Our intention is send the snowcat to Prinoth to address the following issues:

Weld frame cracks that are common with this make and model of snowcat.

Replace the current bent push frame. The cat was purchased with this issue.

Due to the push frame being bent it has prematurely caused cylinder, spherical bearing and pins to ware out.

PROJECT SELECTION CRITERIA

Needs and Urgency of the Project (40 points):

- A. Describe the need for this project.

Repairing the push frame and cylinders has become an urgency because the blade no longer has full range of motion. Almost no tilt to the right. The issue is getting worse quicker over time. Grooming is best performed as a continuing process. At this time the operators now have to make multiple passes to make the trail level. Which is extremely dangerous to go back on fourth on our long self roads. Furthermore, due to logging along the trail, massive snow drifts are forming where we had none before.

- B. What is the importance of this project to your grooming program, the Colorado Snowmobile Program and your local community?

The importance is to have a cat with a blade that works which will allow us to make the trail usable and safe for everyone. From the operators to community riders and search and rescue.

- C. Why is it important to undertake this project now instead of at a later time? Please describe any elements that make this project urgent or time sensitive?

The blade is almost not usable at this time. Trying to go another season would be unsuccessful. We feel it's best to address the issues during the off season. If attempted during the winter we would imagine the cat would be in the shop for most of the time waiting to get worked on.

- D. What is the impact on the Statewide Snowmobile Program if this project does not get funded?

When it's no longer worthwhile taking the cat out to groom, the trail would become unsafe, and access would complete go away when the drifts fill in on the shelf roads. Whatever grooming funding was not used would go back to the state of Colorado general fund.

The trails will remain open and safe.

- B. How does your grooming program protect and improve winter trail opportunities?

Our grooming program allows for all types of winter recreation. Cross country skiing, snowshoeing, hiking, snowmobiling and ranchers access to their land. Having a groomed trail allows for folk to enjoy the back country safely.

- C. What is unique about your trail system? Our trail system is unique in many ways.

During travel management most of the land in Summit County was closed off for access. This area was then chosen to remain open for the kinds of riding, the volume of snow and it's location between Silverthorne and Kremmling. You actually start in Grand County then enter Summit county. There is also trail access to Eagle County.

- D. What types and skill level of trail users does your trail system attract? We attract advanced local riders but non-locals use it for the beauty and how close it is to I-70.

- E. Does your club offer any educational programs such as snowmobile safe riding or avalanche awareness? Explain what classes were offered last season.

Yes HCSC dba Summit Snow Riderz does offer Avalanche practice events, club members get together and practice with there beacons and we time one another. SSR also has hosted annual Youth Snowmobile safety class. I believe we have been involved with about a dozen youth snowmobilers successfully passing the safety course. We also have a club member who worked with CPW to host our Snowmobile youth safety class. This member Mike Martz has become a CPW certified instructor for youth snowmobile safety instruction. We also have AIARE Avalanche instruction at Spring creek trail head. A club member and certified AIARE instructor

