Fishing Regulations

- Artificial flies and lures only.
- Scented flies or lures must be **1.5"** or longer.
- Minimum size for largemouth and smallmouth bass is **18"**.
- Bag and possession limit for trout is **2**.
- Minimum size for tiger muskies is **40"**.

Sportfishing Notes

Largemouth and Smallmouth Bass

- Quincy has good populations of both species.
- Largemouth grow larger in Quincy compared to smallmouth.
- Traditional lures work well for both species.

Rainbow Trout

- Trout fishing is generally good during the cooler months using traditional baits.
- Rainbow trout are stocked in April, May, June, and July.

Tiger Muskie

- Although tiger muskies are not as plentiful as they once were (last stocked in 2001), there should still be some in the reservoir.
- The current state record tiger musky was caught at Quincy in 1994.

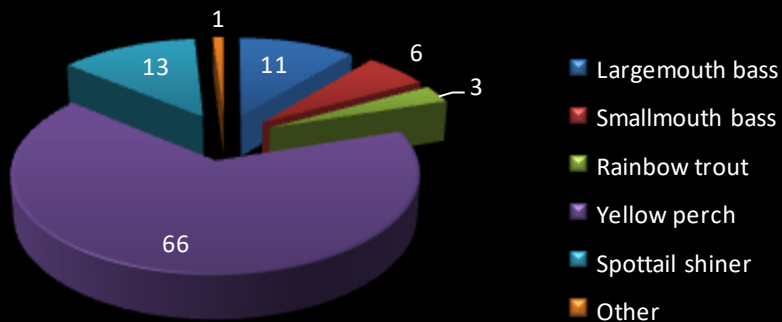


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Quincy Reservoir 2008 Fish Survey



Percent Relative Abundance

The figure to the left shows the percent relative abundance of the most abundant species in Quincy Reservoir. Surveys here include the use of boat electrofishing. The 2008 results show that yellow perch comprised the largest percentage (66%) of the species present, followed by spottail shiners (13%), largemouth bass (11%), smallmouth bass (6%) and rainbow trout (3%). The abundance of forage species such as yellow perch and spottail shiner help support healthy populations of bass.

The figure below shows the length frequencies of bass and rainbow trout at Quincy Reservoir. The vertical bars represent the number of fish at a particular length. Largemouth bass up to 21", smallmouth bass up to 16" and rainbow trout up to 12" were collected in 2008. As stated above, the presence of abundant forage allow large-mouth to reach trophy size at Quincy.
