 - c. Economic contributions
2. Provides objectives and strategies for meeting residents' outdoor recreation needs as well meeting the needs for conservation of lands, waters and wildlife

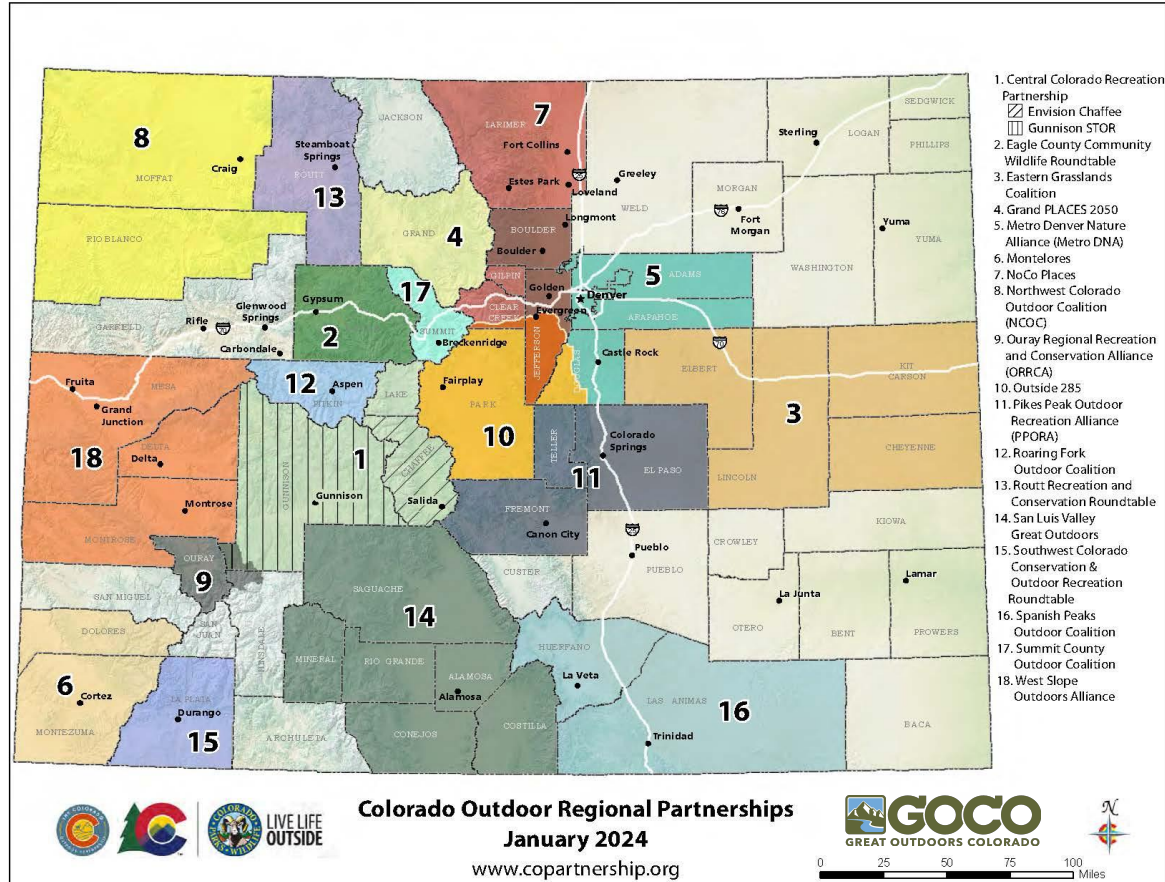

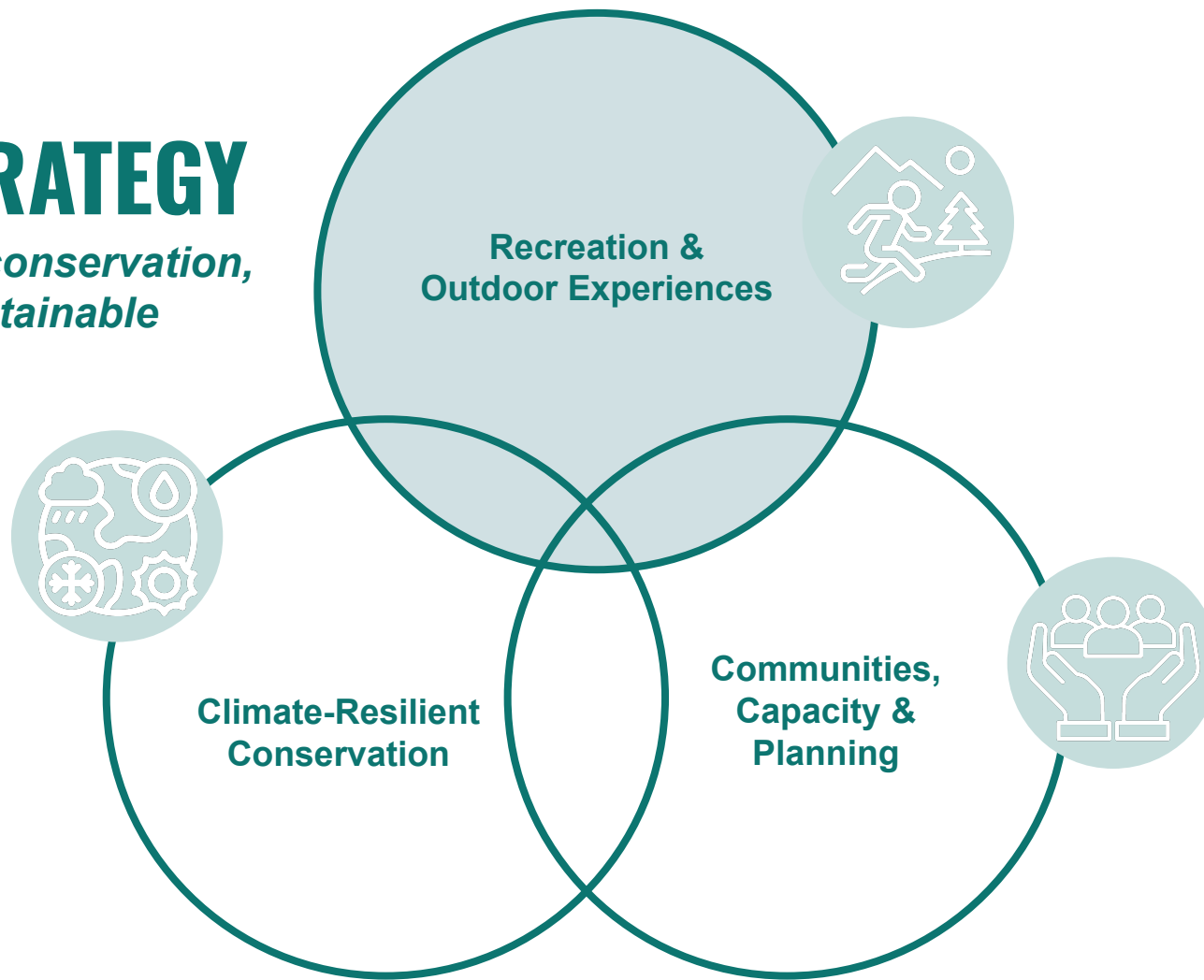

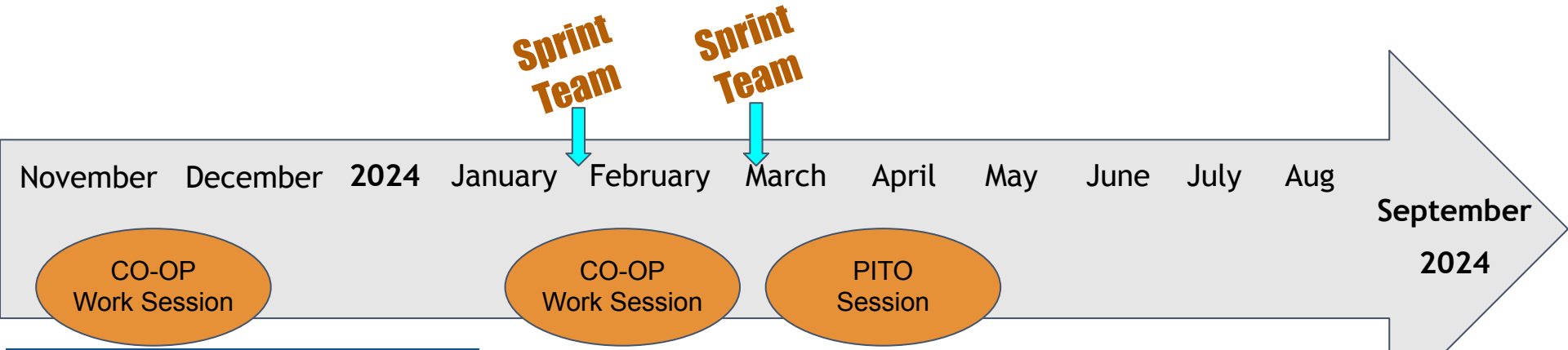