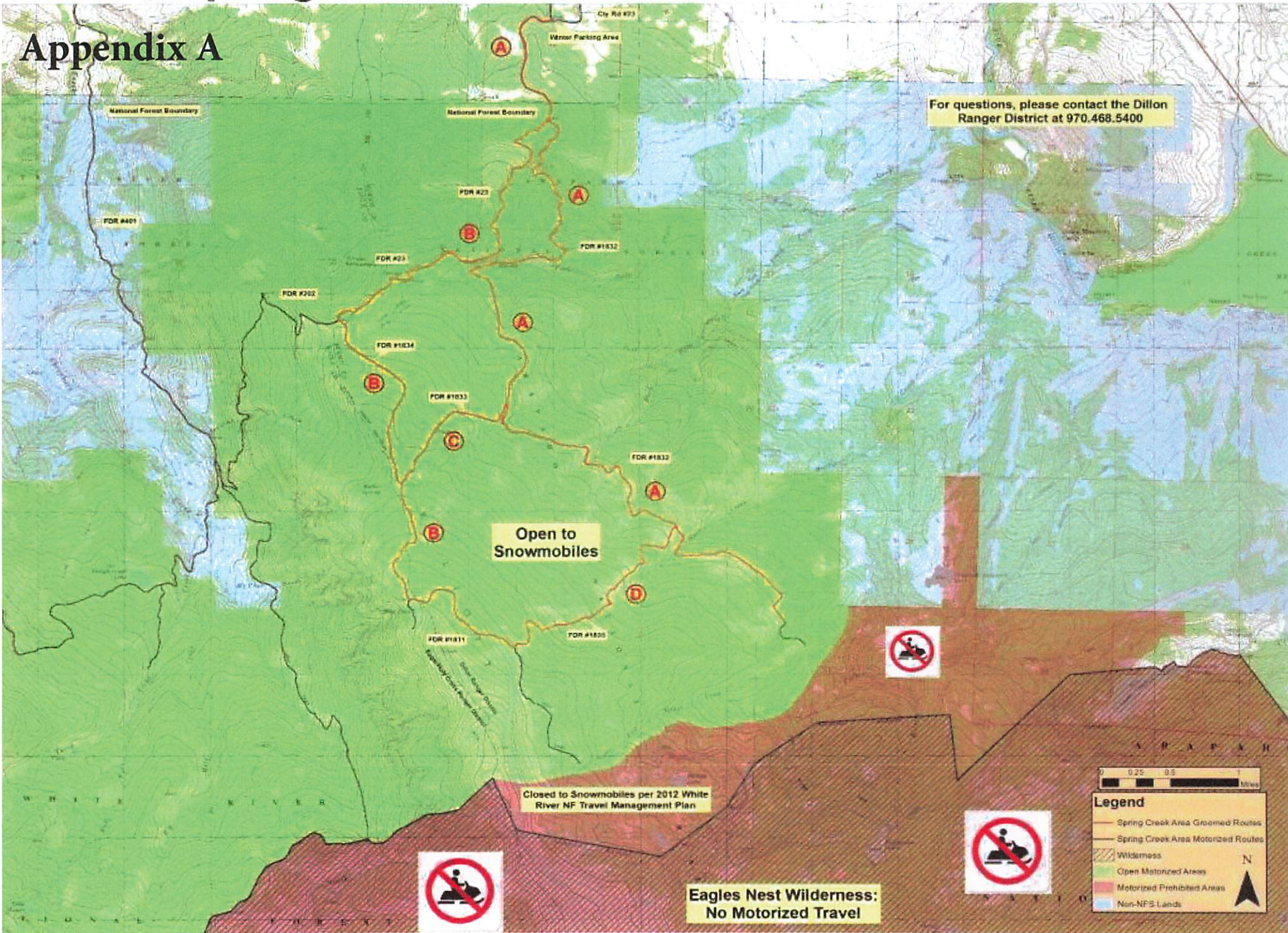


Spring Creek Area Winter Motorized Use

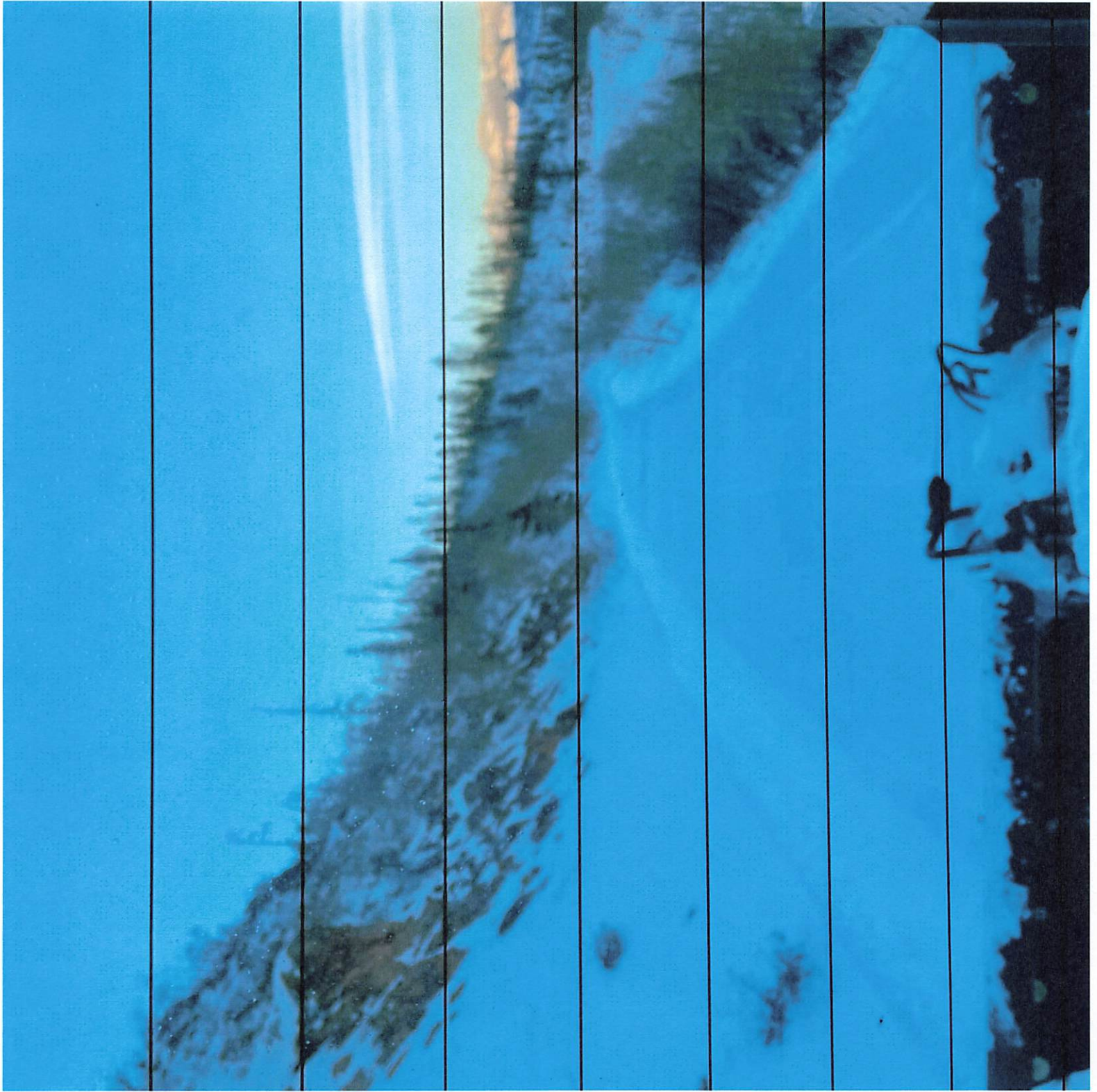

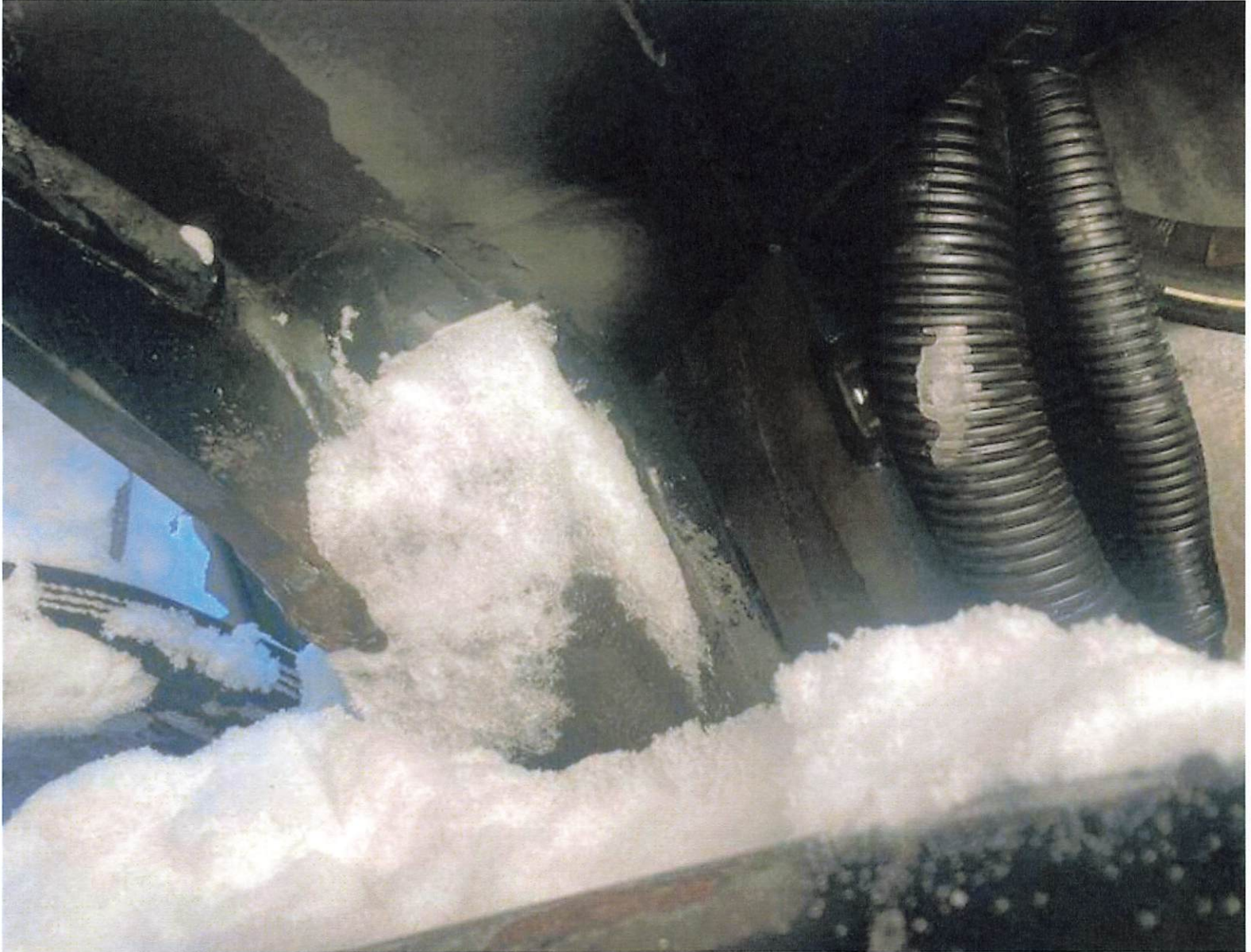

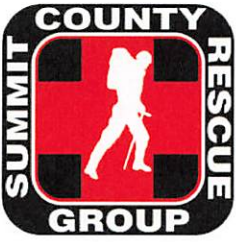
To Whom it May Concern,

I am writing on behalf of the Summit County Rescue Group (SCRG) in support of the Summit Snow Riderz snowmobile club's efforts to maintain the groomed trails in the Spring Creek riding area around the North end of Summit County.

As one of only a small handful of winter motorized accessible areas in Summit County, the Spring Creek trail system sees high levels of usage by Summit County residents and visitors alike. The level of usage (and thus number of rescues) has only increased since 2020, which has seen record numbers of recreationalists headed into the backcountry.

A strong grooming program benefits not only the snowmobilers and other backcountry users, but also those that unfortunately need to respond to assist users who have experienced trouble in that terrain. The groomed trails allow Summit County Rescue Group to respond to incidents safely and efficiently, without the use of specialized equipment.

