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Policy Spotlight: Colorado Outdoor Equity Grant Program has Passed!

Every Coloradan deserves to experience our state's great outdoors, but underserved communities of color don't enjoy equal access. Thank you to leadership of Representative Leslie Herod, her bill cosponsors, a coalition of 60+ organizations, the Colorado Outdoor Equity Grant Program has passed!

This bill will give underserved youth greater opportunities to access and recreate in the outdoors by bolstering community-led organizations, nonprofits, Tribal governments, and school and recreational districts with the funding needed to make the outdoors a space that serves ALL of Colorado's youth and families.

This program will be housed under Colorado Parks and Wildlife via an independent citizen board. The Outdoor Equity Grant Program Passed!!

Castlewood Canyon Natural Area

Cherry Creek rushes along through the cobbled canyon walls, passing through a wide range of plant communities- forests. shrublands, wetlands, and prairie. This crossroads between the plains and the foothills is home to over 100 species of birds and dozens of other wildlife species

What to Expect

Orient Mine Natural Area, which sits on the western slope of the Sangre de Cristo Range, is home to the largest colony of Brazilian free-tailed bats in Colorado. The mostly male "bachelor" colony roosts in the abandoned mine during the summer months and then migrates south for the winter, over 100,000 miles, the longest known migration of any bat species. Several other of species bats, including the state rare Townsend's big-eared bat, also roost in the Orient Mine, which was once Colorado's largest producer of iron ore from the late 1800's through the mid-19th century

Know Before You Go

The Orient Mine Natural Area is owned by the Orient Land Trust (OLT), a non-profit land trust. Guided and self-guided hiking tours are usually available through OLT during the summer months to learn about the area's rich history and watch the amazing nightly out flight of bats. The moderate two-mile hike includes excellent interpretive sites and views of the San Luis Valley. For up to date information, visit the OLT website, and follow all rules and guidelines posted there. Please keep in mind that access to the Orient Mine is through Valley View Hot Springs, which is a clothing optional area.

Commemorating Juneteenth -Saturday, June 19th
