Ice Fishing Clinic at North Michigan Reservoir March 13, 2021

Come to North Michigan Reservoir ready to fish; we'll bring the equipment, we'll dig the holes, and all we ask is that you have a good time! Conditions Report - Metro

Aurora Reservoir

The reservoir is closed to boating for the season. This closure includes all hand launched watercrafts such as float tubes, kayaks, rafts, and paddle boards. As of **2/14/2021** rangers reported no open water for shore fishing. The reservoir is currently iced over. The thickest ice is in the coves and ranges from 5-7 inches. Ice beyond the coves ranges from 1-3 inches. Trout fishing is reported as fair to good using jigs tipped with meal worms. Please use extreme caution, the aeration system is on and the water level is coming up. For more information call 303-326-8425.

Chatfield Reservoir

As of **2/26/2021**, park ranger reports "Ice can be found in the North Boat Ramp Cove and from Catfish Flats South to the inlet, on warm days spring conditions exist. Few Walleye and Trout have been taken through the ice. Shore anglers are reporting slow fishing for trout.

Cherry Creek Reservoir

Cherry Creek is an 880 acre reservoir with the water temperature currently at 32.6 degrees Fahrenheit. Boating at the reservoir is closed. As of **2/26/2021**, park staff reported "the ice ranges from 1 to 4 inches thick and 90% of the lake is still frozen. Fishing is fair at the moment with anglers having limited success using mealworms, sucker meat, wax worms, Gulp worms, and night crawlers on Rapala raps, buck-shot flutter spoons, blade baits and others. No other reports on any other species at this time. For more information please call (303) 690-1166."

Conditions Report - Northeast Colorado

Barr Lake

As of 2/26/2021 park staff reports that ice conditions are not good at this time and do NOT recommend ice fishing. The reservoir was filling up in January causing the ice shelf to float, with warmer currents beneath the ice. This can create unsafe and unreliable ice. There is approximately 3-4 inches at Heron cove, 1-3 inches at Mussel Beach and Willow Landing in the north portion of park and main body of lake. Eleven Mile Reservoir

As of 2/18/2021, "The 11 Mile Marina reports ice thickness is at 24 inches and growing with approximately 8 inches of hard pack snow on top of that from winter accumulation. The **trout fishing** is reportedly fair to good. Action is hit and miss but plenty of great fish being caught. At North Shore it is stocker action but a numbers game. The big ones are there. Shallow is easy access at spots like at Lazy Boy and Howbert and pretty decent. Deeper water may not be worth the effort until the fresh snow either settles down or blows away. Nightcrawler laying on the bottom might get you a big fish if you want to fish bait. Stay away from egg sacks for the time being the stockers are like piranha and tear them to pieces. The best approach is always two rods with one spoon and one micro jig or just bait. We have seen very big Trout cruising just below the ice while salmon fishing in 60 feet of water but they just move on by.

Kokanee fishing is reportedly fair to good. Reports from the channel out from Deer Island are good with consistent opportunities. Fish seem to be traveling in multi verse groups. You can catch big ones or small ones out of the same grouping. Duck Island has not been as productive but North Shore out from the Marina has. **Northern Pike fishing** is reportedly fair to good. Try North Shore, Witchers Cove and Howbert on the East side or Stoll in 8 feet of water or less."

Jackson Lake

As of 2/26/2021, park staff reports, "The ice has been between 5-7 inches throughout the last week. However, wind and warm temperatures have begun to melt the surface of the ice. The inlet does contain open water and anglers should use caution as some areas of the ice can open unexpectedly. Fishing has been fair for walleye and wipers near the south shore of the reservoir. Bait has varied from white and silver jigs to worms and minnows. Anglers accessing the ice are urged to use caution and to carry safety equipment to assist them in self rescuing." Jackson Reservoir was recently stocked on February 9.

Conditions Report - Southeast Colorado

Arkansas River - Leadville to Buena Vista

As of 2/10/2021, Braden Baker with Ark Anglers writes, "The upper river is very cold and icy. There are some areas between the Lake Creek confluence and Buena Vista that will still offer limited productivity on the warmer days, but generally you'll find more opportunities further south towards Salida during the winter. There is significant shoreline and shelf ice north of Buena Vista. For those determined to fish the upper section, deep slow runs or pools that receive ample sunlight are going to offer your best chances at finding active fish. If you can locate a pod of fish in the deeper winter water, it's likely you'll find a concentrated population holding together with a lot of vacant water upstream and downstream. Your window of opportunity will be limited to 11am to 2pm. Midges will be your most important forage to imitate, and pairing a small midge larva or pupa with a large attractor nymph like a stonefly is a great way to cover your bases".

