Lake Pueblo State Park installs 'exit only' gates to let boaters leave after hours

Beginning April 1, boaters who remain on the water at Lake Pueblo State Park past gate closing times on the two boat ramps will not be prevented from leaving.

A new policy – and new gates – will allow after-hour departures, which have not been permitted since the rise of aquatic nuisance species (ANS) forced Colorado Parks and Wildlife to begin inspecting every boat that enters and leaves statemanaged waters.

This winter, Lake Pueblo installed new gates on the south boat ramp that resemble large railroadcrossing guards. They are equipped with sensors – and spike strips – to allow the boaters to leave, but not enter the water after hours.



"This is a response to our guests who like to fish and boat late into the night," said Joe Stadterman, manager of CPW's busiest park. "We are trying to accommodate them while maintaining the highest defense possible to prevent aquatic nuisance species from entering the lake."

The new south ramp gates are becoming operational as Lake Pueblo ANS inspection stations shift from winter to springtime operating hours. Beginning April 1, south ramp gates will be open 5 a.m. to 10 p.m. The north ramp operating hours will be 5 a.m. to midnight.

"Our seasonal hours, combined with the new south ramp gate, give boaters more freedom to come and go at Lake Pueblo," Stadterman said. "But we will not relax our ANS inspections as we continue to keep Lake Pueblo free of invasive zebra and quagga mussels."

Tip of the Week | Spring Tune-Up

Spring fishing is upon us — are you prepared?

While luck may play a role in angling success, preparedness is key. Your tackle and equipment can make or break your fishing expedition. Now is the perfect time to organize and fine-tune your gear. There's nothing more disheartening than arriving at your favorite fishing spot only to discover issues with your equipment — a malfunctioning reel, damaged rods, or tangled lines can quickly turn a promising outing into a frustrating experience.

Paying attention to the condition of your gear not only enhances your chances of success but also ensures a more enjoyable fishing trip.

Fishing Line: It's advisable to replace your fishing line at least once a year, especially if it has been exposed to extreme temperatures, such as those found in a vehicle or storage compartments. Opt for high-quality monofilament lines with minimal memory, small diameter, and low visibility. For trout, 4 to 6-pound line is generally sufficient, while larger fish may require heavier lines. Line strength is determined by its break rating, and many sporting outlets offer line replacement services, which can be both cost-effective and environmentally friendly.

Reels: Fishing reels don't need to break the bank to be effective, but they do require regular cleaning and lubrication to maintain optimal performance. Excessive dirt or sand can lead to sticking or internal damage, necessitating cleaning. This process, outlined in most owner's manuals, involves removing the line spool and using a soft brush or rinsing to remove debris. A quality reel lubricant containing Teflon and water-displacing properties should be applied sparingly to moving parts. Many bait shops offer reel cleaning services for those who prefer not to tackle this task themselves.

Rods: Inspect your fishing rods for any signs of damage, particularly to the tip and line guides. Replacing a broken tip or guide is straightforward and inexpensive, with repair kits readily available. These kits typically include various rod tips for different diameters, along with ferrule cement for easy application. Ensuring proper alignment and securing the tip in place before the adhesive sets are essential steps. While replacing line guides requires more effort, it's a worthwhile investment in the longevity of your rod. Ensure compatibility between the new guides and your rod material to prevent damage, especially when using braided lines.

Tackle: Check your tackle box to ensure you have all the necessary gear for your upcoming trip. Moisture can infiltrate tackle boxes, leading to rust and corrosion on hooks and lures. Dull or rusty hooks should be either cleaned and sharpened or replaced altogether. Similarly, expired or improperly stored bait and scents can lose their effectiveness and should be discarded accordingly.

By investing time in preparing and maintaining your equipment, you'll not only increase your chances of success but also enhance your overall fishing experience.
