• Directive: to regulate oil and gas development "in a reasonable manner to protect and minimize adverse impacts to public health, safety, and welfare, the environment, and wildlife resources and shall protect against adverse environmental impacts on any air, water soil, or biological resource resulting from oil and gas operations."

Overview of SB 19-181

- Governor Polis signed SB 19-181 on April 16, 2019
 - Reconstituted the Commissioners (twice)
 - Set a new mission for the COGCC
 - From foster oil and gas development
 - To regulate in a manner to protect public health, safety, welfare, the environment, and wildlife resources
 - Referred to as "mission change"
 - Created new local government authority over surface impacts and siting
 - Clarified compensatory mitigation requirements
 - Directed COGCC to undertake numerous rulemakings



Required Rulemakings: COMPLETED

- 500 Series (COGCC hearing process)
 - Adopted July 2019
- Flowlines* (pipelines that COGCC regulates)
 - Adopted November 2019
- Wellbore Integrity (groundwater protection)
 - Adopted June 2020

Required Rulemakings: IN PROCESS

- Mission Change*
- Alternative Location Analysis*
- Cumulative Impacts*
- Local Government Provisions
- Wildlife
 - Hearings scheduled August, September, October 2020 for December 1, 2020 effective date



Required Rulemakings: TBD

- Financial Assurance Next
- Application Fees Spring 2020
- Worker Certifications Spring 2020

If needed: technical clean up and incorporating CDPHE rules



What are the asterisked rulemakings?

- SB 19-181 directs COGCC to use objective criteria to review permits until four rulemakings are completed
 - Flowlines*
 - Mission Change*
 - Alternative Location Analysis*
 - Cumulative Impacts*
- Connects SB 19-181 to COGCC's day-today operations

Day-to-Day Operations

- SB 19-181 applies to "all conduct" pending before the COGCC as of April 16, 2020 ... how do we do it until new rules implemented?
- Form 2s and 2As
 - Objective Criteria
 - Local government "disposition"
- Drilling and Spacing Units
- Inspections, enforcement, clean-up, reclamation



- Key Concepts
 - Mitigation Hierarchy: avoid, minimize, mitigate
 - Landscape level planning planning tools include wildlife protection plans or wildlife mitigation plans
 - Early consultation with CPW encouraged

- Key Concepts
 - Wildlife Resources Review: High Priority
 Habitat
 - Substitution for Restricted Surface
 Occupancy and Sensitive Wildlife Habitat
 - Reflects species for which there is sufficient geographical information and available and appropriate best management practices

- Key Concepts
 - Compensatory mitigation requirements that provide flexibility for an operator to implement a mitigation plan or pay a fee when direct or indirect impacts are unavoidable







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