Arkansas River - Buena Vista to Salida

As of 2/23/2021, Braden Baker with Ark Anglers writes, "We're back to some milder weather this week in the valley, with days around 40 degrees and nights down around 20 degrees. This forecast bodes well for anglers on the river this week, though they may have to work a little harder to find some shelter from the breeze. Winter cold will limit opportunities far north of Salida, but the river from Big Bend downstream will remain productive throughout the majority of the winter, outside of the coldest days. We've had a few decent reports from north of Brown's Canyon near Buena Vista in areas of the river that enjoy good sunlight and spring seep. This time of year your best window to fish will generally be between 11:00am and 2:30pm, particularly in areas that receive ample solar exposure. Fish have migrated to their usual winter lies such as deep, slow runs and pools where they can retreat to safety, but will actively feed out in the nearby runs and riffles when food is available. While you may still find midge hatches prompting sporadic surface feeding, most of the food in the river will be subsurface for the foreseeable future. Stonefly and other large attractor nymphs will be great anchor flies throughout the day, and you'll want to fish midge larva/pupa and caddis larva as droppers. Nymphing will give you the greatest flexibility to cover a range of water types. Not every pool and run will be productive, so it pays to try to find several areas to fish throughout the day. Usually where you find one fish, you'll find several. Strikes are subtle with the colder weather, so be very proactive in setting the hook on the slightest sign of a take. Try to fish in the sun as much as you can, as the solar radiation can make a big difference in fish activity. "

John Martin Reservoir

As of 2/26/2021, the east and west boat ramps have been closed for the season until March 15th, 2021. Anglers are still able to fish from shore. Park staff reports, "There is a thin layer of ice over a large portion of John Martin Reservoir, but certainly not nearly enough to be safe for ice fishing! Where there is open water, shoreline fishing has been slow. There have been a few anglers out there, and haven't heard of anyone having much luck. The best area to try would probably be the stilling basin below the dam. Fishing will pick up dramatically starting around the end of March or into April when we will begin to see the wiper and white bass become more active."

Trinidad Lake

As of 2/22/2021, park staff reports the lake is at 612 surface acres with a surface elevation of 6178.66. The water level is rising slightly. The ice conditions are fluctuating. Warm and windy days have melted the ice. Larger areas of open water are now visible with soggy ice around the shorelines. Ice thickness is unknown at this time. Shore fishing is now possible on the south shore and off of the Carpio Canyon point, more water is becoming exposed each week. There have been very nice trout and some walleye being caught through the ice as well.

Conditions Report - Northwest Colorado

Delaney Lakes

As of 2/26/2021, *Lake John Resort* reports, “roads are open, but somewhat snowpack. Ice is currently around 21 inches or more. As of last week there was nearly 12 inches of snow on top of the ice. Mainly cutbows and rainbows are being caught.”

North Delaney is fishing steady for browns, cutbows and rainbows 12 to 18 inches.

South Delaney has seen steady action with cutbows, rainbow, and cutthroat, all mostly catch and release.

East Delaney has seen little to no action.

Cowdrey Lake- “We continue to receive poor feedback. Only one (barely) legal sized fish was caught for the 2021 Ice Fishing Tournament at 16 inches. Roads are open and clear. Fishing depth seems to best at a range between 4-10 feet of water. Current ice thickness is between 17 to 20 inches thick.”

Big Creek Lakes, “Lake activity has been steady based on the 5 reports received by this author. Splake, Rainbows, and Cutbows are being reported as most caught, ranging between 10 and 25 inches. One Tiger Musky reported. Sucker meat, waxworms and Atomic Teasers seem to be the ticket for large Rainbows and Tiger Muskies. Dynamic Lures (Ice) are doing very well right now too in the glow (translucent), red dragon and rainbow colors.”

Fishing with Bernie Guide, Dan Shannon reported on 2/26/2021, “This week has brought us snow and slush on the lake, while the slush is not to the same extent as the past few years it is spreading and being found throughout the lake. Use caution and be prepared while traveling the lake. Fishing picked up this week for all species. Rainbows are active shallow, less than 12’ and spoons were producing well. Lake trout are being caught in 40-80’ as well as finding a few suspended. While still catching most along the bottom they have been chasing spoons and tubes around the water column as well when they don’t bite right away. This time of year using electronics is key to finding fish as they are spread throughout the lake.”

