Challenges we face

- Ongoing deferred maintenance of critical infrastructure including roads, trails, and buildings, continues to be challenging. Colorado Parks
 and Wildlife needs an ongoing funding strategy for park maintenance and renovations after the partnership with the U.S. Army Corps of
 Engineers Cost Share program ends.
- Maintaining the highest level of natural resource stewardship will always be a challenge at an urban park. There is a continuing need for new, innovative ideas and partnerships to maintain and enhance the natural resources of Cherry Creek.
- Meeting the demands of and handling new issues with an increasing population within the Denver Metro Area while providing sustainable
 outdoor recreational opportunities for our visitors is a challenge. With budget appropriations less than inflation increases and the cost of
 operating the park increasing, management will have future challenges providing historical services and amenities.
