get a newer groomer with lower hours. We have been able to avoid break downs and expensive repairs by trading in machines every 6-8 yrs along with good maintenance. We are beginning to have a few more needed repairs to this groomer. Fortunately the club has the funds to consider getting a newer groomer. The prices of used groomers are going up rapidly and in 1-2 years we might not be able to have the money get a newer groomer.

B. What is the importance of this project to your grooming program, the Colorado Snowmobile Program and your local community?

To be able to continue to have good snowmobile trails we need to operate grooming equipment that is reliable and efficient. If we continue to upgrade to newer groomers, we avoid costly repairs and breakdowns that destroy the grooming program.

C. Why is it important to undertake this project now instead of at a later time? Please describe any elements that make this project urgent or time sensitive?

It is important to get groomers that have lower hours of use when they are available. It is also to our advantage to trade in our present groomer while it has the highest trade value, the longer we have it the less we will get back .

D. What is the impact on the Statewide Snowmobile Program if this project does not get funded?

If this project is not funded, we will have to continue to use older groomers which will eventually cost more to operate and maintain.

PROJECT SELECTION CRITERIA

Benefits (30 points):

A. What benefits will this project provide to the community and the Colorado Snowmobile Program?

The Rifle snowmobile club has a very good trail system and we can provide quality trails only by improving the equipment and the techniques we are using. We also operate our grooming program more efficiently with less repairs and maintenance. So we are using the grooming monies for trail work and not repairs.

- B. How does your grooming program protect and improve winter trail opportunities? This year it has taken extra efforts to keep the trails groomed with the large amounts of snow we have received. The number of trees down across the trails has been 4-5 times the normal. Maintaining the parking areas is also required extra effort with the extra snow we received.
 - C. What is unique about your trail system?
 Our trail system has every type of terrain and skill level for snowmobilers. Good trails for trail riders, powder and trees and steep hills. The trail system covers almost 91 miles and it will take several days to see most of it.
- D. What types and skill level of trail users does your trail system attract? All skill levels of riders will find places to ride in our area, trails riders, tree riders powder riders, steep hills and meadows.
- E. Does your cub offer any educational programs such as snowmobile safe riding or avalanche awareness? Explain what classes were offered last season.

This last season we had a club event geared for kids and younger riders. We had stations with avalanche experts, survival skills with local search and rescue, map reading and trail riding hand signals.

We have two snowmobile dealers in town that help us with events. We partner with the Forest Service by keeping the bathrooms clean at the parking areas and plowing the parking lots. This also helps out the cross-country skiers and snowshoers who also use this trail head.

B. If your club is awarded this grant, describe how the club will promote or acknowledge the use of Colorado snowmobile registration funds and the capital grant program as a funding source for the project?

We always try to educate the snowmobilers that the grooming efforts and equipment are funded by the registration of snowmobiles.

The grooming operations of this club and maintenance /repairs are 100% volunteer. this year we groomed 349 hrs with all volunteer operators. Club members also put trail poles out and gathering them back in, groomer repair and maintenance, trail clean up and marking. Total volunteer hours was at least 700 this year.



Attached is the brochure for the Stage V Bison that we talked about this morning.

For the used Bison's that we are getting back from Aspen they will be approximately \$270,000.00, but we won't know exact price until we get the machines with final hours on them. They are all 2021 model year machines with approximately 3,000 hours on them. Some will be Bison X's and others are Bison S's (Standard Groomers). It would include the remainder of the initial 4 year / 4,800 hour CAT Platinum ESC warranty on the engine and aftertreatment system. We could add one season / 600 hours of Prinoth warranty as well. All machines will be center seat operator position with the instructor seat on the RH side and a full size seat on the left hand side. Depending on the machine it should have the rear view camera and possibly the tiller camera with lights as well. All machines will be fully serviced and ready to groom.

I spoke with Jesse this afternoon and it looks like the trade value on your 2009 BR350 would be approximately \$30,000 pending a machine evaluation.

This letter is intended to offer support to the Rifle Snowmobile Club for a grant to assist in purchasing a replacement trail groomer for their operations.

The club conducts snow grooming operations on the Rifle and Blanco Ranger Districts of the White River National Forest under a winter grooming permit which is renewable every five years. Their current permit is in good standing and expires on June 30, 2024, with grooming services provided at frequent intervals, in conformance with their approved operating plan.

The club provides a valuable service to our local communities and visitors alike through their efforts to maintain, groom and sign 124 miles of trail. Exhibit H - Additional Terms and Conditions

- 1. Subject to the obligations and conditions set forth in this document, title to equipment acquired under a grant will vest upon acquisition to the grantee.
- 2. The grantee's use of the equipment is subject to the following conditions:
 - a. The grantee shall use the equipment only for activities and uses that are consistent with the uses outlined by the Snowmobile Recreation fund. The equipment shall not be used to benefit private individuals, lands or projects without prior written approval from CPW.
 - b. The grantee shall be liable to CPW for any failure to use the equipment in accordance with the applicable statute, including the premature sale or disposition of the equipment. The grantee's liability for such a failure shall be equal to funds contributed by CPW under a grant from the purchase or acquisition of equipment.

3. Record Keeping Requirements

- a. Records must be maintained that include, at a minimum; a description of the equipment; a serial number or other identification number; who holds title; the acquisition date and cost of equipment; the percentage of State or grant funds used in the acquisition of the equipment; the location, use and condition of the equipment; and any ultimate disposition data including the date of disposal and sale price of the equipment. CPW shall at all times have the right to inspect these records upon request.
- b. A physical inventory of the equipment must be taken and the results shared with CPW in order to be reconciled with the property records held by CPW at least once every two years.
- c. A control system must be developed by grantee to ensure adequate safeguards to prevent loss, damage or theft of equipment. Any confirmed or suspected loss, damage, or theft – whether discovered via the process described in 3.b. or otherwise, shall be investigated by grantee in cooperation with CPW.
- d. Adequate maintenance procedures must be developed and implemented to keep the equipment in good and working condition.

If awarded a snowmobile capital grant; I acknowledge and agree to the above terms and conditions.