Grand Lake

Fishing with Bernie Guide Dan Shannon reported as of 2/26/2021, “With the snow has brought on some slush in areas. Fishing has been pretty typical for end of February, we are having to work for our bites but this should be improving as we get to March. Rainbow, brown trout and the occasional kokanee are being caught in 20 feet and less of water, the inlet areas being most productive. Small pink or white ice flies and tungsten jigs tipped with an egg or wax worm has been a go to. Lake trout are starting to suspend over the deeper water, use electronics to find fish then fish to their depths with spoons and tubes.”

Green Mountain Reservoir

As of 2/26/2021, Green Mountain Reservoir reported over 20 inches of ice. A number of anglers have reported success landing lake trout using a variety of colors and presentations. The most common lately has been pink and chartreuse tube jigs. Anglers are also having success with jigging raps in a variety of colors tipped with wax worms or sucker meat.

Lake John

As of 2/7/2021, *Lake John Resort* reports “Lake John still has quality fish coming out right now however, the biting continues to be slow since the 2021 Lake John/Cowdrey Lake Ice Fishing Tournament. However, pictures of 20-inch plus Cutbows (primarily) are coming in daily from ice anglers. Best artificial tackle of late has been tube jigs (chartreuse), Dynamic Lures (glow, cutthroat ice & red dragon), atomic teasers (all colors), and jigs set with all types of worms. Road access to the Lake John is open and clear. Access to drive onto the ice are accessible via both North and South boat ramps. Roads around the East side of the lake are impassable due to snow drifts. Fishing in depths of 4-10 feet of water has statistically been the most successful. Current ice thickness is between 17 to 20 inches thick.”

Steamboat Lake

As of 2/26/2021, park staff reports the ice is at least 20 inches thick. Depending on the day and temperatures, the top can get very slushy. The fishing has been great with worms and wax worms. Anglers suggested if you are not catching or marking fish, move to a new spot. Dead-sticking was proving to be ineffective and active jigging is what seemed to be triggering the hot bite. One angler reported fishing was great in the Placer Cove area. Call the visitor center, (970) 879-3922, for up-to-date information on lake conditions, open daily 8am-4pm.

Vega Reservoir

According to *conditions contributor Andrew Morlang*, "As of 2/15/2021 the fishing at Vega Reservoir has significantly slowed for many anglers. Fish are still being caught in 10-15 feet of water, however each day seems to bring less fish than the last. The heavy pressure this reservoir received this winter has made the fish become more hesitant to bite. When the fishing gets slow during the late ice season like this, we like to switch up lures as much as we can. Show them something they haven't seen before. Dig through your tackle box and find the smallest jigs/lures you have and see what happens. We have had luck using crawlers just sitting on the bottom, and a trout magnet on a dead stick."

As of 2/26/2021, *Fishing with Bernie Guide Rhett Feltman* reported, "Lake conditions are still friendly for walking with a few inches of snow and no slush. Fishing has been best for the first few hours of the morning until the wind has been picking up. Later in the day we have had to play cat and mouse for several minutes to get fish to bite, big or small. Fish have still been active through the water column and are willing to chase but getting them to close the deal has been tricky."

Animas River at Durango

As of 2/22/2021, *Duranglers* report, "Snow has moved in and fishing can be sporadic. With days where sun is on the water, watch for good midge hatches that can bring fish up. Sizes: 16-22 nymphs are preferred, but weight is more important than the fly."

Blue Mesa Reservoir

As of 2/26/2021, anglers reported 10-16 inches of ice at Dry Creek and inlet. Bay of Chickens had 14-18 inches of ice, 25+ inches in Lola basin, 12 inches at Cebola Creek and 18 inches at Willow Creek. Caution is advised as ice is highly variable in some areas. *Conditions contributor Andrew Morlang* reports, "The fishing at Blue Mesa reservoir has been consistently hot for browns and rainbows along rocky shorelines in 5-20 feet of water. Fish are hitting jigs and tubes tipped with worms in water as shallow as 5 feet. Other popular baits include Kastmasters, Swedish Pimples, and Krocodile spoons. We have also had success using trout magnets tipped with mealworms. The bite has been good all day, but we have noticed increased fish activity in the early morning and evening hours. If you have the opportunity to fish into the night, the bite for bigger brown trout seems to pick up after dark. We landed multiple browns over 18" past 10:00. Fishing after dark with larger spoons tipped with sucker meat seems to do the trick. Make sure to keep a consistent jigging motion so that the fish are able to pick up the spoon in the dark."

As of 2/22/2021 *Duranglers* report, "The river is going to be mostly frozen until you get close to the dam. The gate is closed so it will be a walk to open water. Midges and small mayfly nymphs are your go-to".

