

## Hermosa Park Road closures to impact anglers, GMU 74 hunters

The San Juan National Forest Columbine Ranger District will conduct road maintenance and construction on Hermosa Park Road (NFSR 578) this summer where the road crosses Sig and Relay creeks (see map). Construction work will require road closures beginning Aug. 19 through Sept. 13, 2024.

Colorado Parks and Wildlife acknowledges the construction project will have an impact on hunters and anglers. The road closure will affect access to a major portion of Game Management Unit 74, and hunters should keep that in mind when applying for 2024 hunting licenses and when planning their trip.

## <u>Tip of the Week – History of Leadhead Jigs</u>

Leadhead jigs have enjoyed enduring popularity among anglers since their inception. The H and D Folsom Arms Company, a sporting goods retailer, began distributing jigheads for fishing in the 1800s.

John Butwinski, a Chicago native with a deep passion for fishing, hailed from a family that had immigrated to the United States from Poland in the early 1900s. During the Great Depression of the 1930s, when many families turned to fishing to put food on the table, money was scarce for purchasing live bait. Traditional options like worms or leeches proved ineffective in the harbors of Lake Michigan.

Drafted into the Army during World War II, John was deployed overseas where he encountered a saltwater jig adorned with animal hair. Upon returning home after the war, he began crafting his own jigs, drawing inspiration from those he had seen abroad. Tying white animal hair to jigheads, John experienced remarkable success in catching fish, prompting other anglers to seek out his creations. Innovatively, he painted some of his jigheads pink, which swiftly became a favorite among anglers. Thus, he coined his creation the Pinkie®, and in 1950, he established the Little Atom Lure Company.

Today, leadhead jigs stand as one of the most versatile tools in an angler's arsenal, with applications spanning virtually every fish species. They come in an array of sizes, shapes, and colors:

- Sizes range from 3/32 oz to 2.0 oz.
- Colors vary from unpainted to multi-colored, including two-toned options.
- Shapes include round, football, fish head, and tube designs.
- Weedless options feature stiff nylon strands covering the hook bend to prevent snagging in weed beds.
- Hooks are available in different weights and sizes, with varying shank lengths tailored to
  different bait applications. For instance, when fishing for walleye with a 4" twister tail and
  jighead combination, a jighead with a long shank hook is recommended. The hook should
  penetrate at least 1/3 of the bait's length before reaching the jighead.

When fishing in deeper waters, anglers may opt to increase the weight of the jighead. Moreover, anglers can customize jigheads by painting them using Powder-Based Epoxy Paint to suit their specific needs.
