

- Not a project endorsement




Every FWMP is Unique















FWMP Development

FWMP Recommendation Process

PWC Process (60 days)

CWCB Process (60 days)

Position of State of CO

- Applicant submits FWMP to PWC
- CPW staff report
- PWC vote on FWMP
 - Submitted or modified

- CWCB vote on FWMP
- If PWC and Applicant agree on FWMP, adopt FWMP
- If PWC modified FWMP, affirm or modify PWC's position

- If CWCB affirms PWC's FWMP, it becomes state position
- If CWCB modifies PWC's FWMP, governor decision



Evaluation of FWMPs



"...economically reasonable and maintains a balance between the development of the state's water resources and the protection of the state's fish and wildlife resources."





FWMP Implementation

- Two ways to implement:
 - Adoption by permitting authorities
 - Agreement between CPW and project proponent









Mitigation vs. Enhancement

Mitigation: reduction of or compensation for impacts caused by the water project

Enhancement: improvement of ecosystem beyond current conditions