Island Lake

As of 2/9/2021, *conditions contributor Andrew Morlang* reports, "This popular lake on the Grand Mesa hasn't slowed down one bit since people started hitting the ice back late fall. Popular spots include 15-20 feet off the island in any direction, and a majority of the shore line in around 20 feet of water. While the state record Splake was caught in this body of water, don't expect to catch many fish over 13 inches. Fish quality < Fish quantity. Use the smallest jig in your tackle box and tip it with either a wax or mealworm. Make sure to leave plenty of hook point exposed, as these fish are small and will nibble your bait away without you even knowing. If you find a good spot at this lake you can easily catch 10+ fish in a morning of fishing. Most anglers have been catching rainbows, splake and brooke trout. The occasional brown trout has been seen but don't expect many as they seem to be few and far between."

Jackson Gulch Reservoir - Mancos State Park

As of 2/26/2021, staff at Mancos State Park report, "The lake is ice covered with over 12 inches of ice in most areas along the dam. There may be areas that get thinner near mid-lake as it was slow to freeze. Good action for rainbow trout 10-12 inches and yellow perch averaging 5 inches. A few larger rainbows being caught, along with a few perch near 14 inches! Splake (a brook trout/lake trout cross) are also being caught occasionally. For pretty constant action (great for kids new to ice fishing) use a 1/8 oz. lead-head or "teardrop" jig tipped with a small piece of worm or 'crawler. Light line is helpful to keep the line tight with that light jig. A very good setup is a braided line. It doesn't stretch so hooksets are firm, and then run a leader of light, flexible fluorocarbon line (about 10 feet or so) on the end of your braid. Let that light jig go all the way to bottom and bring it up about 6 to 12 inches. This should produce a pretty constant stream of small perch. Try larger jigs rigged as above for rainbows and splake. Jigging rapalas, and small spoons also produce. Water level is very low, so there's a long walk through the snow to the lake edge. Standard ice fishing approach: small teardrop jigs (tipped with crawler, waxworm or mealworm), jigging spoons like the Swedish Pimple, and baithooks with PowerBait, 'crawlers, waxworms, and mealworms will work for both trout and yellow perch. Most yellow perch are small but ice fishing is a great time of year to catch some of the larger perch.

As of 2/21/2021, park staff report Corn Lake is ice free, Island Acres: Roan's Pond (stocked last month) is open water on the west side. Old Orchard on the east side may have some ice but it is not accessible. Fruita: Red Rocks has open water. Connected: is open water and there may be some ice on Duke Lake. Please ensure the responsible and ethical release of fish and properly dispose of fishing line. Remember, the daily limit for trout is four fish per person.

Tip of the Week - Ice Safety

Follow these safety tips to prevent a fatal mistake:

- Be aware of ice and weather conditions by checking online or calling ahead. Educate yourself on proper tools and techniques for checking ice conditions. Looks can be deceiving! Always test the ice rather than relying on its appearance
- The buddy-system is best on the ice so try not to go alone. Let someone know your plan and where you're going. If someone is in need of rescue, call 911 for help - attempting a rescue could cause you to also fall through the ice.
- Always wear a life jacket or float coat. Wear a life jacket or personal flotation device (PFD) over winter clothing. Life jackets provide excellent flotation and protection from the cold.
- Assemble personal safety items, such as ice picks and a whistle, which should be attached to you while on the ice. Other essential equipment includes a rope or throw bag and a cell phone. Keep your cell phone in a secure pocket or waterproof pouch to make it more accessible if calling for help.
- Wait to enjoy alcoholic beverages. Alcohol in your system increases the likelihood of hypothermia and poor choices. Stay hydrated with water and warm liquids.
- Keep pets on a leash at all times. Never allow your pet to run out onto the ice and do not walk your pet near a frozen lake or pond without a leash. If your dog falls through the ice, do not attempt a rescue. Call for help.
- Remember: Reach-Throw-Go. If someone falls through the ice and you can't reach the person from shore, throw a flotation device or rope. If you still can't quickly help the person, go or call for help.

If you fall through the ice, remember these tips:

- Try to Stay Calm. This will help you to conserve as much energy as possible.
- Act slowly and deliberately to conserve heat. Expect a progressive decrease in your strength and ability to move. Make the harder maneuvers at the beginning, while you can.
- Do not try to swim. Swimming will cause your body to lose heat much faster and will use up energy than if you stay as still as possible.
- Try to get your arms onto the ice. Kick your feet as hard as you can to help lift you onto the ice, use your ice picks to grab onto the ice and then roll to safety.
- If you can't get out by yourself, try to keep your upper body above water to conserve body heat. Use your whistle or yell to alert others that you need help.