SCRG has seen the number of incidents in the backcountry increase dramatically over the past few years, and as an all-volunteer, 100% donation-based emergency response group, relies on responsible partner organizations such as the Summit County Snow Riderz to assist in whatever means they can. Exhibit H – Additional Terms and Conditions

1. Subject to the obligations and conditions set forth in this document, title to equipment acquired under a grant will vest upon acquisition to the grantee.

2. The grantee’s use of the equipment is subject to the following conditions:
 - a. The grantee shall use the equipment only for activities and uses that are consistent with the uses outlined by the Snowmobile Recreation fund. The equipment shall not be used to benefit private individuals, lands or projects without prior written approval from CPW.

 - b. The grantee shall be liable to CPW for any failure to use the equipment in accordance with the applicable statute, including the premature sale or disposition of the equipment. The grantee’s liability for such a failure shall be equal to funds contributed by CPW under a grant from the purchase or acquisition of equipment.

3. Record Keeping Requirements
 - a. Records must be maintained that include, at a minimum; a description of the equipment; a serial number or other identification number; who holds title; the acquisition date and cost of equipment; the percentage of State or grant funds used in the acquisition of the equipment; the location, use and condition of the equipment; and any ultimate disposition data including the date of disposal and sale price of the equipment. CPW shall at all times have the right to inspect these records upon request.

 - b. A physical inventory of the equipment must be taken and the results shared with CPW in order to be reconciled with the property records held by CPW at least once every two years.

 - c. A control system must be developed by grantee to ensure adequate safeguards to prevent loss, damage or theft of equipment. Any confirmed or suspected loss, damage, or theft – whether discovered via the process described in 3.b. or otherwise, shall be investigated by grantee in cooperation with CPW.

 - d. Adequate maintenance procedures must be developed and implemented to keep the equipment in good and working condition.

If awarded a snowmobile capital grant; I acknowledge and agree to the above terms and conditions.
